#### HOPE LES JUDGE ROY'S DOUBT

Attorney Says Supreme Court Decisions Make Retrial Obligatory Under Present Conditions.

Attorneys for Leo M. Frank Tuesday made the declaration that the Supreme Court of Georgia could avoid giving their client a new trial only by upsetting a well-established precedent and by reversing every Supreme Court decision which has borne on the trial judge's duty to set aside a verdict of guilty for which he is not convinced there was sufficient warrant.

"I am not venturing to predict what the Supreme Court will do in the matter," said Reuben R. Arnold, one of the counsel. "It seems to me, however, that the law is clear on this point. There is no escape from the fact that the Supreme Court repeatedly has ruled that the trial judge, if he is not fully satisfied that the evidence has demonstrated the guilt of the defendant, has no other course open than to order a new trial.

"We will not have to base our contention on an isolated case. The Georgia reports show that this exact point has been decided twice and again by the Supreme Court. In not one of the cases, I think, did the Supreme Court express any doubt of the guilt or innocence of the defendant as did Judge Roan in the present case."

#### Roan's Position Clear.

"Judge Roan went out of his way to make his mind in the matter perfectly clear. He mentioned that the case had given him much concern and worry—more than any other case which he had presided. He then made his important declaration that, although he had listened to the evidence and arguments for 20 days, he was not yet convinced of the man's innocence or guilt.

"The law, as interpreted by the Supreme Court, clearly has laid down the principle that the judge has responsibility in the matter and can not shift any portion of the burden onto the shoulders of the jury. Judge after judge virtually has been reprimanded for evading his duty in this respect."

#### Attorney Argued Mentioned a Number of Cases Illustrating His Point.

In the case of Livingston vs. Taylor, 132 Georgia, the Supreme Court enunciated the principle in these words, stating in part from a previous decision in the case of Rogers vs. the State, 151 Georgia.

"From the text of his order his honor seems to have been of the impression that if there was evidence to support the verdict he was not authorized to set it aside. This view is erroneous."

#### Gives Judge Discretion.

From this point the decision in the Rogers case is cited.

"The law confers upon the trial judge a discretion in granting or refusing a new trial in cases where the verdict is alleged to be contrary to evidence or without evidence to support it, and imposes upon them the duty of exercising this discretion. This court will not allow a conviction of a crime founded upon reliable, satisfactory and doubtful evidence to stand where the record discloses strong reason for believing that the judge below was not honestly fully satisfied with the findings of the jury."

In the Rogers case, the trial judge's remark in denying the new trial was "There probably being sufficient evidence to authorize the verdict of the jury, the motion is overruled and a new trial refused."

#### Mother Pleased Over Outcome of Battle to Get Children Into Atlanta Schools.

Little Ruth and Ollie Jung are busy Tuesday taking examinations at the Williams Street School to determine what grade they shall start in. Ruth, who is 11 years old, and Ollie, 7 years old, are the daughter and son of Joe Jung, a Chinaman, who is a Georgia woman.

The law which held the Chinese-American students out of the public white schools of Atlanta was removed Saturday by City Attorney J. M. Mason when he handed down a favorable decision in the case, which has been fought by the first Oriental citizen of Atlanta.

Mr. and Mrs. Jung have four children—Ruth, Ollie, Mary, who is 5 years old, and Loraine, a baby girl of 4 months.

"I don't like the public school as it is, and I don't want to go there," said little Ollie Monday after coming home from the Williams Street School.

#### Ollie Feels Whipping.

"Why not?" asked Mrs. Jung. In surprise, for Ollie had long wanted to attend the big school where her little playmates went each day.

"Cause the boys told me they were whippin' real often," said the dark-skinned boy, bending his head.

And Ruth says she doesn't like the big school either.

"There are too many boys and girls there, and they are all from the public schools. I am very proud of my children and there are none anywhere in Atlanta. I have not a cent in the world that I inherited from my father. I have a fond, loving father and a mighty good husband."

The family lives at 30-16 Scott street.

#### PREPARING TO REE AND GOVERNMENT'S SAFETY

#### BROWN WILL AGREE TO END SUIT

The long-drawn-out fight over the will of Julius Brown, brother of the former governor, disposing of an estate valued well above a million dollars, was ended Tuesday with an agreement among the contestants, ratified by Judge Ellis, of the Superior Court.

