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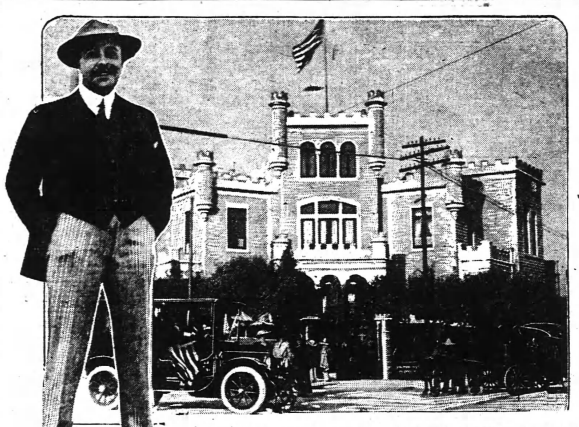

HEALTH DEPARTMENT KNOCKED IN REPORT

President Wilmer Moore re-
fuses to Give Out Russell
Sage Foundation Report.

A part of the report of the Russell Sage foundation survey of the health conditions of Atlanta made last summer, has been received by Wilmer L. Moore, president, which instituted this survey. Mr. Moore states that the report will be referred to the chamber of commerce committee on the social survey, of which R. L. Foreman is chairman, to be digested by it before its contents are made public.

Mr. Foreman stated Tuesday that he would not be able to give out this report for publication until it had been reviewed in its entirety. There remains yet another installment of the health report and a report on the school conditions in Atlanta which the Russell Sage foundation representative, Mr. Foreman, said that it is expected in a few weeks, and that its contents will be made public without waiting for the approval of the board of education.

Report Not Sensational.

Regarding the published statement that the health report is sensational, Mr. Foreman was much surprised, and stated that it was nothing sensational. He said that many people may be critical of this or that feature of the report, but that it is not a criticism of the city or the people, but if health conditions in Atlanta were as good as those reported, it would not be necessary to call attention to them.

Mr. Foreman declined to divulge any of the details of the report, but said that the Russell Sage foundation report in Atlanta will recommend a number of improvements, and that the city board, which will be called on to act on it, will be able to do so.

Mr. Moore himself would divulge nothing in regard to the report, but he said that the health conditions in Atlanta were as good as those reported, but that it was not a criticism of the city or the people, but if health conditions in Atlanta were as good as those reported, it would not be necessary to call attention to them.

Will Be Made Public.

This report and the report on school conditions will be made public in one report with a statement from the chamber of commerce committee after that committee has digested the reports.

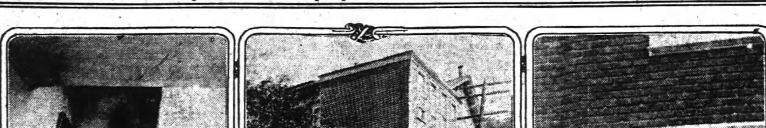

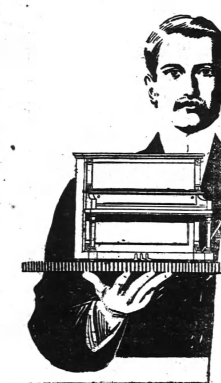

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EDUCATION BOARD NEEDS TOMORROW

Crowded Conditions in City's Schools Will Be Main Factor to Be Discussed at This Meeting.

No bigger preparations have been made for, and no more interest was ever manifested in a meeting of the board of education than that which attaches to the meeting to be held Thursday. The conditions existing in a number of the schools, which have been exposed by 'The Constitution,' have attracted the citizens of Atlanta into action, and a large delegation from various women's clubs, civic improvement leagues and other bodies will be on hand at the meeting to demand that some decided action be taken at once to relieve the situation.

Among those who have signified an intention of being present are a delegation from the ladies' board of visitors to the public schools, which latter organization presented a petition to council Monday afternoon, which latter petition was not read or acted upon. The petition was presented without a minister's consentation.

Great indignation manifested on the part of a large number of citizens for the reason that the requesters to the board, and of others, to the council asking for relief, have apparently been ignored, and these persons most positively assert that they will demand that Thursday's meeting some sort of a definite answer to their appeal.

The conditions existing in the schools in which it has been shown that a large number of young children are compelled to sit in basement rooms, with the poorest of ventilation, in some cases with noxious and deadly fumes from neighboring hotels, which destroy the delicate eye tissues of the youngsters, and in extreme instances, where the children are required to work out their studies by artificial light from small gas stoves which are entirely inadequate to properly light the rooms and which will, in time, destroy the delicate eye tissues of the youngsters, and any number of other fearful and barbaric conditions, have stirred the people to a realization of the peril threatening their children.

While members of the board differ in opinion as to what the best solution looking toward immediate relief may be, nearly all are in stating that something must be done at once, and wish to assure that they are doing all to do everything within their power to remedy the situation.
