Mexico City, October 18.—Provisional President Huerta has not resigned, nor has fled from the capital, at 5 o'clock this afternoon he said he had no intention of doing either.  
 "When I resign," said General Huerta, "it will be to seek a resting place a feet in the soil. When I flee the capital it will be to shoulder a rifle and take my place in the ranks to fight the rebels."  
 This was President Huerta's answer to queries as to whether there was any foundation for reports which have been freely circulated in the capital and have found their way to the United States.  
 General Huerta looked the picture of health and energy. He greeted the Associated Press correspondent with extreme cordiality, asked for a cigarette and listened to the explanation of the motive for the visit.  
 "No intention of resigning," the president said. "You can see for yourself that I am here, at my post, to say that I have resigned or intend to resign is an absolute falsehood. I have no intention of resigning. I will hold on to my position, indicate an aside for the presidency, I shall not leave until that time you will find me here complying with my promise to the nation, which is to re-establish peace, within the law, if possible, but to re-establish peace."  
 President Huerta interpreted his talk with anecdotal illustrations of his points.  
 "Another thing," said the president, "I have money for my requirements, I don't you think I haven't. Where did I get it? My secret? Be responded, 'That I have it.'"  
 On the question of pacification he declared that before the end of the month the government would have retaken the territory and made headway toward the pacification of the state. "I had the president," moving on Huerta and 2,000 more are proceeding north from Zacatecas.

 Chester C. Platt, Sulzer's secretary, read a speech, assuring Sulzer that he had been removed because he would not obey the bosses. Mention of the name of Charles F. The cup presented to Sulzer was inscribed: "To William Sulzer, a victim of corrupt bossism October 18, 1913."

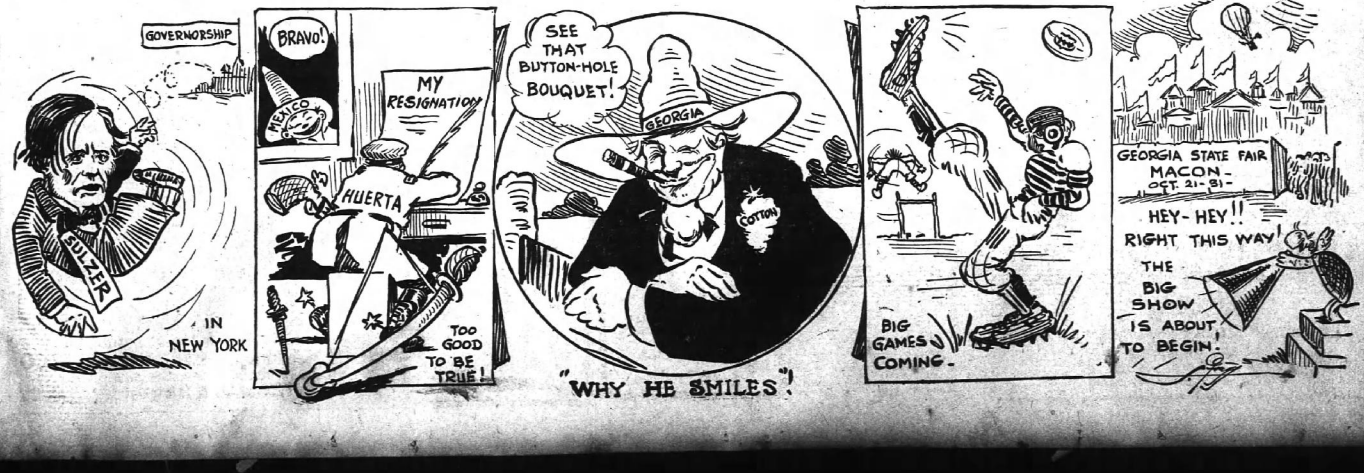

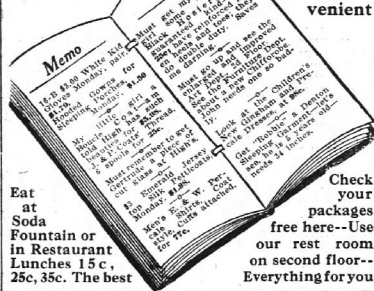

## INTER COUNTY HIGHWAY THRO' SOUTH GEORGIA

Proposed Road Would Connect  
Albany, Sylvester, Tifton,  
Ocilla, Douglas, Waycross.

