The World's Mysteries

WHO WAS THE FIRST POET LAUREATE?

The origin of the title of poet laureate has given rise to much speculation. It is generally considered to be of English origin, but it was a practice of honoring a popular poet handed down from ancient times and revived during the middle ages. It was customary among the Greeks to crown with the laurel a favorite poet. For example, Ptolemy was crowned with great solemnity at Rome in 141; at Paris, Oxford and Cambridge the laurel wreath was sometimes placed on the heads of scholars distinguished for learning or poetry.

The laurel, the leaves of which tree in ancient Greece were sacred to Apollo, as such was used to form a crown or wreath of honor for poets, and hence, the word "laureate" or "laureatus" thus came to England to signify eminent or associated with glory of whatever character. In olden times the term "laureate" was used in the term "laureate laureate" to indicate the dispatches announced in victory.

John Skelton, who died in 1529, received the laureate honor from both the universities, and accordingly the laureate "Poet Laureate."
