SIGNS POINT TO DRUBBING FOR THE TAMMANY TIGER AT HANDS OF FUSION FORCES

On the Eve of New York City Election the Indications Are That "Boss" Murphy's Ticket Will Be Defeated.

ODDS OF 3 TO 1 OFFERED AGAINST TAMMANY HALL

Great Disorder Is Expected at the Polls—Sulzer Says Tammany Has Hired Gunmen to Get Him.

Alfred C. Newell, general agent for the Columbia Life Insurance company, was for years the chief political adviser of the Brooklyn Eagle and later of the New York World. Following the resignation of the constitution, Mr. Newell is an intimate personal friend of Tammany boss John P. Mulvey and was the one who advised the late Mayor Adams, managing the campaign of Mulvey for mayor in 1905. Mr. Newell is now in New York City, and it is reported that he will stop over for several days in New York on the special correspondence during the closing days of the warm political fight that has broken out in New York for many years. The election occurs today.

By Alfred C. Newell. New York, November 3.—(Special)—On the eve of the most notable municipal election in the history of New York city, it looks as if Tammany was in for an unprecedented drubbing. Here are the facts as they appear to-night, just a few hours before the opening of the polls.

Fusion odds have been extended to 4 to 1, with little Tammany money. Robert Adams, the Georgia man directing the fusion campaign, has called for 100,000 voters to watch at the polls and guard against the army of repeaters supposed to be at the command of Boss Murphy.

Joseph Johnson, the other Georgia man, managing the campaign of Edward E. McCall, Tammany candidate for mayor, has issued a statement recommending any plan to elect McCall.

Charles F. Murphy, leader of Tammany Hall, met the newspaper men today with the prediction of a landslide for his ticket.

"We will win by 100,000," declared Murphy, who in the last three weeks has been more to the fore than any other name more often than in any previous campaign.

John Purroy Mitchell, fusion candidate for mayor, and all fusion voters were instructed to stay on the stump until the last hour.

Great disorder is expected at the polls in spite of Adams' personal appeal to Fusion Commissioner Wald for added protection.

William Sulzer, the impeached governor, will be overwhelmingly elected to the general assembly from the sixth district. He has issued a statement asserting that Tammany has hired a gang of gunmen to get him.

This marks the first time in the memory of the oldest politicians, has been the bitterest fight in the annals of this city.

All sorts of estimates are being made as to the probable fusion majority. These figures run anywhere from 25,000 to 125,000.

DICTATOR IS TOLD HE CANNOT REMAIN HEAD OF REPUBLIC

In the Communication Huerta Is Informed by United States That He Must at Once Eliminate Himself as a Factor in the Mexican Situation.

BLANQUET IS BARRED FROM TAKING PLACE HELD BY GEN. HUERTA

Believed in Mexico City That Huerta Will Refuse to Comply With Ultimatum—The Dictator Summons Foreign Diplomats to the Palace for a Conference—Rebels Become Very Aggressive.

Mexico City, November 3.—President Huerta has been told he must resign the presidency of Mexico without loss of time, and that he must not leave his successor General Aureliano Blanquet, his minister of war, or any other member of his official family or of the unofficial circle whom he might be expected to control.

This ultimatum from Washington was conveyed to President Huerta through his private secretary, Gen. Rabin, by Nelson O'Donoghue, the American chargé d'affaires, acting under instructions from the state department.

TWO COURSES OPEN TO HUERTA

Senor Rabago presented the memorandum to his chief last Sunday, but Huerta had returned no answer, and, as far as could be learned, had guarded its contents from almost all of his official and intimate counselors.

