For the past two days many students have registered their attendance in advance, but the regular time is set for today.

GEORGIA CHAMBER
DRAWS UP RULES

Continued From Page One.

They also formed a line of march, and the music of the drum and bugle corps echoed through the streets during the early day. Since the Georgia Chamber of Commerce plans to accomplish big things it was the consensus of opinion of the meeting that everything should be done in a systematic and business-like manner. To this end a motion was made and unanimously carried authorizing the executive committee to proceed at the earliest possible moment to have the organization incorporated under the laws of the state of Georgia. The constitution and by-laws, adopted as a report of the special committee, will be incorporated in the petition for a charter. Such charters as may be not in compliance with the laws of Georgia will be altered by the executive committee which is given full authority to act in the place of the entire membership.

The main features of the constitution and by-laws follow:

The object of this organization shall be purely patriotic and shall be specifically to promote the agricultural, commercial and industrial welfare of the state and to improve the general social conditions of the state by fostering and promoting local organizations with the same general purposes in the various towns and counties of Georgia, by bringing about the co-operation of these local bodies and of all public-spirited citizens. Whether farmers, bankers, manufacturers, merchants, professional or business men, with the exception of the county, state and United States authorities, to state and especially along such lines as better educational facilities, better sanitary conditions, modern road-building, improved agricultural methods, greater interest in the marketing of raw materials, in law, truck, poultry and cattle-raising, and in the continuous development of the world of the attractions and resources of Georgia.

Membership of Chamber.
Among the sections of the constitution and by-laws better plainly than the inside workings of the organization are the following:

Section 1. Membership in this chamber shall include both individuals and other organizations existing for the purpose of promoting material state development.
Sec. 2. Any eligible white person shall be entitled to individual membership upon approval of the executive committee and the payment of an annual membership fee, each reduced to each local organization shall be in proportion to the representation of the county in which it is located in a three house of the Georgia legislature.

Each commercial club or other body affiliating with the Georgia Chamber of Commerce will be afforded an annual membership fee of 1/10 for each member of such local club or other body, which fee may be paid in November and May of each year, except that the minimum fee shall be \$10.

The officers of the chamber shall consist of a president, a first vice president, a second vice president, a third vice president, a secretary and a treasurer, all to be elected at large, and a fourth vice president, a secretary-manager and an executive committee of fifteen members.

A vice president of the chamber from each county in the state will be named by the executive committee whose duty it shall be first to confer with the various commercial organizations before making any selection.

Standing Committee.
The following standing committees shall be appointed by the executive committee at its annual meeting, viz: An auditing committee of five members, a committee on manufacturing and agriculture and farm life, of fifteen members, a committee on state products, a committee on education, a committee on law, and a committee on health and hygiene.
