Huerta Bitterly Assails U. S.

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 4.—General Huerta will ignore for the time being at least, the demand of the United States that he resign from the Presidency made last Sunday, but just learned by the public. His future action will depend on the outcome of conferences which he will hold with members of the diplomatic corps.

The first of these took place at the National Palace last night while troops guarded entrance to the structure. None of the diplomats who took part would discuss the meeting to-day.

It is reported, however, that Huerta made a long address to the foreign envoys, told them of the steps he was taking to restore peace in Mexico and pledged himself to establish tranquility in the republic if he could have their support. It is said that he made a bitter attack on the American government, declaring that his every effort had been hampered from the beginning of his administration by Washington officials, and that he had not been for their interference he would have been able to secure a loan large enough to establish the financial stability of his government.

Strong aid for international support, but no matter what the outcome may be, it is expected that his answer will be a complete defiance of the American demand. He has a strong hope of securing support from other powers but if this fails he is expected to “go it alone” and lead the Mexicans away in person against any invaders.

Overwhelming Defeat for Murphy

ELECTION FACTS

John Purroy Mitchell, fusion nominee, elected Mayor of New York by about 100,000 pluralities. Tammany Hall completely overthrown. Republicans will control the next New York Legislature. Governor Sulzer and possibly fifteen other progressives elected to New York Assembly. The following Governors were elected: Wald, Democrat, Massachusetts; Fielder, Democrat, New Jersey; Stuart, Democrat, Virginia. Republicans defeated fusion nominees in Philadelphia. Democrats swept Indiana. Democrats will control next New Jersey Legislature. Fusionists made poor showing among the social movements and radical platforms. State Senator Blair Lee, Democrat, elected U. S. Senator in Maryland to fill late Senator Underhill's term. Illinois women in many towns voted out liquor. Lane Socialist administration in Kentucky, N. Y., repudiated. Mitchell returns indicate that Ferguson's compensation act bill providing for sterilization of criminals is adopted by referendum vote in Oregon.

CHIEF OPENS FIGHT FOR CHILDREN

Urges Parents to Help Police in
Eliminating Danger in
the Streets.

Chief of Police Beavers, taking notice of the criticism that has been heaped on his department for its failure to prevent the many automobile accidents in the city, replied Wednesday by an emphatic appeal to the parents of Atlanta to caution and instruct their children in the exercise of more care in crossing the streets at congested places. "The parents have a part in the protection of their children," he said. "They can be of invaluable aid to the police department and at the same time do much to safeguard the lives of their own children if they only will warn them of the dangers that lurk in the crowded streets and instruct them in the proper manner to cross from one side to another. "The department is doing its utmost to warn the men at its command to render the crossing and thoroughfare of the city safe to pedestrians and to vehicles. We have them at every congested crossing possible. We have men, wherever possible, at every school in the city. If we do not have a man stationed at a school house it is because we have not one available. "Children should be instructed by their parents not to run hither and yon across the street in front of automobiles and trams and carriages. If the proper degree of caution were used these shocking accidents seldom would occur. "Every policeman has rigid instructions to enforce the letter and spirit of the traffic ordinance. We intend relentlessly to pursue the speed maniac until we have contained all or part of his kind as the law provides. We are not going to let up in our war in the least but we want the assistance and co-operation of the parents and believe we are entitled to it. "The department is doing all it can with the policemen at its disposal. When we get more men we can police the dangerous crossings more effectively. In the meantime it is up to the parents to co-operate with the department by instructing their children to use at least the ordinary precautions."

DIPLOMAT ARRANGES CONFERENCE TO-DAY WITH U. S. DIPLOMAT

Special Cable to The Atlanta Georgian. MEXICO CITY, Nov. 5.—General Huerta will receive Nelson O'Shaughnessy, the American charge d'affaires, at the National Palace late to-day. It is expected that at that time the Mexican dictator will set forth his position as to his future policy. A feeling of intense expectancy was aroused when it was learned that O'Shaughnessy was going to the palace. He refused to discuss his mission or even admit that arrangements for the conference had been made but the government officials declared it would take place without fail. It is probable that no announcement will be made here after the meeting, but that its result will be given out at Washington. There is no doubt that the conference is a direct result of pressure from the American capital that Huerta explain his position. Despatches from Vera Cruz say that John Lind, the special envoy sent to Mexico by President Wilson, expects the situation involving Mexico and the United States to come to a head within a very short time. These were followed by reports that Mr. Lind had been communicating directly with the Huerta government without consulting O'Shaughnessy.

