## AGGRIEVED TO FACE MOVER AT INQUIRY

R. V. La Dow, of Washington, Sent by McReynolds to Gift Hawthorne Charges.

Investigation of the charges of unfair conditions at the Federal Prison under the administration of William Moyer, as revealed by Julian Hawthorne, the noted writer, and others, was actively begun Wednesday with the arrival of R. V. La Dow, of Washington, Superintendent of Government Prisons.

The government official has taken up his headquarters at the prison and will make thorough probe into conditions that what facts he will use in pushing his investigation were not revealed. However, it is known that he has possession of the statements of practically every ex-convict of the prison who has followed Hawthorne's lead in making accusations against the Atlanta institution's warden.

New Than Doan Charge.

The accusations include the starvation of prisoners, inhumanity and general maladministration by Moyer. More than a dozen inmates Hawthorne and his companion, Dr. W. J. Merton, the New York physician, have made charges to this effect.

Superintendent La Dow spent Wednesday in a general inspection tour of the prison and its grounds, accompanied by Attorney General McReynolds. His report will be withheld from the public until he has submitted it to Attorney General McReynolds. It is thought likely, however, the prison officials will not resist his investigation until he has come to the rock bottom of the allegations.

In the course of his probe it is believed that La Dow will summon the various men who have made charges against Moyer and examine them personally. There is a probability that they will be brought to the prison to point out its alleged shortcomings.

Most recent of the charges buried at the Government institution were those made public by Fayette R. Satter, who was released last Saturday after serving fifteen years for a murder of which he was innocent.

Satter reiterated charges.

From his home in Mobile, Ala., where Satter arrived Tuesday night, he reiterated his accusations, surrounded by his wife and family.

Satter's conviction was obtained on the testimony of a man whose mind afterward was proved to have been unbalanced at the time of the trial. His final release by a pardon from President Wilson was wrought through a remarkable chain of circumstances which ended in the mother of the crazed man making an affidavit that her son had suffered from an hallucination and had carried it through on the witness stand, convincing Satter as his murderer.

An abolitionist had been instituted immediately by friends of the convicted man, and Satter was released forthwith and Monday left Atlanta for his home, not, however, before he had given out a statement corroborating the charges of Hawthorne. At his home later he reiterated his statements.

"To see how long a human being can exist on nothing save how small he could he can make the bed bill in the object of Warden Griggs," said Satter.

"Just because I wrote a note to a guard in the penitentiary asking that he be tried and released in the fall, when he had been kind to the men, I was chained to the wall for 24 hours with my face against the rocks, and during that time was

These were followed by reports that Mr. Lind had been communicating directly with the Huerta Government without consulting O'Shaughnessy.

## Battleships Command Ports

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—On receipt of a wireless message from Admiral Fletcher, commanding the second division of the Atlantic fleet in Mexican waters, that the third division of the fleet has arrived off Vera Cruz, Secretary of the Navy Daniels today instructed Admiral Fletcher not to move any of his ships until he received orders from Washington.

It was understood when the third division sailed for Mexico that it would relieve the second division, and that the latter would start home at once.

The Louisiana, Michigan, Rhode Island, New Jersey and Virginia are anchored off Vera Cruz out of range of land batteries because of such a position that they could shell the city without being swept by any projectiles from the Mexican forts. The Nebraska and New Hampshire carry a full complement of marines, and can make a large landing force of sailors if necessary.

Victory for Rail Lines Will Mean Blow to Shoe Industry Here, Declare Experts.

By retaining the 35-cent rate on shoes and shoes coming to Atlanta from New York and Boston, which was fixed two years ago by the Interstate Commerce Commission, Atlanta will become one of the greatest shoe centers in the world," said Harry T. New, traffic manager of the Atlanta High Bureau, Thursday.

"We are going to make a desperate effort to keep the commission from permitting the railroads to increase the rate," he said.

Mr. Moore Thursday took an afternoon in the fight of the boot and shoe merchants of Atlanta against the raising of rates on boots and shoes by the railroads. The testimony of shoe merchants and of the railroads representatives was heard in the chambers of the Court of Appeals by Judge Kramer, T. C. Mackley, of the Interstate Commerce Commission.

Testimony Here Finished.

The testimony was finished Thursday afternoon and the commission adjourned. Arguments will be heard in Washington in 90 days.

The railroads contend that boots and shoes should be rated as freight freight instead of a commodity, and to advance the rate from 35 cents to 50 cents.

The outcome of the fight will determine either a reduction or a raise in the price of shoes to the general public.

