

AGREEMENTER JOBS AT FREE SHOWS PLEA FOR CONVICTION BAR

Anthony Caminetti, Jr., Makes Passionate Plea to Jury to Acquit Brother of White Slavery Charge.

LOLA NORRIS ATTACKED AS UTTERLY UNMORAL

Accused Caminetti Told Jury That He Eloped With Lola Because He Was Afraid to Stay in Sacramento.

San Francisco, September 4.—The fate of F. Drew Caminetti, charged with white slavery, will rest in the hands of a jury by noon tomorrow.

As the defendant's counsel, his brother, put it to the jury, "this whole case has amounted down to a single issue—namely, what was the intent and purpose of the trip to Reno?"

"The whole evidence tends to show," he argued, "that the defendant left Sacramento because he feared impending arrest and acting in a panic he printed in the newspapers. No one but a man crazed by fear of arrest would have gone on that crazy trip—none but a lunatic."

"We do not claim that fright is a defense in crime, but when seeking a motive, the state must be satisfied," he added.

Paid for Labels Ticket. Theodore Roche, arguing for the government, said:

"The contention of the prosecution is not that Caminetti alone induced or caused the girls to leave Sacramento, but that he aided in inducing and enticing them."

"It was Caminetti himself, however, who suggested that the girls be taken to Reno together, to be joined later by Regis as himself, was he who gave Lola Norris \$100 for transportation. The main points of the prosecution have been established," he said.

"Agitation of crime is not a legal defense for the defendant. He might as well have admitted that he went to Reno instead of the drawing room to change no one's mind, to rent a bungalow in Reno for thirty days and live there with the girls."

Brother Pleads for Acquittal. Anthony Caminetti, Jr., unexpectedly appeared today as an advocate in his brother's defense. He was accompanied by his brother's attorney, but sat at counsel table with his brother's lawyer.

Dismantled buildings, uprooted trees, and communication indicate that the town of Bell Haven is wiped off the map, while Washington, N. C., not only suffered from the wind, but also heavily by floods. The loss in Beaufort county, in which Washington is located, will exceed \$2,000,000, it is estimated tonight.

5000 PEOPLE DROWN WHEN OCEAN RUSHES OVER OCRACOKE ISLE

Appalling Calamity Is Feared As a Result of the Fierce Hurricane Which Has Been Raging Along the Coast of North Carolina.

ALL ALONG THE COAST HURRICANE TOOK TOLL OF LIFE AND PROPERTY

But It Raged With Special Severity in Eastern North Carolina—Communication Is Cut Off, But There Is Little Hope That a Single Soul of the 5000 People on Ocracoke Island Escaped.

Raleigh, N. C., September 4.—A hurricane which swept the coast of North Carolina yesterday is reported to have done heavy damage. Morehead City, Beaufort, Newbern, Washington and dozens of smaller towns along the coast suffered great loss.

There is great apprehension that Ocracoke Island in Pamlico sound, has been swept and its inhabitants all drowned. Some 500 persons made their homes on the island. This belief is strengthened by the exceptionally high tides which prevailed in the sound.

All telegraph and telephone wires were prostrated by the storm, and nothing definite had been learned tonight regarding the fate of those who lived on Ocracoke Island.

Not a Living Soul. J. B. Blades, of Newbern, one of the state's leading lumber mill men, just back from Washington, N. C., declared tonight there is a feeling of certainty among those who have been swept and that not a living soul of the nearly 5000 people of the island escaped.

Washington the water was deep in the street, two railroad bridges, one a mile long, of the Norfolk Southern line, were washed away. Dockers, large warehouses, residences and a splendid public building were destroyed and three persons were reported dead.

In Newbern the water was several feet deep in the streets. A number of small vessels were sunk, public buildings destroyed, lumber mills badly damaged.

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HUERTA EFFACED PEACE EXPECTED TO COME TO MEXICO

President Wilson and Secretary Bryan Adopt Attitude That the Elimination of Huerta Is Assured.

FACTIONS IN MEXICO TO AGREE TO ARMISTICE

The Prompt Holding of Constitutional Election Is Expected—Lind to Remain in Mexico Indefinitely.

Vera Cruz, Mexico, September 4.—Prepared to play a role almost identical with that of John Lind, the personal representative of the president of the United States, Manuel Zamacoena, former ambassador at Washington, sent from here this afternoon on route to the American capital. Senor Zamacoena will take up the diplomatic end of the case at Washington for General Huerta and will act unofficially as the provisional president's representative with sufficient power to undertake negotiations.

It is believed that he will urge the necessity of more cordial cooperation between the two governments and even recognition in order that the best interests of both be considered. It is asserted that President Wilson will be assured of the good faith of General Huerta in refraining from becoming a candidate for the presidency and of the holding of the elections in October.

GEN. HUERTA OFFERS TO AID AMERICANS. Mexico City, September 4.—President Wilson's warning to Americans to leave Mexico has called forth a declaration of General Huerta in which he gives assurance of safety to Americans under any circumstances, even in case of intervention, and offers to afford protection, and offers to do this by sending to leave by air-aid to the United States, and making good the difference in the price of transportation and the cost of passage to which the refugees are subjected.

WILSON IS CONFIDENT HUERTA IS EFFACED. Washington, September 4.—President Wilson and Secretary Bryan have declared that the elimination of Victoriano Huerta from the presidential race in Mexico is assured. The president's confidence in the establishment of peace in Mexico has been strengthened by the assurance of the American embassy in Mexico that Huerta is willing to accept the terms of the American ultimatum.

This was the authoritative declaration today of administration officials. The official statement, charge d'affaires of the American embassy in Mexico, stated that Huerta's intention now is to be a candidate for the presidency in 1914.