The great organ boomed in the Sacred Heart Church Wednesday and Father Guzman began the mass while down in the aisle, before the central altar, and flanked with tall tapers, stood the little flower-covered casket of John Eisele.

And outside the church, just over in Peachtree street, the motor cars flashed back and forth in the morning sun, with no hint of their swift flight that one of their kind had struck the life out of the little boy two days ago.

The big church was crowded. Two hundred and fifty children from the parochial school, next door, John's classmates and all the people from the first through the ninth grades—sat with the sisters, their teachers, in decorous files in the high-backed pews.

Children Show Grief.

The small faces were very solemn in John's class, near the front, there was weeping among the little girls and furtive dab of handkerchiefs at the eyes of little boys.

The mass proceeded. Eisele's voice in the choir mingled with the mellow thunder of the organ. The congregation sang or stood or sat in the vestry, and came through the window where the little boy, Christ, stood teaching himself steadily.

Then the funeral procession moved away slowly toward the cemetery. And one by one the sisters marshaled their classes and marched them in double file back across the campus to their school.

And out in Peachtree street, past the death corner, the motor cars dashed merrily by in the sun light.

However, it is known that the possession of the statements of Hawthorne's ex-convicts at the prison who has followed Hawthorne's lead in making accusations against the Atlanta institution's warden.

More Than Dozen Charges. The accusations include the starvation of prisoners, inhumanity and general maladministration by Meyer. More than a dozen men, besides Hawthorne and his companion, Dr. W. J. Johnston, the best New York physician, made charges to this effect.

Miss Lula Upchurch Takes Acid, Hoping to "Find Something Better in Unknown."

Life seemed to be offering a narrow and futureless road to Miss Lula Upchurch, 20 years old, of No. 319 White street. And so Tuesday morning she was seen to dash by her own hand, in the hope of "finding something better on the other side."

At 8 o'clock Miss Upchurch drove rapidly east at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Upchurch. A few minutes later her mother came to call her and found her lying across her bed.

"Are you sick?" she was asked.

"No, I have all right," was the reply. And that was all she said. She became unconscious, and died just after reaching the Central Hospital.

"Her health has been bad," the father said. "When she was 4 years old she suffered a stroke of paralysis, and she never has been well since."

And then, three weeks ago, her brother, Oscar, was taken to the hospital and operated on for appendicitis. Mrs. Upchurch said: "Lula seemed to brood over that terribly. He got along all right, and we had good news from him every day. But she just got so she wouldn't speak to anybody except the members of the family and not much to them. When visitors came in the house she would turn away from them and go to her own room. I tried to get her to leave some, because I knew she was brooding and in low spirits."

Even after the brother came home, a few days ago, she never spoke to her hospital experience. Miss Upchurch showed her settled melancholy. "She was much in life for her," she said.

The father and mother survive, with six brothers, Oscar, James, Phillip, Jake and Paul, and a sister Mrs. Nathan Newman.

JUDGE'S WORDS GIVE LEO FRANK NEW HOPE

Attorneys Hold That Roan's Expression Doubt Will Make Rehearing Assured.

Attorneys for Leo M. Frank Tuesday made the declaration that the Supreme Court of Georgia could avoid giving their client a new trial only by upsetting a well-established precedent and by reversing every Supreme Court decision which has borne on the trial judge's duty to set aside a verdict of guilty for which he is not convinced there is sufficient evidence.

"I am not venturing to predict what the Supreme Court will do in the matter," said Beuther E. Arnold, one of the counsel. "It seems to me, however, that the law is clear on this point. There is no escape from the fact that the Supreme Court repeatedly has ruled that the trial judge, if he is not fully satisfied that the evidence has demonstrated the guilt of the defendant, has no other course open than to order a new trial."

"Leo will not have to have our attention on an isolated case. The Georgia reports show that this exact point has been decided, again and again, by the Supreme Court. In not one of the cases, I think, did the presiding judge so strongly express his doubt of the guilt or innocence of the defendant as did Judge Roan in respect to Leo Frank."

Roan's Position Clear.

"Judge Roan went out of his way to make his stand in the matter perfectly clear," he continued. "In every case had given him much concern and worry, more than in any other case ever which he had presided. He then made his important declaration that, although he had listened to the evidence and arguments for 30 days, he was not yet convinced of the man's innocence or guilt."

