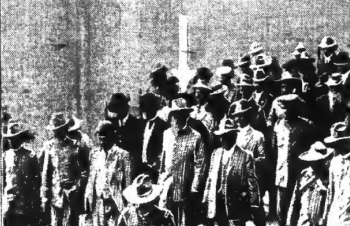

HUERTA'S TIME SHORT; GOVERNMENT TO FIGHT BY THE WHITE STATES.

DIKTATOR SNEERS AT INTERVENTION BY UNITED STATES

Gen. Huerta and His Intimates Freely Express the Opinion Washington Will Not Take Drastic Action.

MAJORITY IN CAPITAL FAVORS INTERVENTION

Mexican Public Recognizes Relations Are Strained Almost to Point of War. Divergent Opinions as to American Action.

Majority in Capital Favors Intervention.
The Mexican public recognizes that relations between the United States and Mexico are strained almost to the point of war.

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Official Circles at Washington Believe That, Unless the Dictator Complies With the American Demands in a Few Hours, Immediate Action Will Be Taken by This Country.

CLIMAX IS VERY NEAR; WILSON SPENT SUNDAY ON MEXICAN PROBLEM

President Did Not Go to Church, But Remained at White House Confering With Senators and Secretary Lifting Embargo on Arms—Next Move by Washington Is Expected in Short While—Huerta Must Go, Still the Washington Slogan.

Washington, November 8.—Following his usual custom of handling official business on Sunday, President Wilson worked practically all of today on the Mexican problem. He did not go to church, remaining in conference during the forenoon. Later he summoned Senators Borah and McCumber, republican members of the senate from the national committee, and spent nearly two hours with them in general discussion of the situation. Tonight the president conferred at length with Secretary Bryan.

From the way the president's talking points were laid out, it was evident that he was preparing to announce a new policy of approaching a climax, and that, should developments as expected immediately, he would probably announce the withdrawal of the Provisional President Huerta to the diplomatic corps last night had been received, as the president's formal reply to the American demand that Huerta resign advised. That the United States had given Huerta until tomorrow night to reply before making the next move was the general belief in official circles.

Repeal Huerta and All His Acts.
The next step, in the view of some of those who have talked with the president within the last two days, is to begin summing up the members of the cabinet, and to announce that the United States is not only withdrawing its support from Huerta, but making it clear to the world that it also refuses to recognize any acts of the new congress sent to be convened by Huerta.

The Washington government, it is understood, will not undertake to guarantee any business or commercial relations with the Huerta regime, and probably will stand by any legally constituted government which in future may be formed in Mexico. It is believed that the president has declined to talk what the relations of the present government to Huerta.

Both Senators McCumber and Borah told him in their conference today, but declined to talk what the relations of the present government to Huerta.

Borah Would Lift Arms Embargo.
Senator Borah told the president that in his opinion, even should Huerta be removed, the United States should not recognize any other government than his resignation at this time, there would be no responsible person or persons to take over the government. The (Lubbock) senator suggested that if the embargo on arms were lifted the constitutionalists probably could get possession of the reins of government in Mexico City in about thirty days, and that the United States ought to give them opportunity to establish themselves. Should they fail, he believes the United States ought to consider other steps when that contingency arises.

Senator McCumber believes the embargo on arms should be raised, but realizes the position of the president. He said in his conference that he would like to see the United States send the Wilsons of the rebellion to the United States, but he would not like to see the United States add to the humanitas of the fighting. He thinks the Huerta regime is in such financial straits that it will probably be unable to continue for more than a few weeks.

Senator Bacon, chairman of the foreign relations committee, said tonight he believed a majority of the members of that committee were in favor of raising the embargo on arms. To the

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Message that raising the embargo would be inhuman, some senators have declared that such an act on the other hand would put an end to the revolution in a short period, and save the country the bloodshed of an indefinite military struggle.

HELD AD TO HIDE GUILTY PASSION

Such Is State's Contention in Murder Charge Against Mrs. Ada Griffith and John England.