The agreement virtually upholds the will in its original form and puts 750 shares of stock in the Joseph M. Brown Company, worth about \$75,000, in the pocket of the executor, Joseph M. Brown, former governor.

Mrs. Mary V. Conroy brought the original suit. The agreement is an involved document. From a busy examination court officials said they figured that it gives Georgia Tech, one of the parties in the suit, about \$50,000.

Others who figured in the fight and who will share in the distribution of stock worth many thousands of dollars are George M. Brown, William A. Brown and Sally E. Brown.

The Brown will case is one of the most noted in the state's history and has been the subject of active legal agitation for a number of years.

Property in many states is involved. Julius Brown was an extensive land owner, but the entire estate was held up by the court battle.

#### Mother of John Eisels, 9, Killed by Car, Would Sue City as Negligent.

The pathetic death of John K. Eisels, Jr., the 9-year-old boy who was run over by an automobile driven by Robert Oakes, of No. 14 Gordon street, at the corner of Peachtree and Ivy streets Monday afternoon, caused his mother and a number of her women neighbors who came to her home as No. 43 Mills street Tuesday to console her, to bitterly denounce the police for their neglect of the children. But a few weeks ago a little girl was killed.

The families that live in this section, which is just two blocks from a pretentious part of West Peachtree street, are poor. They are not ashamed of the fact, but on account of it feel more keenly what they term total disregard on the part of the city.

Mrs. Elsie had been prostrated after the death of her little boy at St. Joseph's Infirmary Monday night. The good women of the neighborhood gathered at her home Tuesday to express their sympathy and help care for the smaller children.

#### Car's Career Death Trap.

Just at the time a reporter for The Georgian arrived at the home of J. H. Caldwell, father of the young man who had caused the accident, called to show his interest.

The woman, her eyes red and swollen from much crying, came into the little sitting room, and four little children collected about her knees.

"I don't blame your boy, although he may have been very careless," she began, and tears started flowing again. "I blame the police for permitting a death trap at that corner. Automobiles fly back and forth along there all day. From what I can learn there was no officer there yesterday afternoon when my little boy was killed on his way home from school."

My husband takes the same view of it. I wish with me here to tell you our side of the case.

Dispatches from Mexico City carry a denial from Charge d'Affaires O'Shaghnessy that he had presented any ultimatum to Huerta.

Huerta refused to discuss the subject with interviewers.

In diplomatic circles it is recognized that Secretary Bryan's denial mentions "ultimatum," but does not say that a note has been sent to Huerta.

Georgia militia is reported to be under orders for immediate call to service, and General Evans, who is on a vacation in Mississippi is reported to have received orders to rejoin his command at Fort McPherson to be ready for movement of troops.

#### Gen. Evans Reported Recalled

It was reported on apparently reliable authority Tuesday that the Georgia militia, in common with the National Guard in more than a score of States, was being equipped for service in Mexico by the Government to be in readiness for immediate service.

Trains and ambulances have been ordered and instructions given to keep the national guardmen up to top notch, according to these reports. The War Department is prepared to move an immense detachment of militia from Georgia and neighboring states.

The same report had it that General Evans, who left for a hunting trip in Mississippi, had been recalled in the expectation that men of the Second Brigade would soon be given marching orders.

#### Huerta Bitterly Assails U. S.

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 4.—General Huerta will ignore, for the time being at least, the demand of the United States that he resign from the Presidency made last Sunday, but just learned of the public. His future action will depend on the outcome of conferences which he will hold with members of the diplomatic corps. The first of these took place at the National Palace last night while troops guarded entrance to the structure. None of the diplomats who took part would discuss the meeting to-day.

It is said that he made a bitter attack on the American government, declaring that his every effort had been hampered from the beginning of his administration by Washington officials, and that had it not been for their interference he would have been able to secure a loan large enough to establish the financial stability of his government.

She brought her family here three days ago, immediately after her husband's death. She has recently been employed as a bookkeeper by the Western Union Telegraph Company.

TAMMANY FIGHT NOT TO END 4-1 ON FUSION

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—John Purroy Mitchell, the Fusion candidate for Mayor, became a four-to-one favorite in the betting on the curb at noon today over Edward J. McCall, Tammany candidate. This is the first time in the history of New York that odds on a Mayorial election have reached that figure.