Tifton, Ga., October 18.—(Special.)—An intercounty graded highway, connecting the county seats of six of the most progressive and wealthy counties in south Georgia, is one of the recent plans for the development of this section.

The highway will begin at Albany and will run the east practically on a land line to Sylvester, Tifton, Douglas and Waycross. At Albany it will connect with the Atlanta to the Gulf highway, known as the Andersonville route at Tifton with the National highway from New York to Jacksonville, and an extension is contemplated from Waycross to connect with the proposed Savannah to Jacksonville highway. The route of this section of the state a direct route into Savannah. Its purpose is to promote social relations between the smaller cities along the route, to foster closer business relations between the cities and towns, as well as for the convenience of the people of this entire section and to give this part of the country its first graded highway east and west.

There is already a fine graded road from Albany to Sylvester. The county commissioners of Worth now propose to build from Sylvester east on a land line to the county line of Tift. The county commissioners of Tift will then be asked to extend the road to Tifton or to build the road from Tifton to the county line of Tift. Then the plan is for the commissioners of Irwin to continue the road on a land line eastward west through that county and for the county commissioners of Coffee to do the same. The proposed highway will run about three miles north of Tifton, and a few miles south of Ocilla, but will connect with the eastern line of Coffee at Sylvester, where it is necessary to turn southeast in Ware county to Waycross.

As soon as the details are arranged the matter will be laid before the boards of trade and chambers of commerce of the respective counties. With the appointment of a state road superintendent with the new year, he will be asked to take charge of the construction of the road. The department will then be asked to construct a portion of the road for each county.

NAVAL HOLIDAY FOR THE NATIONS

First Lord of British Admiralty Makes Proposition to Germany—Cost of Armament Becoming Too Great.

London, October 18.—The invitation to Germany to indulge in a "naval holiday" was repeated today by Winston Spencer Churchill, first lord of the British admiralty, who in the name of the British government, made a specific offer to delay the fulfillment of Great Britain's naval construction program next year if Germany would consent to do the same.

The proposal put forward in the name of the British government for a naval holiday is quite simple. Next year, apart from the Canadian ships of their equivalent and apart from anything that may be required by any development in the Mediterranean, we shall lay down four great ships to Germany's two. Now we say to Germany, if you will put off beginning to build your two ships for twelve months, we will put off abolishing good faith the building of our four ships for exactly the same period.

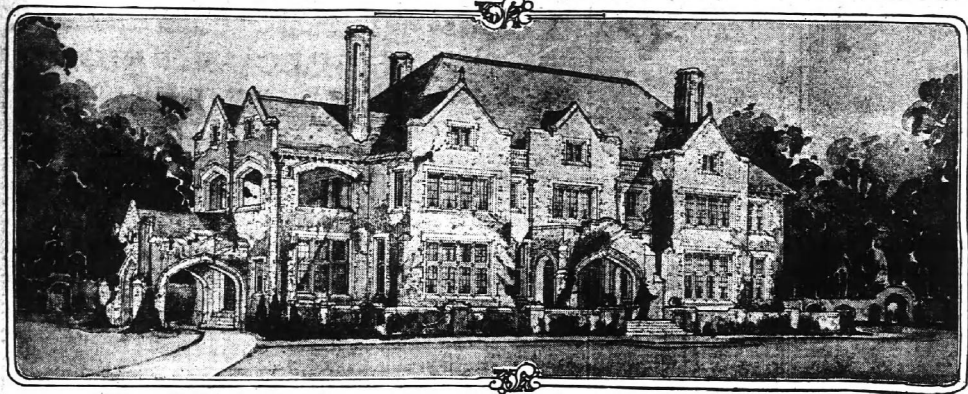

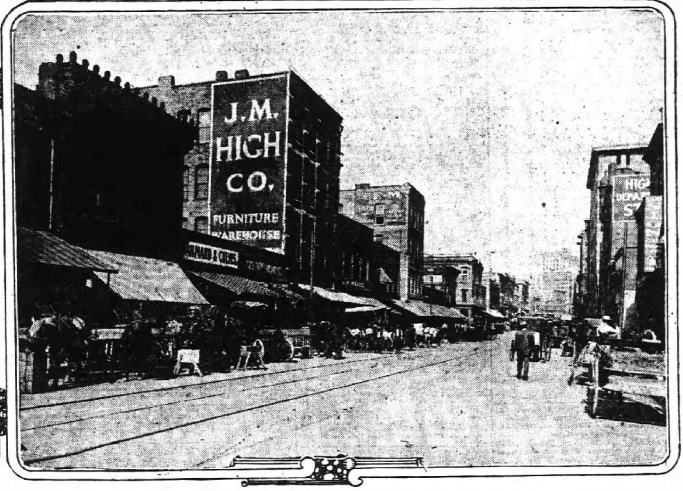

Opening of New Wholesale Commission Building Will Change Entire Character of Broad Street

