



## RURAL CREDITS.

President Wilson cannot be accused of procrastination. Since assuming office he has taken active hold of too many difficult problems for the charge of evasion to be lodged against him.

Therefore when the president urges upon the house democratic caucus that consideration of rural credits should not conflict with tariff revision he has undoubtedly good reasons to support his argument.

The experience of all countries which have made special provision in their economic system for rural credits shows that different problems are involved in this and in so-called commercial or industrial credits. With this fact in mind, the president says:

"Special machinery and a distinct system of banking must be provided for if rural credits are to be successfully and adequately supplied.

"A government commission is now studying the interesting and highly successful methods which have been employed in several countries of the old world, and its report will be made to congress at a regular session next winter. It is confidently to be expected that the congress will at that session act upon the recommendations of that report and establish a complete and adequate system of rural credits.

"There is no subject more important to the welfare or the industrial development of the United States, there is no reform in which I would myself feel it a greater honor or privilege to take part, because I should feel that it was a service to the whole country of the first magnitude and significance.

The argument advanced is sound, and the plea both frank and well supported. Congress should finish one thing at a time

## JUDGE JOHN A. COBB ON THE NEGRO PROBLEM

By Martin V. Calvin.

At the annual convention of the Georgia State Agricultural Society recently held at Cuthbert, Judge John A. Cobb, of Sumter, son of Howell Cobb, read a very interesting paper on "The Negro Problem."

The arguments advanced were forcefully presented, and made a deep impression on the convention.

Judge Cobb manifested independence of thought as became one who, from lifetime association with the negroes, is perfectly familiar with their character, and cherishes for the race a kindly feeling. He discussed the negro as an inferior race, intended by the Creator to be a "hewer of wood and drawer of water." He argued that, in all our relations with the negro, we should make him understand and recognize the fact that this is a white man's country: that his presence here was brought about by agencies for which we are in nowise responsible, but, so long as he properly conducts himself, we will guarantee to him the rights to which he is justly entitled.

Dependent as we are on agriculture for support, maintenance and prosperity, we require reliable labor in order to win success. The negro is here-known to us, and we are known to him. For our purposes, he is the best available laborer.

"Are we pursuing a proper course to keep this labor satisfied and to make it efficient and reliable?"

Judge Cobb argued that, in meeting the situation presented by the question propounded, a heavier responsibility rests upon us than on the negro. He is to us "as clay in the hands of the potter." It is our duty to so shape his course that he will prove to be a reliable laborer.

Judge Cobb declared that we are cognizant of the fact that naturally the negro is not malicious or revengeful, but he is easily influenced. He has no conception of gratitude. It follows that in cases in which the white man is seeking to protect the negro from injustice at the hands of a white man, the negro is prone to think that such action justifies him in being impertinent and offensive to white people generally.

"I have frequently," said the judge, "had to tell them that when a white man does you a favor or protects you against injustice, he is forced to knock you down in order to make you know your proper place."

Judge Cobb suggested that this is one of the most serious things that confronts us in trying to protect the negro against those who desire to treat him unjustly. He regretted that there are some of our own people who, knowing that particular character-



The "Sherlock Holmes" stories present a master-work in the writing of this sort of starting an interest in literature of this character. ## HISTORY REPEATS ITSELF.

The present state of relations between the United States and Mexico is not unprecedented, as the uninformed alarmist would make believe.

The Maximilian government was never recognized by the United States, and throughout the period of French intervention the Juar-z government continued to be recognized. In 1876, when Porfirio Diaz became provisional president of the Mexiof the American minister as to whether or not the Diaz government should be recog- hereafter. nized.

Up to that time it had been the custom of the United States to recognize the existing administration in Mexico in this manner, without closely scrutinizing the methods employed to get into power. But, at the time when Diaz seemed to have become the ruler of Mexico, there were unsettled controversies between the United States and Mexico concerning the Rio Grande frontier.

The American minister decided to "wait before recognizing General Diaz as president until it shall be assured that his election is approved by the Mexican people, and that his administration is possessed of the stability to endure and the disposition to comply with the rules of international comity and the obligations of treaties."