Referring to the Frank trial, which provoked this discussion, it was freely predicted before the trial that it would perhaps take days to secure a jury, and doubt was even expressed whether a jury could be impounded at all in Fulton County to try the case.

It is not sufficient to select a jury only a few hours were consumed. This may have occasioned some surprise to the layman, but to the practitioner it is only what might have been expected.

How different from the rule in other States, where the impounding of a jury often takes as long as the main trial. In the Tim case, the McNamara case and other noted cases of recent years, it will be recalled that it took weeks to select a jury. To us, with our simple and easy method of impounding a jury, it would seem that a system which allows the examination of a juror for hours or days would serve no good purpose, and instar an expense altogether unnecessary.

It is hardly conceivable that anyone who reads page after page in the papers for days about a case would not form an opinion as to the guilt or innocence of an accused, and yet such an opinion does not classify him as a juror.

JUDGE HILL WRITES A SPLENDID EDITORIAL That All the People Should Read, Study, and Try to Remember

Judge Benjamin H. Hill's letter addressed to Governor Slaton is so able, timely and carefully thought out that we republish it in its entirety to-day in these columns. It is a SPLENDID EDITORIAL—the best perhaps that has appeared in The Georgian in many a day.

The capitalized words are ours. We wish to emphasize them, and we ask our readers to study them and try to grasp their full meaning.

JUDGE HILL'S LETTER:

His Excellency, John M. Slaton, Governor, Atlanta, Ga. My Dear Governor Slaton:

I cannot content myself with merely a formal expression of appreciation of the honor conferred upon me in my appointment as one of the judges of the Superior Court. The honor is all the more valued because it comes from one who, in his own career, has so well illustrated the loftiest ideals of a noble profession, and who has on frequent occasions publicly expressed his high conception of the character and dignity of the judicial office. I trust that it will not be inappropriate for me to state to you as the alter ego of the people of the State the reasons impelling me to give up the high judicial position to which they have so recently re-elected me, without opposition, for a term of six years.

Firstly, there are less responsibility, less work, more compensation, and a closer association with members of the Atlanta bar, to whom I am so great a debtor. To a JUDGE WITH A CONSCIENCE, THE ULTIMATE EXHAUSTION RESULTING FROM A MAN'S LIBERTY, REPUTATION AND PROPERTY IS ATTACHED WITH FEARSOME ANXIETY. THE POSSIBILITY OF ERROR IS A CONSTANT AND HARASSING ANXIETY TO DEGRADE AND CONTENTMENT. I do not mean in any degree to minimize the responsibility of a judge of a trial court, for in my opinion the office of Judge of the Superior Court is in some respects the most important in the State. If, however, the Judge of the Superior Court is in some respects, he can confidently and happily rely upon the Supreme Court or the Courts of Appeals to correct his error. Not so with the Judge of a court of last resort. His error is final.

The work of the Court of Appeals heavy in the beginning, has rapidly and greatly increased, and now it takes the physical endurance and mental ability of the Judges and leaves no time for leisure or recreation. Since the organization of the court January 1st, 1917, nearly six hundred cases have been determined, the opinions filling thirteen volumes. All these cases have been decided, and on Monday the court will face a clear docket. From data obtained from the clerks of the court, it has been ascertained that the average salary paid to the Judges of courts of last resort of the different States, the number of cases which come annually to the Supreme Court and the Court of Appeals largely exceeds any other court of last resort in the United States. This is not due to any exceptional litigation of Georgia, but is attributable to the fact that there is in Georgia no attention whatever on the part of appeal, and any case, no matter how small the amount involved, can be taken on a party's affidavit to either the Supreme Court or the Court of Appeals. From the same source of information it appears that the average salary paid to the Judges of courts of last resort of the different States of this Union is about a year, and the States of equal wealth and population with the State of Georgia pay to the Judges of their courts of last resort salaries of from \$2000 to \$10,000 per annum, the latter the former I do not say this with the hope that

Let's that a splendid letter! It is the platform of a just judge and an honest man; one who has never compromised conscience with cowardice, who knows the law, who is unafraid, and who will interpret the law, and enforce it.

