

### SHOTS EXCHANGED BETWEEN MEXICAN AND U. S. TROOPS

#### One of Huerta's Men Shot to Death After He Had Fired on the American Soldiers.

### FIRST SHOT FIRED BY HUERTA SOLDIERS

#### Warning Sent to Huerta's Commander at Ojinaga That His Soldiers Must Not Repeat the Shooting.

Freelito, Texas, December 18.—An exchange of shots between Mexican and American soldiers on the American side two miles west of Freelito today, resulted in the death of Luis Orozco, a federal regular from the army of general Huerta.

The Mexicans fired the first shot. Orozco, who lived a short time, admitted after being shot, that he and his companions had crossed to the American side with a note, and that when they were halted by the American sentries they were shooting.

MOYER IS DEFENDED BY AN EX-PRISONER

Says Charges are Utterly False, Inspired by Worst Class of Inmates.

Utterly declaring that the sensational stories being circulated concerning the discipline at the federal penitentiary were mere "bores," Luther C. Thompson, until Thursday a convict at the government institution, made a statement to The Constitution just before he set for his home in Baltimore.

Thompson, whose register number was 4743, said that the food served the prisoners for the past year at that institution was inferior to that which he had eaten in his own home.

"The treatment of the prisoners is kind. Other prisoners have told me that 'when they served me here I found that the treatment there harder than at the local penitentiary.'"

"During my term I had charge of the kitchen, and during that time I made up my mind to make a statement in the newspaper to the effect that I really only served time since last March."

"There is no such thing as cruel treatment at the prison. Since Moyer came here, things have changed on prisoners. I state emphatically that there is no such thing as a 'cell' at the federal penitentiary."

"There is a cell where prisoners are placed in breach of certain rules of the institution. Recently a prisoner who attempted to kill another in a cell but he was not chained."

"The treatment of the prisoners at the federal penitentiary is better than that which they receive at the local penitentiary."

"As for Hawthorne, he was given special treatment. He was given a glass of fresh milk and a slice of pie."

"I believe that the charges against Moyer are untrue as far as the conduct of the prison is concerned."

"Thompson promised new and starting evidence of a plot against Moyer, which he declared he would publish in the near future."

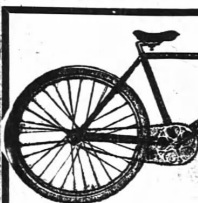

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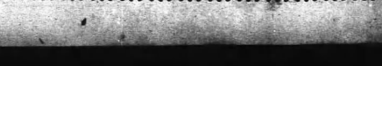
