United States Government Is Aroused by Execution of English Subject and Will Get the Truth.

EXECUTION IS DEFENDED BY REBEL LEADER VILLA

As a Precedent Villa Refers to Execution of Two British Subjects by General Andrew Jackson—England Waits on United States.

Washington, February 21.—Secretary Bryan has ordered a far-reaching investigation of the killing of William B. Benton, the British subject at Juarez, he announced today that, until all facts in the case had been gathered from all available sources, no opinion would be expressed by the state department. All information received will be transmitted to the British government. Explanations made by General Villa to Thomas D. Edwards and George C. Carothers, the American consular representatives at Juarez, together with the court-martial records, are to be supplemented by further investigation. Instructions were sent to American Consul Lathrop at Chihuahua to get additional details from Villa, and it is understood that inquiry through independent sources will be made on Juarez. Mr. Carothers is consular agent at Torreon temporarily assigned Mr. Edwards.

Villa's Version of Tragedy

Attitude of British Embassy

Under these or other instructions from the foreign office, the British ambassador here will make no further progress pending the outcome of the investigation which the state department has undertaken. It is understood that Ambassador Balfour has obtained the unofficial character of the report that Benton was shot in the back. The state department has far from the obligation on the part of the United States to look after the killing of British subjects. The action of the state department directing consular agents to investigate the same degree of protection is given to American citizens as is given to British subjects. It is regarded as an act of courtesy for which the British government was held responsible.

Pursue for Punishment

One result of the Benton incident has been to create a feeling of apprehension in diplomatic circles as to the safety of the foreign element in Mexico. So far, reports received here contain no belief that the undertaking by the American state department to look after the welfare of their people in Mexico would be sufficient to temper protection guaranteed by the rules of civilized warfare.

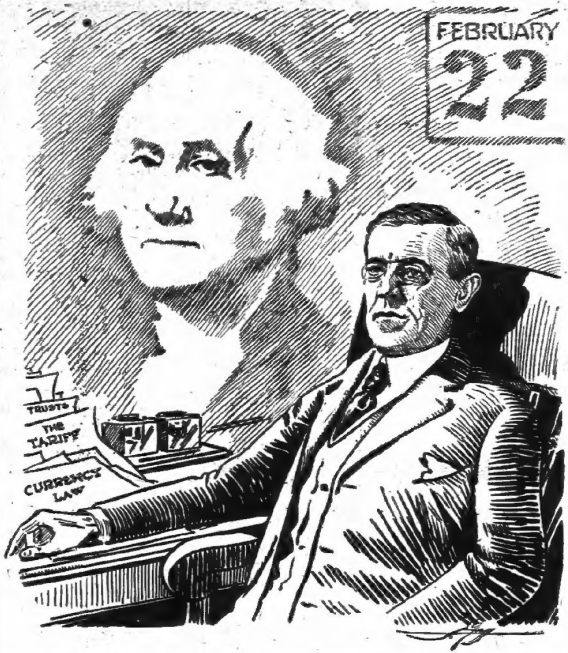

Branding as myths a number of important links in the chain of evidence against Leo Frank, convict, Dorsey and Reuben Arnold last night issued a scathing statement in which they also took this question: "Will these myths be dissolved while Frank lives, or not until he is dead?"

EXTRAORDINARY MOTION FOR A NEW TRIAL BE NEXT STEP OF DEFENSE

McKnight's Wife, Who at First Stated That Frank Was Very Nervous on Murder Night and Said He Had Had Trouble With Girl at Factory, Afterwards Denied Her Statement.

The most startling of new developments in the Frank case, which have come in flurry since the decision of the supreme court last Tuesday, is the announcement by Albert McKnight, a witness for the state, he made an affidavit repudiating his statement on the stand, which he swore his wife, Minola, whose original story was one of the strongest links in the state's chain of evidence.

McKnight, in his remarkable affidavit, says that he was induced to make false statements to connect Frank with the crime by an offer of money, and that he now retraces those statements because he never was made to realize the great harm he has inflicted upon Frank.

McKnight's wife, who at first stated that Frank was very nervous on the night of the murder, and said he had had trouble with a girl at the factory, afterwards denied her statement.

The affidavit was made voluntarily by McKnight, and he was not under any duress or intimidation. It shows one of the most dramatic confessions ever connected with the case.

McKnight, in amplifying his affidavit, states that Mr. Dorsey and the city detective did not know that he was lying. He states, however, that practically everything he said on the stand was untrue.

THE AMERICA OF WILSON

Today is the anniversary of the birth of George Washington, the first president of the United States of America. It is not an occasion for platitudes or sentimentality, but for stock-taking.