The picture on the left shows the new wholesale commission mercantile building at Central avenue and the Louisville and Nashville railroad. It will front on a new street running from Central avenue to Washington street, to be known as "Produce Row." This is the future home of many Broad street commission merchant businesses. On the right is shown Broad street, with its jam of trucks and drays. The entire character of this street will change with the removal of the commission merchants.

The new street is "Produce Row," which is being cut through from Central avenue to the Washington street district, in the block between Hunter street and the L. & N. railroad.

in this new street a reinforced concrete wholesale building is now under construction. It will be four blocks long and will extend the entire distance from Central avenue to the Washington street district. This new building will accommodate sixteen commission houses and will have already been leased. Nearly all of the leases are now being consummated on South Broad street and as soon as the building is completed they will move.

"Produce Row" is a 40-foot street extending along the south side of the new building. It is on a level with Central avenue, while at the Washington street end it is approached by an incline to the sidewalk.

On the north side of the building the tracks have already been laid to accommodate the cars for shipping the produce to and from Atlanta. Along the north side of the sidewalk runs a truckway so that produce may be loaded and unloaded directly to and from trucks if desirable.

This arrangement is practically ideal from the standpoint of the commission men and is a great improvement over the inconvenient location and shipping arrangements of the Broad street section.

The building itself is equipped with modern elevators, refrigerating plants and storage space all ideally arranged. This much for the new commission building.

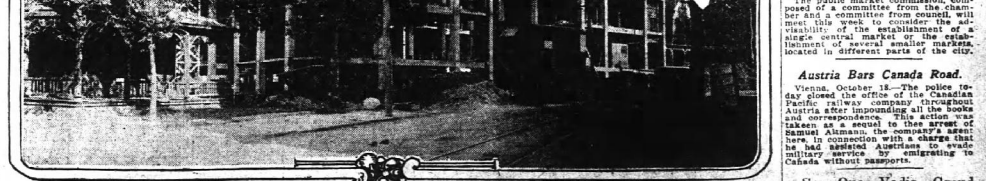

# What Thrifty Bright, Ambitious Girls Are Doing At Rabun Gap School in the Georgia Highlands

They Have Their Own Dairy, Raise Their Own Poultry and Know How to Do Scientific Farming—They Study Gardening, Domestic Science, Needlework, Basketry and Music, in Addition to a Regular Academic Course.

When the thirty girls of the Rabun Gap Industrial school posed for their pictures in the open they did not mind the glare of the sunlight; they had no fear of tan or freckles; they defied these dangers. They rarely worry about their hats, yet I never saw prettier, clearer complexions, brighter eyes and finer hair.

They wore the dark blue skirts, white muslin shirtwaists, which they had made themselves, for these newer girls are taught to sew. They make the boys' shirts for them, and more than that, they iron those shirts after they are laundered. A negro woman is employed to do the washing for the boys. The girls do their own laundry work, the laundry in the basement being comfortably fitted up for that purpose.

Entering the school room after breakfast, I was impressed with the excellent ventilation, the light coming from windows on two sides of the room which in dimensions was larger than the school rooms in Atlanta's graded schools. There were only twenty-five pupils in each school room, for the energetic young teacher, Miss Thurmond, explained that no teacher could do justice to more than twenty-five pupils at a time.

Beside the academic course being taught the girls, the curriculum, that school grades, supplementary branches are taught, including winter gardening, domestic science, and home administration, sewing, needle work and basketry, mountain settlement and mission work, and school music. Miss Shirley is the teacher in the department of domestic science which is a knowledge applied as it is taught.

The students of the morning classes have their study period before the hour that they become the workers of the day, while those who work in the morning have their classes in the afternoon. There are recesses after school three times a day, beside the hour at luncheon or the noon day meal, and during the recesses, recreation carried, the boys and girls into one out of door games.