We are glad Judge Hill has written this letter. It is a great pleasure for us to publish it here. It clears the atmosphere, it is an inspiration to those who believe in law and order, and an announcement to evil doers that they will get JUSTICE—no more, no less—from a fearless man when neither blatant lawyers nor browbeat, mobs intimidate, nor the maudlin sympathy of the community turn from the path of duty.

It may be of some service to readily understood, overworked and faithful public servants. I have the Court of Appeals with me, and in addition, I have become attached to the work of the court, and I have enjoyed and been greatly benefited by collaboration with my able and conscientious associates.

In going on the trial bench I shall endeavor ever to bear in mind the characterization of the "Ideal Judge" as given in the old Virginia Code: "HE SHOULD BE BENEVOLENT AND CLEAR OF SPIRIT, READY IN WEIGHTED EVIDENCE, BE THY AND WHATEVER PROCEEDINGS FROM THE COURSE OF THE LAW MAY AT ONCE IMPROVE ALL HEARERS THAT IT IS CHARACTERIZED BY NEUTRALITY, IMPARTIALITY, THE JUDGE SHOULD BE FREE OF PERFECTION, FIRM OF PURPOSE, CLEAR IN JUDGMENT, LIBERAL IN THE APPLICATION OF PENALTIES, ASSIDUOUS IN THE PRACTICE OF MERCY, EXPERIENCED IN THE ADMINISTRATION OF THE INNOCENT, AND CRIMINALS, CHARITABLE OF THE RIGHTS OF THE POOR, AND SHOULD AVOID ALL APPEARANCE OF PARTIALITY."

All of us are, at least, emulated the kindly attributes enumerated. Even in this enlightened age I doubt if anything of substance can be added to what has been said. If I SHOULD ATTEMPT ANY ADDITION, IT WOULD BE THAT THE JUDGE IN THE TRIAL OF CASES SHOULD NEVER ASSUME THE ROLE OF PROSECUTOR, NOR INVADE THE SACRED PRINCIPLES OF THE JURY BOX, AND WHILE ENFORCING THE LAW, SHOULD ALSO PROTECT AND PRESERVE THE TRIABLE RIGHTS OF THE CITIZEN TO PERSONAL LIBERTY, PERSONAL SECURITY AND PRIVATE PROPERTY GUARANTEED BY THE CONSTITUTION.

In my duty walk through the corridors of the Capitol to my place of labor, I have been cheered by the marble memorial to my father, erected by the loving contributions of the people who have served. In my new field of public service it will be my happy privilege to find daily strength for useful endeavor from a like inspiration.

Jury Trials in Georgia

Editor The Georgian: Replying to the suggestion contained in your recent editorial, relative to jury trials, permitting subscribers to a discussion of the subject, I desire to make a few comments.

Mr. Atkinson, in his very able and timely article, called attention to the few searching questions which are put to jurors in felony cases. It would seem that a juror who would qualify on the voir dire (as it is spoken of by the profession) would be a fit person in every respect to act in that high capacity of deciding on the testimony admitted on the trial? Haven't it happened that many persons accused of crime have been acquitted or convicted mainly on account of a juror's private knowledge of the man or the case? Those who have had to do with the courts know that this is true. But it may be said to reply that the constitution "thou shalt not have any bias or prejudice resting on your mind for or against the prisoner" would thoroughly test the juror's impartiality. Does it? How few of us are willing to admit that we are prejudiced? Do we ever think that we are? It is not true that the more prejudiced a person is the less willing he is to admit it.

I do not subscribe to the view, so often expressed in print, that there is something radically wrong with our jury. I believe that, in Georgia, the jury is as good as it is in any other State. Compare the happening of a jury in Georgia with other States; compare the record of the higher courts of review, where by law cases must be decided within a limited time, with other States, where it takes years, perhaps, for a case to be reached in its order. Neither do our reviewing courts reverse cases on technicalities where substantial justice has been done. This is the law, and this is the result we have achieved by our jury. As a whole, we should be proud of our judicial system. There is little to complain about, and it is far superior to others. It is not perfect. It cannot be. As pointed out by Mr. Atkinson, the jealousy guards the purity of the jury in all its stages, and when imperfections exist, are due more to the defects of human nature than to weakness in our law. It is doubtful whether any change would be advisable even in remodeling a jury. This article is written rather to call attention to the simple expedient way a juror is selected in Georgia, compared with the cumbersome and tedious process of other States.