The law, as interpreted by the Supreme Court, clearly lays down the principle that the judge has responsibility in the matter and can not shift some of the burden onto the shoulders of the jurors. Judge after judge virtually has been expiated for evading his duty in this respect."

Attorney Arnold made a number of cases illustrating his point. In the case of *Loring v. The State*, in Georgia, the Supreme Court enunciated the principle in these words, quoting in part from a previous decision in the case of *Rogers v. The State*, 111 Georgia 311:

"From the tenor of his order his honor seems to have been of the impression that if there was evidence to support the verdict he was not authorized to set it aside. This view is incorrect."

Give Judge Discretion.

"From this point the decision in the *Rogers* case is cited:

"The law confers upon trial judges a discretion in granting or refusing a new trial in cases where the verdict is alleged to be contrary to evidence. It is not the duty of the court to affirm it, and it imposes upon the judge the duty to give a new trial when the record discloses sufficient reason for believing that the judge below was not himself fully satisfied with the findings of the jury."

In the present case, the trial judge's remark, "saying the new trial was 'There is no hope for the man, unless the evidence'—authorizes the verdict of the jury. The motion is overruled and a new trial refused."

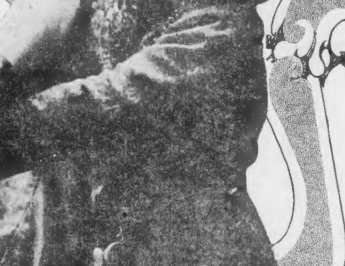

Mrs. Harriman's Effort to Develop and Encourage American Workers.

It Sets a Good Example to MEN with Money. Better Develop ONE American of Ability Than Enrich the Foreign Art Dealers.

E. H. Harriman left one of the biggest fortunes and one of the shortest wills on record. He had collected in his lifetime, through his extraordinary genius for organization and constructive work, a great network of railroads. He was on the way to be the most powerful man in the country when death ended his labors.

It should interest Americans, especially those who make a specialty of spending their money abroad, and who believe that buying old stuff proves good taste, to learn one particular thing about the widow to whom Mr. Harriman left his fortune and his affairs.

ALL OF THE MONEY THAT SHE SPENDS IS SPENT IN AMERICA TO ENCOURAGE AMERICAN WORK AND DEVELOP AMERICAN RESOURCES. Harriman gathered together a good many tens of millions of American money in his short life. His widow is spending the money WHERE HE MADE IT.

When Mrs. Harriman wants art work done she hires an American artist.

When she builds a house, she doesn't tear down fireplaces in Europe, or pull the bricks and bolts off the doors of old convents, or have somebody to sell the inside of a church.

She instructs American architects to find American workmen, American artists, sculptors and others, capable of doing the work that she wants done.

Mrs. Harriman probably knows that this is not by any means "an art age" in America. She is well aware that nobody living either in this country or abroad can do the work that was done in the days of Francis the First.

But she knows also that the work of such men as Michael Angelo, Benvenuto, Leonardo and others would never have been done had not those who possessed money combined with that money sufficient patriotism to encourage the workers of their own land.

The idea that a thing must be OLD in order to be GOOD is not a new or an American idea.

When Michael Angelo was young he chiseled out a piece of sculpture, imitating the ancient Greek style, buried it in the ground and let it get reasonably used and changed in appearance. Then he sent it to a rich Cardinal in Rome fond of antiques.

The Cardinal was delighted and wanted to know where Michael Angelo had done his digging. The artist replied that he could dig up as many of those statues as the Cardinal desired—as he was able to make them in any quantity and better things more modern.

Fortunately the Cardinal was good natured, and could see real merit, and he helped the young artist.

When the Pope wanted his own statue made, and the great church of St. Peter built, he did not hire some one to imitate the Greek style of sculpture or copy a Greek temple.

He let Michael Angelo make the statue, build the great dome, and do the wonderful painting in the Sistine Chapel. The paintings in that chapel are worth all the other paintings in the world.

That was the culmination of the genius of a great nation, Italy's greatness in that age was due to the fact that those who preceded Michael Angelo and his day were willing to encourage their own countrymen.

(It may interest you to know that the older Medici, whose son did so much for his country's art, was almost the exact image of our John D. Rockefeller.)