A bell at 11:30 and one at 5:30 call the boys from the field to the school for refreshing themselves before the meal and when the school family assembles in the commodious dining room for meals, they are the happiest of young people.

## TAKE TURN ABOUT.

A teacher presides at the several tables and Mr. and Mrs. Ritchie at the main tables. According to the good system inaugurated by Mrs. Ritchie, who especially directs the life of the girls, they take turn about waiting on the tables. "How" said one of them, a most cheerful and efficient person, "can we learn to direct work in our own homes when we get them, if we do not learn how ourselves?"

And this fine principle prevailed through every thing the girls did. A young woman not yet eighteen, who two years ago when she came to the school knew nothing about domestic work, knew nothing about cooking, or any of the arts of making a home, was the head cook the week I visited the school. She had four girls under her direction, and each month of the year there are the groups of girls who do the cooking for the entire school. There are the helpers among the novices, and they vie with one another in becoming experts. They are taught the food values, and market values, and the meals prepared reflected this knowledge and a knowledge of good cooking. I have never tasted better fried chicken, and corn fritters, better rolls, biscuits, and light bread. The vegetables were all well cooked, and at each meal there were potatoes prepared in the various wholesome ways. Sweet potatoes of delicious kind were on the dinner menu, and the buttered, great big juicy ones, made the salad course. Apple pies of the finest kind were among the desserts, and the buttered wafers had for breakfast were the good old-fashioned kind, a rarity now anywhere.

There were preserves served at the evening meal, and with a daintiness of table linen and appointment, a precision of service, and general air of ease which indicated that every girl there was trained, and that every one having in her would not only be equipped to direct activities in a home, but herself do intelligently the work in that home.

## SCHOOL DAIRY PRODUCTS.

The butter and sweet milk and the table butter is the product of the school dairy, and that department has its corps of "dairy maids," who in their beauty and freshness and efficiency would prompt poet and painter to claim them as subjects. Though in this department, as well as in the kitchen, all the girls in the school serve their time, as a rule the most talented in the domestic arts are made the directing influence. In the department of the dairy, a young woman, a student of the school for two years, is the head of the department under Mrs. Ritchie's direction. She has

charge of everything pertaining to the cows used for the school dairy. From the hour of 5:30 in the morning when the cows are milked, the churning is done, the butter made, she keeps her eye on the dairy work, and is considered now a veritable little expert in this all important part of the farm home life.

## HAPPIEST GROUP IN THE SCHOOL.

After breakfast the second morning of my visit to the school, I heard such sweet voices and merry singing. I wondered where the music room was. They were the voices of the housewives in the kitchen, I was told, and I went down to see them. There they were, four of them, the happiest group in the school. One had her hands buried deep in the dough for the dinner bread, and I saw the beans being made ready for dinner, the same beans five pretty girls were strigating the day before, when we arrived. And looking into the dining room I saw the breakfast dishes being cleaned away, and the supper being made for dinner. A pretty girl had come in from the garden, her arms full of cosmos blooms and golden-rod with which she filled the vases ornamenting the center of each table.

Out in the yard, the presiding genius of the dairy was sunning her milk pans, and everywhere I turned, I saw a pretty girl engaged in some form of household work.

In the afternoon, I went to ride and to meet the mother of Andrew Ritchie, who though seventy-six years of age, still manages her own little farm and looks after the home in which she lives, with a widowed daughter.

Straight, alert, and majestic in her bearing, this wonderful mountain woman, the mother of four stalwart sons, was gathering Irish potatoes in her garden, when she heard her son's voice and came to greet us. She brushed her gray hair back from her almost seamless forehead, greeted her guests cheerily, and said, "Now, Andy, can't you and your friends stay to dinner?"

The table was already laid; I could smell the chicken, and the delicious aroma of turnip greens, and as I looked about I realized that if there were many such homes as this clean little one, there would be no mountain problem.

Not until all the homes are modeled after this one will the solving of the problem have begun and the ideal of the home do its great part in the civilization of these people.

Insurance of living, the discomfort of the home and the untrained woman in the mountains are just as responsible for the conditions which are going to be remedied as is moonshine, whiskey and idle men.