The America of Wilson are vastly distasteful and strikingly similar. Some pessimists growl that we have let go of the democracy of Washington and that we year toward centralization and plutocracy.

This view is a superficial one. There is more genuine democracy in this country today than under the administration of Washington.

The United States of Washington was a crude nation, a crude and easily influenced people. The voters of that day were unmindful of the secretive in statesmanship.

They demanded that their leaders be solemn, pompous, oratorical. They were not given to analyzing for themselves the underlying principles of government and their inalienable rights in the premises.

All that is changed. The United States of Wilson is an awakened and a vigilant nation. Its people tolerate less falsehood from politicians, less "four-fueling," if you excuse the slang, less blatant demagoguery.

It is not enough nowadays to look wise and speak obscurely. The statesman who stays put must "deliver the goods." He must "come clean."

The newspaper has had much to do with the transformation. Whenever there is light, there must be intelligence.

And there has been plenty of light in this country the past few decades. Voters know their rights; they appreciate their responsibilities; they worship party label less and civic righteousness more; they dream less of partisan triumph and more of patriotic efficiency.

What is more, the process of democratization has largely been. As the faculty of doing one's own thinking increases, there will be less opportunity for the shallow-pate and the demagogue.

8 PEACE TREATIES RATIFIED BY SENATE

All Amendments Rejected and Arbitration Conventions Were Adopted Without Even a Call of the Roll.

Washington, February 21.—(Special) The Senate today rejected five years' agreement with Great Britain, Japan, Italy, Spain, Norway, Sweden, Portugal and Switzerland, and marked the first step in the policy of President Wilson to place the United States in a more advantageous position in the world of nations.

Amendments to the treaties have been rejected. Primary debate closed within a few minutes after the Senate went into executive session today and ratification resolutions were adopted one by one without a roll call.

The treaties, briefly, provide for reference to the Hague Tribunal of international differences and questions relating to the interpretation of other treaties from which neither is excluded by diplomatic. They give up of themselves for ratification. But in view of the long delay in their ratification, during which many disturbing factors, both at home and abroad, have contributed to general satisfaction, the feeling among the senators is that the action today will serve to place the United States on a firmer consolidated basis with the world.

No matter involving the vital interests, independence or honor of the contracting powers is lost by the ratification of these treaties, and all disputes involving the interpretation of other treaties also are excluded. The method of procedure toward arbitration fixed in the treaties provides that a special agreement shall be drawn up setting out the details of the dispute and defining its issues and the scope of consideration to be granted to the arbitrator. Such agreements must be signed by the president and ratified by the Senate before the question can be submitted to the Hague.

Matters still before the senate for-ratification committee are Panama canal question, the pending treaty with Nicaragua, and the treaty with Colombia, the growing out of the surrender of the Panama Canal. Although the making of the ratification of the treaties was overwhelming, and the amendment to ratification of the Panama canal question was rejected by more than a two-thirds vote, senators who urge repeal of the treaty are not significant of the Senate's attitude.

The senate is looking to the president for some initiative in the matter, and several senators favored today that the issue of the ratification of the Panama Canal be referred to a special committee. That some democratic world would be reported to the Senate.

The second Pacific Amendment. It also proposes to extend the chief features of the Pacific amendment which would give the United States control over the Panama Canal and the Panama Canal Zone.

China has stipulated her intention of being one of the nations to sign one of Secretary Bryan's peace treaties. This government was understood to have been reaching its port here in April. It will sign such a convention.