This President Hayes did, deferring the recognition more than a year, although all the powers then represented in Mexico, except the United States, Germany, Spain, Italy, Salvador and Guatemala, had previously officially recognized the Diaz government. The temporary interruption of official relations, at that time, worked no hardship on the American citizens in Mexico. Here precedent breaks down, probably because of the difference between the two men. Diaz and Huerta; the difference then and now in conditions in the two countries.

Since there is precedent in the temporary refusal of the United States to recognize a Mexican government, let us patiently hope that history will also repeat itself in a proper and mutually agreeable adjustment of the present strained relations between neighbors that should be neighborly on terms that are reasonable, reciprocal and equitable.

> Calling on the churches to help men be physically sound as a step toward moral soundness, Dr. E. W. Williams, in a bulletin just issued by the United States Bureau of Education, says:

"Public health asks the church to join hands with it in giving men better bodies, and it promises that when men's bodies shall be stronger their spirits will be nobler. It asks the church to assist it in making sanitary the community to which the church ministers, and it pledges the experience of the world that when that is done, none will benefit more than the church. Other things being equal, the healthy man is the moral man, and the sanitary community is the spiritual community."

While sermons on the dignity and beauty of a clean, sound, wholesome body are proper and desirable from the pulpit and will advance the cause of virtue, Dr. Williams is guilty of a pardonable exaggeration. since it is a fact that the contrary of his proposition is also true.

Many of the noblest spirits to bless the world and fill it with good works have been encased in a frail physique, and have overcome physical defects and physical weakness to become leaders of thought and of spiritual uplift. It is also true that many offenders against human and divine laws have been superb physical specimens.

Generally speaking, however, Dr. Williams is right in his contention that sound. well-ordered, well-disciplined bodies make for morality.

As a slave, the negro was religiously cared for in every particular, and was taught the all-important lesson of implicit obedience.

All this was quite undone during carpetbag days. Following in that damaging wake was the act of enfranchisement.

"Is it any wonder." queried Judge Cobb, "that the suddenly freed and enfranchised slave should have had his mind warped and that he should have lost confidence in his real friends?"

Judge Cobb said it was impossible that any people under the sun could have taken the negro and made of him what we have made. Education, beyond the "three r's," had almost invariably had the effect of rendering the negro valueless as a laborer. In a majority of instances, it had made him a burden to the community in which he lives.

Judge Cobb declared that frequently, in the competition that is in evidence among our own people for labor, the negro has been taught, wittingly or unwittingly, to disregard contracts and obligations of every character.

"This year," said Judge Cobb, "it has been demonstrated that this evil can be ured. The stringency of the money market prevented farmers from borrowing money as freely as has been the custom, therefore, the negroes' demands had to be denied. See the result! We are this year making the cheapest crop we have made in years, and our labor has been satisfactory. Necessity forced the condition. We met it with a firm and united stand."

"Blind tigers, gambling and license to do evil are running rampant in this land." said Judge Cobb. "If you judge of who are the guilty ones by the convictions in our courts you would think that the negro is the only violator of the law.

Judge Cobb contended that the law-abiding citizens of the commonwealth are largey responsible for the unfortunate condition of affairs of which mention has been made. A change for the better, the speedy and

genuine reform that is demanded by our highest and best interests, will not come until a united, a determined and an unyielding effort is put forth by the law-abiding element of our own people. It rests with us whether or not Georgia shall continue to be recognized as "the Empire State of the South." In order to the preservation of that well won title, we must carry out, in its fullest meaning and its highest significance. the motto of our state-"wisdom, justice and moderation.



## To Find Land Areas.

(From The Engineering News.) Louis V. Mathey, Spot, Tenn., writes us that he has for thirty-four years been obtaining land areas by the simple process of accurately plotting the survey to scale on good paper, then cutting away the paper outside of the boundry with 'a sharp knife and weighing the folded plot of the tract on a chemist's or jeweier's scale accurately to 1-64 grain. He sends us a sample man of a tract of 16,651 acres, plotted on a scale of so rods to the inch, on agsheet of 18 by 24-inch paper, which weighed 42 8-32 grains. While the plan might serve as a rough check on computations, the limit of error in plotting and trimming, as well as in weighing, would make the scheme only applicable where land is of very low value."