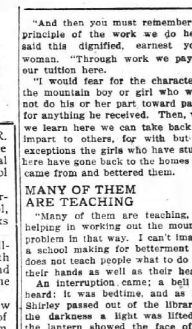
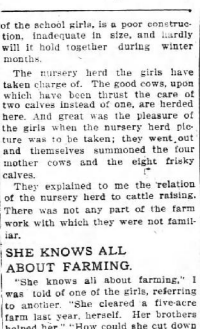
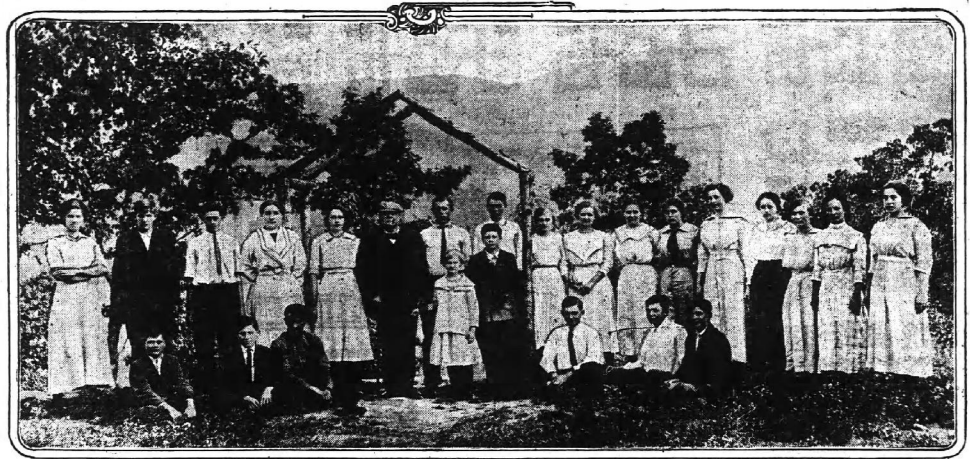
It is for this reason that the Rabun Gap Industrial school raises domestic science to the highest standard, and gives the training in this to every girl who enters the school.

## TAUGHT EVERY PURSUIT.

They are taught every pursuit that comes under the head of woman's work in the home, and any department relating thereto, and no work is more enjoyed by the girls than preparing their winter gardens.

I saw in the room of the sewing classes some very dainty handiwork, and I was impressed by some very pretty services with crocheted edges, for the talents and aptness of the girls are encouraged and directed as far as possible. Basketry, many of them like, and the students of literature are being encouraged in the recent additions to the library. The book shelves are filled, but there are room for many more. I was naively told by a group of girls and boys who were reading there after supper.

But there are many needs to make what it ought to be this great school with the wonderful spirits of its and Mrs. Ritchie giving it life. The barn where the cows are, the special care



of the school girls, is a poor construction, inadequate in size, and hardly will it hold together during winter months.

The nursery herd the girls have taken charge of. The good cows, upon which have been thrust the care of two calves instead of one, are herded here. And great was the pleasure of the girls when the nursery herd picture was to be taken; they went out and themselves summoned the four mother cows and the eight frisky calves.

They explained to me the relation of the nursery herd to cattle raising. There was not any part of the farm work with which they were not familiar.

## SHE KNOWS ALL ABOUT FARMING.

"She knows all about farming," I was told of one of the girls, referring to another. "She cleared a five-acre farm last year herself. Her brothers helped her." "How could she cut down trees?" I asked.

"Why, when she got to those she could not cut down, she just belted them."

I heard afterwards what "belting" meant and I was interested to be told, farther, that this mountain girl who had cleared the five acres wore a two and a half shoe, and her hand fits a number six glove.

If I were asked what, next to good food, impressed me in these mountain girls, I would unhesitatingly say their dignified graceful bearing, their gentle voices and charming manners. They reflected in these qualities the constant care and direction of that loving mother spirit, Mrs. Ritchie.

I suppose their low gauge voices and their calmness may be accounted for by the fact that they don't have to raise their voices above the "roaring" of railroad trains, the rumbling, awful noises of automobiles, and the

high pitched voices that sound at afternoon teas.

"Tell me what you think about the girls having to do as much work as they do," I asked that wonderful product of the Rabun Gap school, Miss Ella Shirley. She was born in the mountains in a home which housed generations of her family, all fine vigorous people. She came to the Rabun Gap school soon after it was established. When she finished school there, she went to the normal school in Athens, and then returned to Rabun Gap to assist Mrs. Ritchie. She teaches the English branches, and domestic science, returning to the summer school each summer.