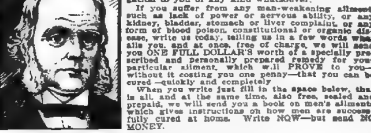

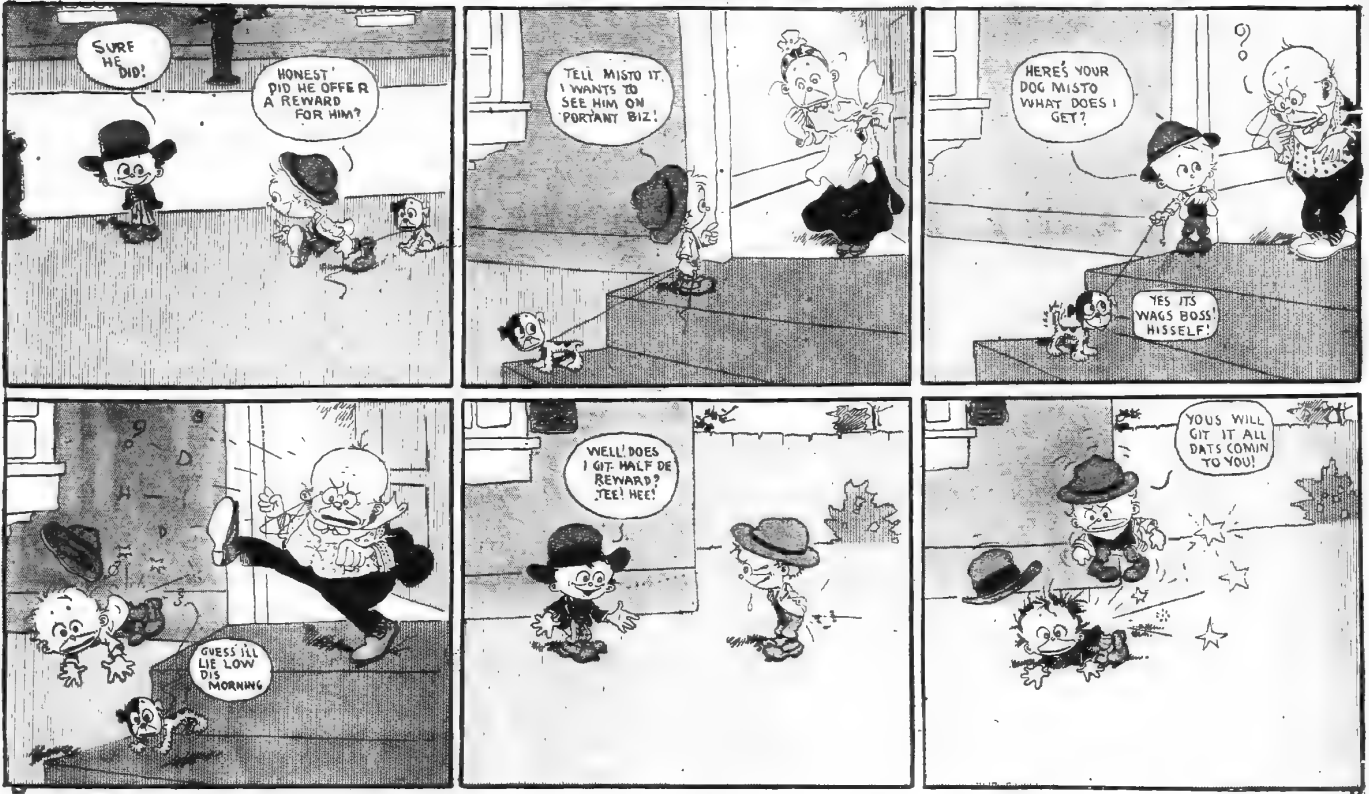

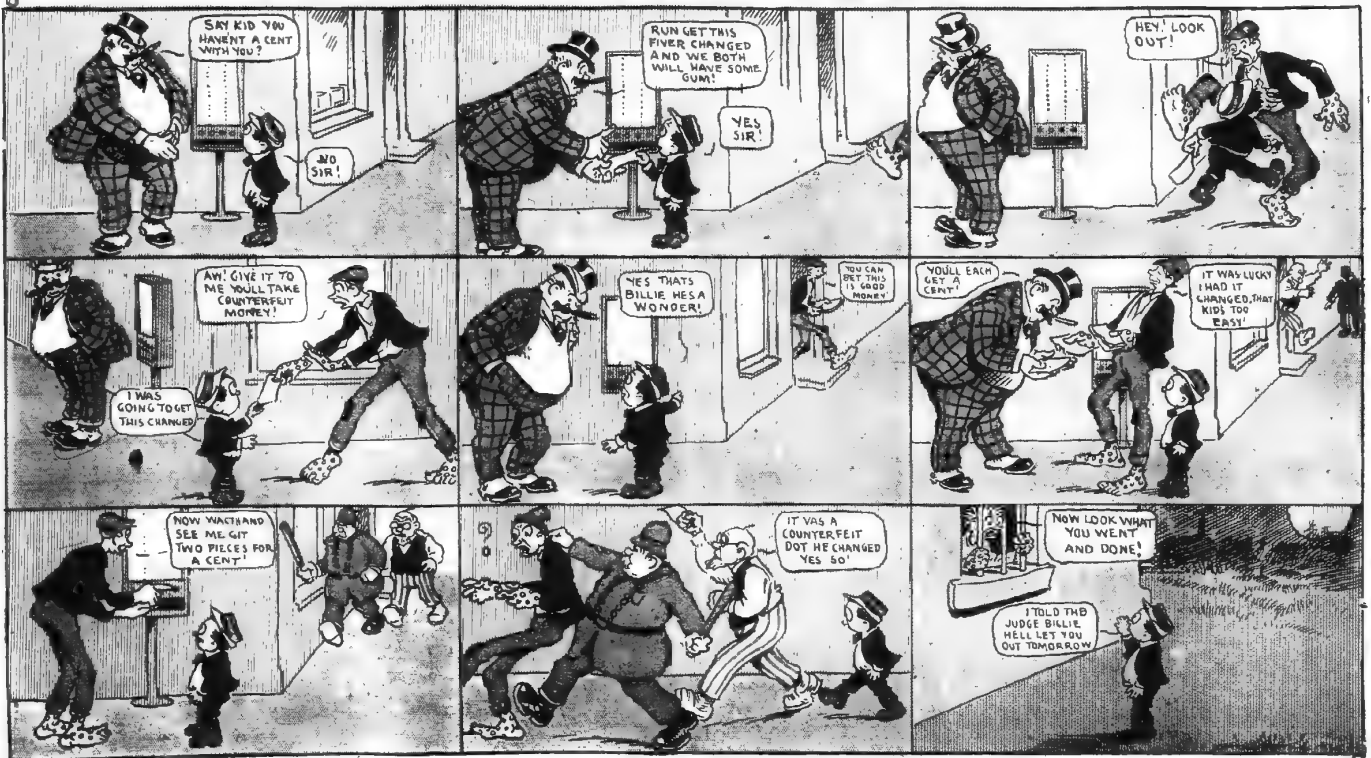

With \$55,330 Raised for New Hospital, Citizens Are Urged to Give Help in Raising \$44,670.

The Baptists of the Atlanta association have raised since February 1, when work was begun, in connection with the \$100,000 they have pledged themselves to give in constructing another \$150,000 from the Baptists throughout the state of Georgia, which is to be used in erecting one of the most modern Christian hospitals in the southland.

The board of trustees of the Georgia Baptist hospital, who are charged with the promotion of this enterprise, have worked faithfully. They have reached the point in the campaign when a vital effort must be made to finish raising the funds, and they now call upon all citizens of Atlanta and Georgia to come to their aid.

