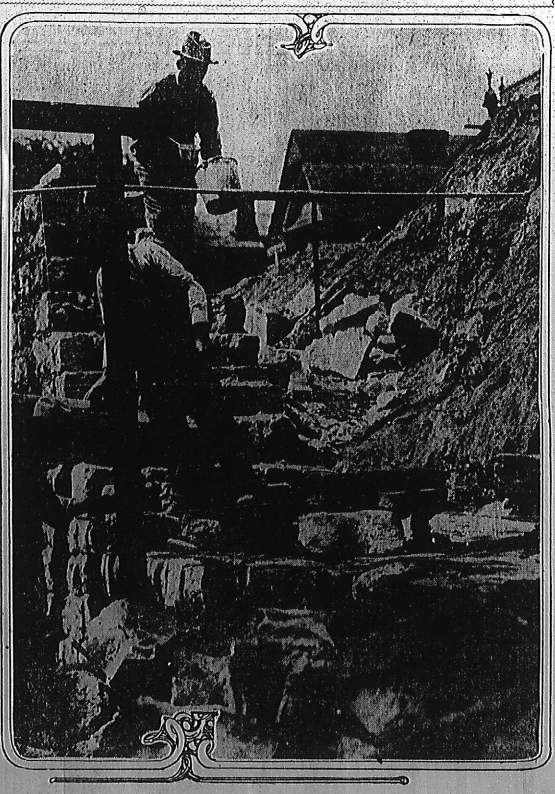

### SLADE IS CAUSTIC IN CRITICISM OF STATE MILITIA

Law Needed to Prevent Cowardly Shooting of Innocent Persons, He Declares.

Threats of Atlanta officers to resign from the Georgia National Guard should the bill pending before the Legislature providing for placing that body under the control of the civil authorities be adopted, drew sarcastic remarks from Representative John J. Slade, of Muscogee County, father of the bill, Wednesday morning.

Hall, in whose home at 141 Ponce DeLeon avenue, cause of the complaint is said to have arisen, signed two complaints, one consenting to move out of the neighborhood and the other agreeing not to bring suit for slander against the complainant.

Mrs. Hall's leave on the residence was secured from W. B. White, who returned to vacate on July 15.

The charges grew out of the conduct of Blythe and a wealthy woman who had engaged apartment at the Hall home, giving her name as Miss Myrtle Gilmer. It was asserted by the complainants that after Miss Gilmer came to live at the Ponce DeLeon address, Blythe at once began "valuing her" and taking her out for automobile rides and in other ways paying her marked attention.

Residents in the neighborhood became greatly incensed, especially following an altercation between Scio and a young visitor on the veranda.

Since that time Miss Gilmer apparently has disappeared.