"Why, how could they learn to do anything if we did not show them for themselves?" she asked me. "It is

one thing to be told how to do a thing, and another thing to do it. Now, we might tell a girl every day how to milk a cow, how to clean the milk pans, how to look after the churn, how to make butter, but we would never know how much she knew, until we saw her apply her knowledge."

## MUST BE DONE IN PRACTICAL WAY.

"Training for farm life must be done in a practical way. The girls who come here from the mountains logically must equip themselves for duty in the homes which they left. Theoretic explained to them would mean nothing. All the lectures on cooking would be wasted, if we did not show them how to cook, and let them cook to prove they know how."

## MANY OF THEM ARE TEACHING.

"Many of them are teaching, and helping in working out the mountain problem in that way. I can't imagine a school making for betterment that does not teach people what to do with their hands as well as their heads."

An interruption came: a bell was heard. It was bedtime, and as Miss Shirley passed out of the library in the darkness a light was lifted and the lantern showed the face of the young mountaineer who had herded the cattle a few hours ago. He had come to take his teacher over to the dormitory for the boys, which is a comfortable house across the terraced hill from the school building.

In another smaller building the smaller boys are quartered, with a teacher to look after them, and there is not an hour of the day or an hour of the night that the directors of the school, Mr. and Mrs. Ritchie, cannot direct their wonderfully trained family of mountain boys and girls.

There is need for more land and buildings there. Mountain boys and girls are asking to join the family every day, but there is no room for more. I can't believe that the door will be closed to them. Georgia's citizens must respond to the call from this great school in her highlands, where the life problem of a long neglected people is beginning to be solved.

"And then you must remember the principle of the work we do here," said this dignified, earnest young woman. "Through work we pay for our tuition here."

"I would not say for the character of the mountain boy or girl who would not do his or her part toward paying for anything he received. Then, what we learn here we can take back and impart to others, for with but few exceptions the girls who have studied here have gone back to the homes they came from and bettered them."

# ONLY ONE SEVENTH IS NOW RETURNED

## Judge Hart Declares Law, by Catching Tax Dodgers, May Cut Rate in Two—Growing Popular.

As a result of investigations made by him since he assumed the office of state tax commissioner, Judge John C. Hart declared yesterday that more than one-seventh of the taxable property of Georgia was on the tax rolls and that if the property were fairly returned, the state could catch up with her deficit of nearly one million dollars next year and also reduce the tax rate from 5 to 3 1/2 mills.

Judge Hart has recently been traveling over the state making speeches to educate the people on the importance of tax equalization and to explain to them the necessity of the new law. He has everywhere found audience eager to listen and generally open to conviction, despite the efforts that have been made by the enemies of the tax reform to prejudice the people against the law.

Law Growing More Popular. It is Judge Hart's opinion, gathered from his observation of the temper of the people in the course of the trial, that any attempt to make the repeal of the law would be a failure. He believes the people are beginning to understand the law, they are recognizing the necessity and the fairness of it, and they will have no regret with them. In a statement issued for the press yesterday, Judge Hart said:

The past week I traveled extensively in the state, visiting the counties of Clayton, Henry, Spalding, Pike, Meriwether, Wilkes, Hancock, Chattahoochee, Marion, Schley, Sumner, Chatham, Carroll and Campbell. MACON, Ga., October 17.—(Special.)—Though tomorrow is Sunday, Central City Park, the home of the Georgia state fair, will be anything but peaceful and quiet. 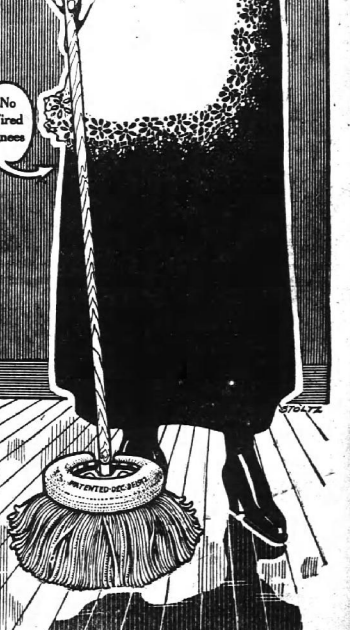