Up to the present date only Baptists have been appealed to, and subscriptions have been accepted only from churches of that faith. While this institution is the property of and operated under the auspices of the Baptist church of Georgia, it is in nowise sectarian; during the first seven months that the hospital was conducted, under its present management (April, 1912 to October, 1915), it cared more people who were not Baptists than those of its own denomination; to be exact, 143 Episcopalians and other religious faiths.

Monument for Everlasting. So while in the campaign for the greater hospital, Baptists are especially appealed to, and this movement is to them one of the greatest opportunities of bringing the Kingdom of God to earth, yet the work done here is of so wide a scope and so urgent that it appeals to all men and women of all creeds and of all races in justice.

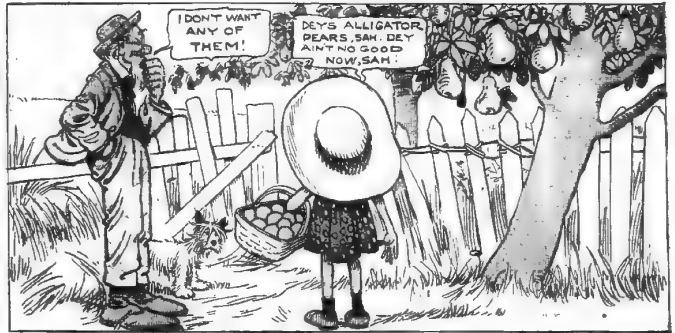

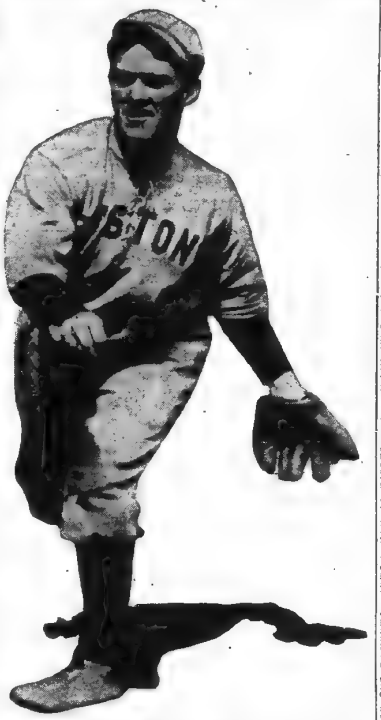