Those who learned of the Washington note regard General Huerta's position as one in which he will be forced to give one of two answers: refusal point-blank to comply with the demand, possibly going to the aid of the diplomatic representatives. 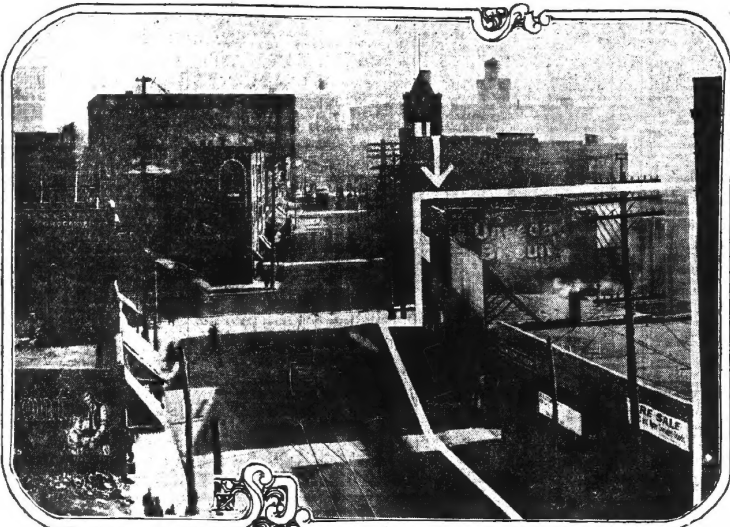

Inasmuch as the best information available indicates that the aggregate of all crops will not be far below the average, the satisfactory prices now prevailing point to a continuation of the purchasing power in all the rural districts, except those where losses have been the most severe. He finishes by saying the normal requirement of upward of ninety millions of our own people, coupled with what we can command of the trade of the world, ought to prevent acute pessimism.

President W. W. Finley says: "Business conditions are favorable. The southeastern farmer is thus in a fortunate position of having products in sell at a time when he may expect to realize good prices. Therefore, expect that the consequent enlargement of the purchasing power of the farmer will benefit all lines of business in this section. Southeastern manufacturing establishments are generally working on full time and enjoying a good demand for their products. But the economic strength of the southeastern section as an agricultural and manufacturing region, producing its own raw material and fuel for power, is so great that, there is no reason to expect any setback in business." He says: "I see no reason to apprehend any depression at this time."