It isn't likely that Mrs. Harriman will live to see any great outburst of genius in American art. 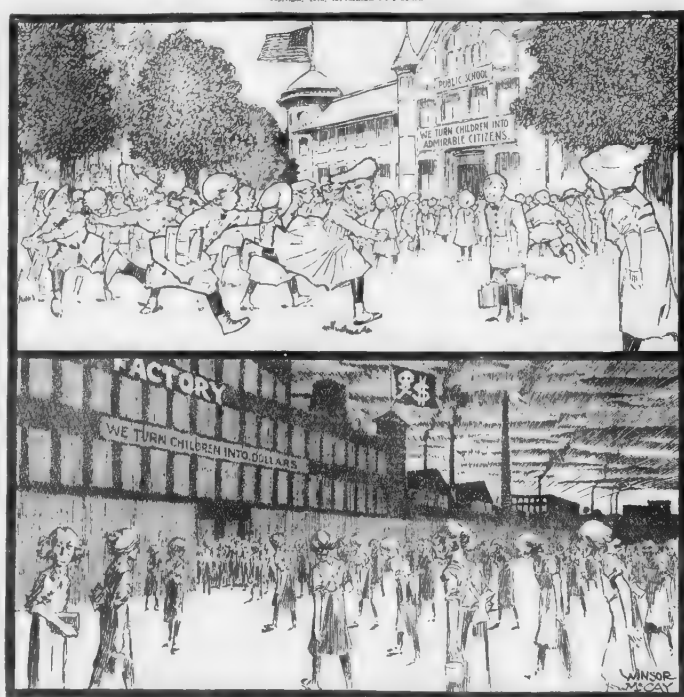

THE other day a woman from Kansas spent a few hours at East Aurora, having dropped in on her way home from an excursion to Niagara Falls.

This woman was a widow six years ago with a brood of seven youngsters, the oldest one fifteen.

At the time her husband passed away I remember sending her a letter of sympathy and condolence. I thought of how hard and difficult her position in life was, and I expressed my feelings in good conventional English book stuff.

But when I met the lady the other day I did not waste any of the lachrymose on her case. She informed me, in the course of a little talk that her oldest son was manager of an elevator at fifteen hundred a year, and the oldest daughter was teaching school and drawing fifty dollars a month.

Then the lady went on to tell us she had just sold five carloads of steers that netted her in Chicago an even money dollar a head.

There were sixteen steers in a carload, which makes eighty head in all.

The amount of good mamma this woman received, after deducting freight, was a little over seven thousand dollars.

She told us that she was raising cattle with the intention of making a hundred head a year.

She also was raising hogs so as to send to the packers about three or four hundred head. These at present prices would bring at least twenty dollar a head. And she has cleaned up the mortgage since her husband's death.

Women's Struggle

From EDWIN MARKHAM

HERMAN SCHNEIDER, in a translation from the German published by Doran, presents a thoughtful study of the movement for women's rights by the well-known European writer, Rosa Mayreder. From one of his chapters I note these suggestive thoughts:

"It is undeniable that there are women who go far beyond the average in regard to intellect and strength of character, and many who are well qualified for careers and occupations other than those customary to the sex.

"There are many—but are these women who go far beyond the average in regard to intellect and strength of character, and many who are well qualified for careers and occupations other than those customary to the sex.

"All periods of the world's history have been women's who have succeeded or even the majority of men in intelligence and energy; yet they have not been able to alter the social position of their sex either in the matter of the law or in regard to standards of opinion.

"They were exceptions, and have been treated as such. They were exceptional—that is to say, they were not specimens of a new line of development, they were not pioneers opening out new routes for a future generation to follow and develop; they had no successors.

"The battle between the normal majority and the individual deviating from the normal and striving to break down its tyranny goes down deep into the constitution of society; and the progress is nothing less than the organic evolution of civilization.

"There are some who will have nothing to do with external reality; they will not obey the traditional code of laws, but will listen only to the dictates of their own nature. The destiny of such individuals varies according to the force of their personality, irrespective of their field of intellectual activity.

"Such men are in truth martyrs in the cause of humanity. To them we owe every forward step in the progress of the race from the coldest and most brutish to the noblest and loftiest civilization. And when a people ceases to privilege such individuals it sinks into stagnation or stagnation; the power of development dies away.

"This conflict between the two movements is a symptom of degeneration.

"So long as the feminist movement was entirely revolutionary, women were right in directing their energies not against average humanity in general, but against their active Philistine opponents in particular. They could repudiate the type of humanity and regard it as their enemy so far as female problems were concerned.
