

THE BAKERS HOOT AT DEFENDERS OF MONEY BILL

The Few Supporters of the Administration Measure at the Boston Convention Are Given Scant Courtesy.

GLASS-OWNED MEASURE IS TERMED SOCIALISTIC

With Only One Dissenting Vote, Bankers Declare the Bill Imposes Unwise Hardships on Banks and Public.

Boston, October 8.—The bankers of the United States again today declared their opposition to the proposed federal reserve plan reform in the currency and banking system.

With only one dissenting vote on the final vote, more than two thousand bankers from all sections of the country gathered at the first day's session of the annual convention of the American Bankers' Association.

The resolutions in which this ratification and approval were contained also included commendation of the president, the secretary of the treasury and congress for their efforts to create in this country an elastic as well as safe currency.

Defenders of Administration Hosted. The addition of a new section to the resolutions was proposed at the afternoon session by congressman Joseph H. O'Neill.

Acting President Arthur Brooks, of Des Moines, in his annual report, has criticized the administration and former congressman Ebeneser J. Hill, of Norfolk, Conn., had attacked the good faith of the administration.

The question at issue. "Don't sidestep the issue. The question really at stake in the currency bill is this: shall the control of the currency of the United States be placed in the hands of the government or the people?"

Bankers Are Warned. Former congressman O'Neill shortly afterward presented his amendment of thanks to the president and congress.

MAYOR TO PROBE SCHOOL CONDITIONS

Woodward Will Look Closely Into Matter of Apportionment of Children by District Lines.

The Constitution's expose of the measure of crowding children into overcrowded class rooms in the high school, and the declaration of President Walter H. His scheme is to place each school in circular zones—draw a half mile circle around each school, and make that the zone.