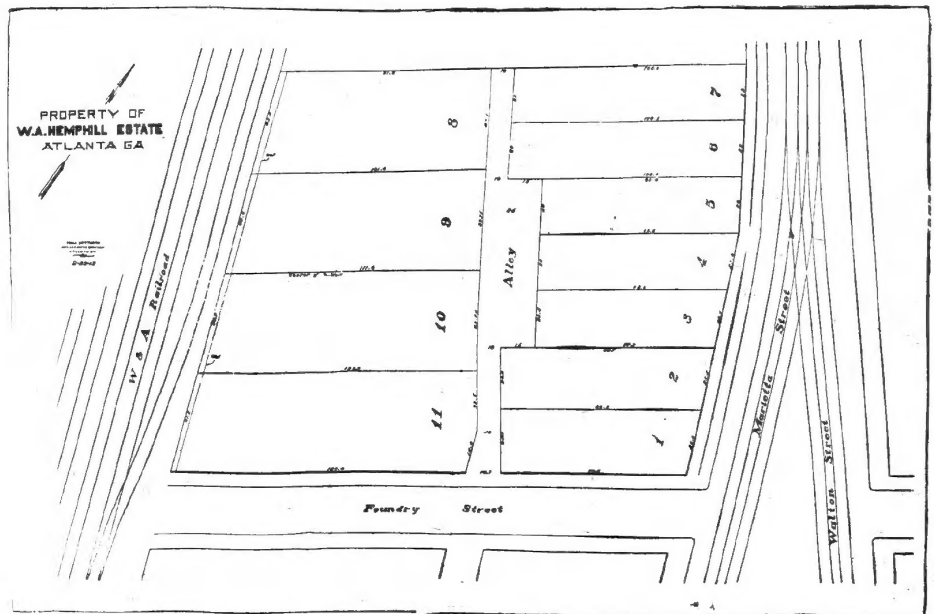

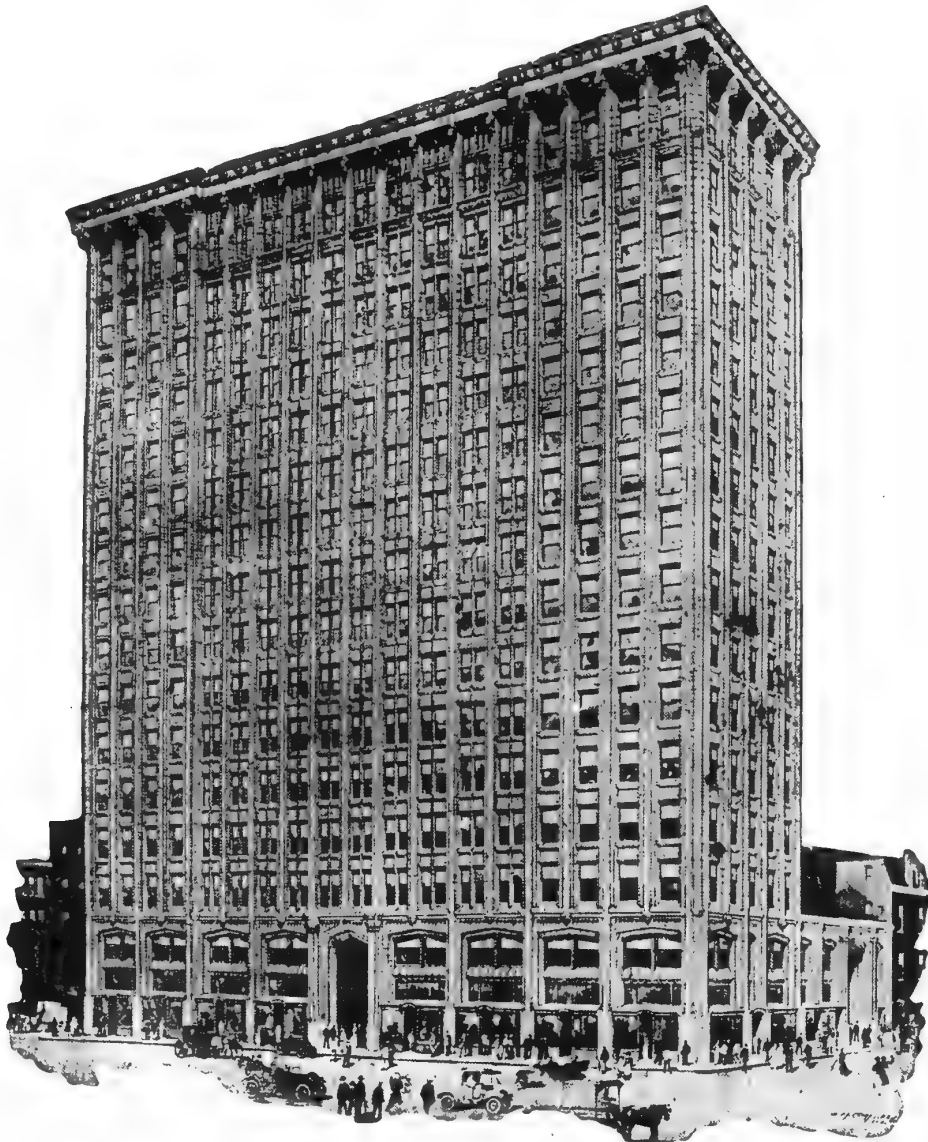

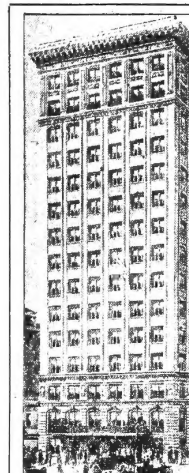