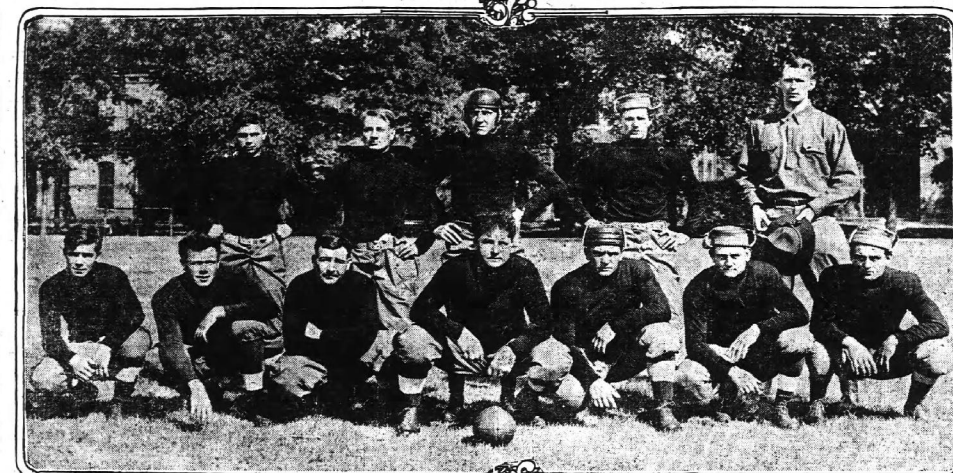

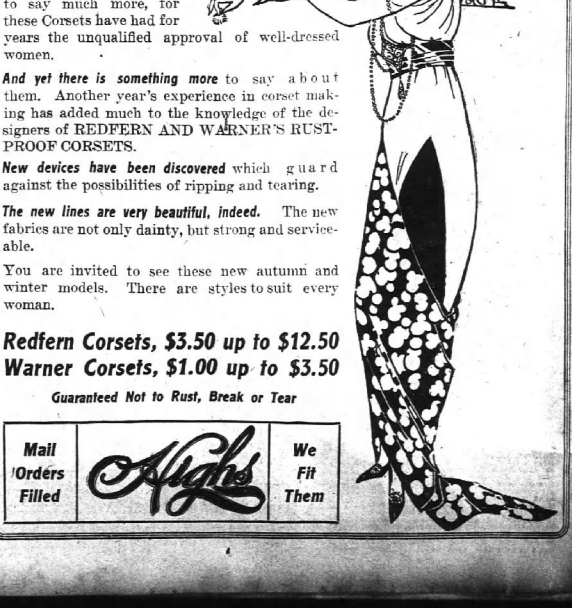

The Indiana game is being played a month earlier than usual, a change made necessary by the addition of Dartmouth to the Quakers' schedule.

From word to end there is hardly a doubt that the game between Pennsylvania and the Indiana will be a pretty strong one. The Indiana team was snapped by Harvard forward, but they are not overworking an equally strong line up and backward as they were in the previous year.

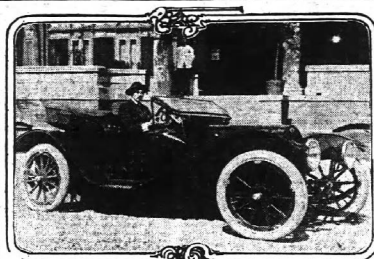

# Rabun Gap Industrial School Is Fine Example Of Present Educational Activity in This State

**What I Saw Boys Doing at This Magnificent Institution—How Andrew J. Ritchie Has Brought Theory and Action Together, and Has Shown Mountain Boy and Girl How to Live and How to Work.**

BY ISMA DOOLY.

The Rabun Gap industrial school, in Rabun county, Ga., is one of the finest examples of educational activity in the state. There is to be seen in the every day action of this school the real meaning of education—the education which relates the training of the boy and girl in the school to the life around him and her, and which brings both of them into direct usefulness to the life of the commonwealth and the nation.

There may be those who will question the entire accuracy of this statement, who will question how in that particular county of the state, where 20 per cent of the white population are illiterate, there could be produced an educational plant which represents the best word in rational educational method.

I unhesitatingly make this sweeping statement about the school, for I can prove in the simple story of a visit there what it represents, what it is doing, and what it proposes to do. Besides the facts which I can record, I have gained an inspiration which helps me, in having seen young mountain people in the school. I have seen in them a dignity and respect of attitude born, not of habitual bravado, but of an elemental racial force which yet will push through the handicap of their generations of isolation and win back for them the place once held in civilization by their Anglo-Saxon forefathers.