Macon, Ga., November 9 (Special)— Charged with the murder of fifteen-year-old John Egan, whose lifeless body was found in a pine thicket on the fourth day of last December, Mrs. Ada Griffith and John England are in jail at Macon, their arrest having been made almost a year after the alleged crime was committed. Evidence secured by Detective W. Moore of Macon, who worked up the famous King murder case, was used as the basis for the arrest.

Today at Macon it was said Mrs. Griffith and England both stuck to their story that the preliminary hearing (Saturday), after they were innocent of the crime. That will be tried in February.

To Counsel Rejection. The contention of the state is that they killed young Egan because they allowed intimate relations to remain a secret. 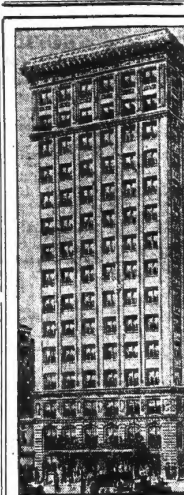

TARIFF LAW LOSES DISCOUNT CLAUSE

McReynolds Holds 5 Per Cent Rebate on Goods Imported in American Ships Violates Treaties.

Washington, November 9.—Attorney General McReynolds has decided that the subsection of the new tariff law authorizing a discount of 5 per cent on all goods imported in American vessels is nullified by the provision that "nothing in this subsection shall be construed as to abrogate or in any manner impair or affect the provisions of any treaty concluded between the United States and any foreign nation."

Secretary McAdoo, of the treasury department made public the attorney general's opinion today and announced that in accordance with the provisions of customs would be directed to continue to disregard the subsection as they were instructed to do on October 8. Entries held up pending the decision now will be admitted and importers who desire to insist upon getting the 5 per cent discount to protest, with the right of finally carrying the question to the court of customs appeal.

This ends for the present at least any drawn-out discussion over the proposed differential provision, the subject of much debate in congress while the tariff was under consideration.

Options of McReynolds.—The attorney general gave his opinion to Secretary McAdoo ten days ago but it was withheld until today to allow consideration by the treasury of the law.

Mr. McReynolds held: "That the 5 per centum discount on American vessels only, which was the primary object of the law, is not in violation of the treaties between the United States and various other powers, and that consequently the subsection, by the expressed terms of the provision is inoperative."

Twenty-three nations have treaties with the United States under which they claimed their ships were exempt to the differential in common with American ships. These included Great Britain, Germany, France, Austria, Hungary, Italy, Japan, Belgium, Denmark, Greece, the Netherlands, Spain, Norway and Sweden.

Several foreign governments, including those of Germany, France and Spain, made strong protests to the state department against the proposed discrimination, and there were some indirect threats of a trade war if the preference duty was enforced.

Efforts were being made by some of the administration leaders immediately after the passage of the law to have congress repeal the provision. The speaker of the house and the chairman of the house ways and means committee and the speaker of the senate and the chairman of the senate finance committee, however, expressed their assent to such action, and the president did not urge it.

Would Have Cost \$100,000,000.—An allowance of the discount on the part of those nations claiming equal rights with American vessels would have resulted in an estimated loss of \$100,000,000 annually in the treasury. This would have created a deficit instead of a surplus in the treasury, the amount estimated by the tariff framers.

Repeal of the law would have meant a merchant marine was the taxpayers' purchase of an incentive. The law inserted. They claimed it would operate as an incentive to the building of ships in the United States, since ships of the United States, since the bottom would get the 5 per cent reduction and the American ship owners would be assured of an increase of business.

Importers who are dissatisfied with a provision of the law, which may be protested to the collector of customs at the port of entry, who will lay their objections before the board of general appraisers. In case the board's decision is unfavorable to the appellant, the case may be carried to the court of customs appeal. For the procedure of customs appeal, see the procedure.

From now on all estimates will lead up to the estimate of the year, which by the department of agriculture, these figures will be of such importance that they will undoubtedly have the effect of restricting new business during the month preceding them.