I know the common indictment against these mountain people. They make moonshine whisky and sell it; they are lawless in it; they are feudists in spirit; they kill; but they never stoop to lie, and they are never afraid to acknowledge their crimes.

## The Results of Isolation.

They face an enemy unflinchingly. They are not afraid of the law. Many of them are men of high character and noble spirit. They are not afraid to admit their faults and to seek to improve themselves. They are not afraid to work hard and to earn their own living. They are not afraid to stand up for their rights and to defend their honor.

## The Social Incident.

And there is, too, a reprehensible social incident of mountain life. It is the fact that in the mountain country, the girl is often sold into slavery. This is a practice which is being eradicated by the efforts of the industrial school and other organizations.

## Another Charge.

Another charge against the mountain people is that they are ignorant and backward. This is a charge which is being disproven by the success of the industrial school and the progress of the mountain people.

## A Time for Writers.

The mountain people of north Georgia, the Carolinas, Tennessee, Virginia and Kentucky, in their isolation, and in their spirit of adventure and their reformer and leader for the writer, have been exploited by fiction. Their life has been made into a story, and their name has been used to sell books.

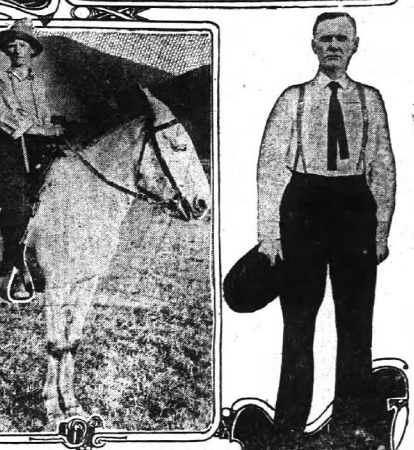
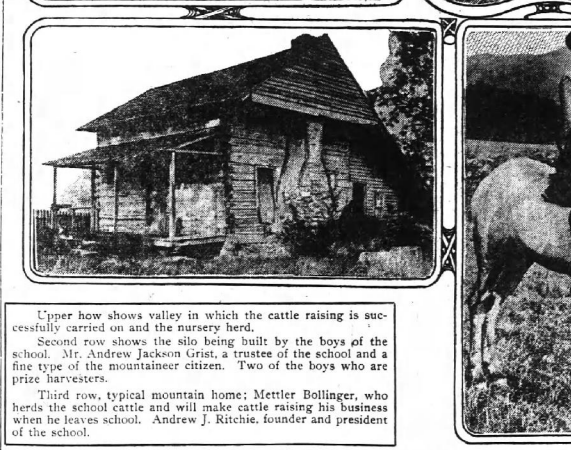
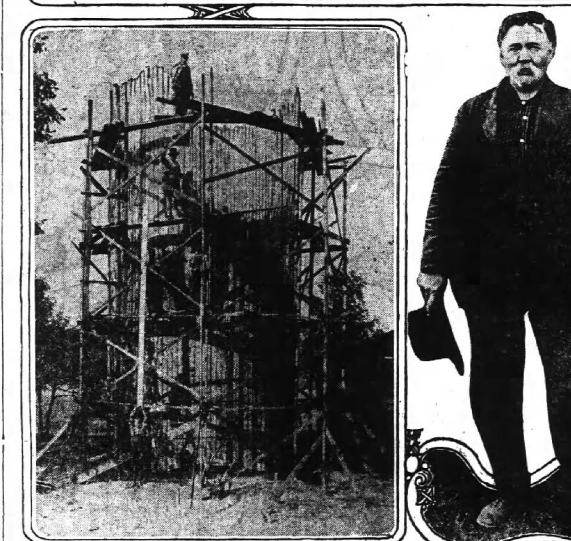
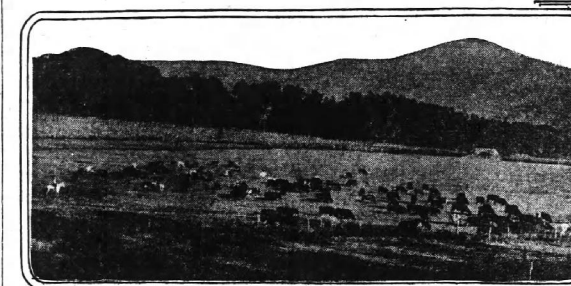