In 1910 the Interstate Commerce Commission ruled that railroads would transport boots and shoes from New York and Boston to Atlanta at a rate of 65 cents per 100 pounds. Since the expiration of this rule some months ago, the railroads have boosted the rate to 75 cents.

Will Raise Price of Shoes.

Atlanta shoe companies declare that unless this rate is reduced by a reduction of the former rates, the price of shoes necessarily will be raised to cover the additional rate.

Arguments before Special Examiner Mackley will attempt to show the injustice of the railroads' action in raising the old rate.

#### Dictator, ANGERED, WILL NOT GET OUT

Tells Cabinet He Will Remain in Spite of U. S. Threats—Declines Formal Reply.

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 6.—Angered by the recent pressure from Washington brought against him to compel his resignation, General Victoriano Huerta told his Cabinet to-day that he had decided to remain in the National Palace in spite of any threats or threatening demonstrations by the United States.

That the Mexican situation has been further complicated by President Wilson's demand for Huerta's resignation and that plans for a peaceful solution of the problem have been, at least for the time, frustrated, is apparent.

General Huerta has not yet formally rejected President Wilson's demands nor had he communicated with Nelson O'Shaughnessy, American charge d'affaires, on the subject up to noon to-day. The possibility that the United States will go further in its naval demonstration in Mexican waters has been, to some extent, strengthened by the developments of the last 72 hours. A number of the political enemies of Dictator Huerta have pledged their support, saying that Mexico expects to see Huerta remain in the National Palace and to give up the way in the face of pressure from Washington or any other foreign power.

Even some of the most guarded of the conservatives have counseled Huerta not to resign, even if his retention of the office of Executive means armed intervention.

According to the official organs of the military faculty, which now controls the central Government, the overthrow of Huerta would result in a popular uprising, but if Huerta should weaken and abdicate the situation would be more difficult of solution than it is now on account of the hostility with which so many Mexicans view such a possibility.

On the surface there is an appearance of apathy. Undoubtedly there is strong tension. The news that two more American battleships have turned their bows toward Mexican waters to augment the fleet of fourteen ships in Mexican waters caused mingled feelings of anger and alarm.

There was an unconfirmed report current here that Huerta, believing that patriotism could best be served by compliance with the wishes of President Wilson, wrote his resignation three days ago, but did not sign it. Events which immediately followed angered him to such an extent that he tore up the resignation and intimated to his advisers that he would be trained in arms, he being prepared to take the field at the head of his army. The explanation was that the strength of the Constitutionalists' insurgents in the north had grown to such extent that Huerta believed it necessary to do so.

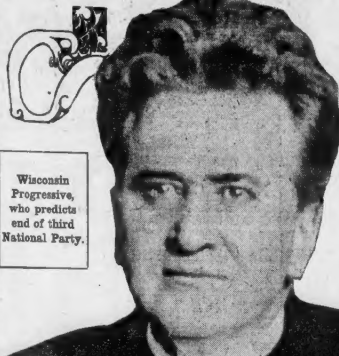

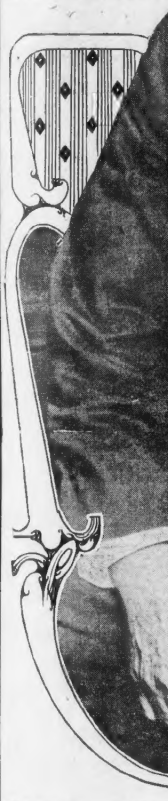

PARK WINS SEAT FROM SECOND DISTRICT

Sylvester Judge Successor to Late Congressman Roddenbery, Luke Second in Race.

With approximately 12,000 votes polled, Judge Frank Park, of Sylvester, was on Wednesday elected congressman from the Second Georgia District to succeed the late Congressman S. A. Roddenbery. House vote, former Mayor of Thomaston, ran second, less than 500 votes behind Judge Park. Judge W. C. O'Neal, of Monticello, ran a poor third receiving only about one-third as many votes as voted for Park.

With complete returns of eleven of the twelve counties of the district, and the other one nearly complete, Park has a total vote of 5,870. Luke, 4,622, and Livingston, 1,844. The total possible is 12,000. O'Neal's total possible is 4,000. O'Neal's vote is not reported but will probably fall to the level and barely change the proportionate parities.

Park Gets Seven Counties. Park carried seven of the twelve counties. In each his home county, he was almost unanimous for him, giving Park 3,270 against a combined vote of 67 for his two opponents. He also carried Decatur, Rockdale, Spalding, Wilkes, and Calhoun.

Luke's Major Vote was in Thomas County, where he carried over 1,245 against 405 for the two opponents. He also carried Spalding, Wilkes and Miller.

O'Neal carried only eight counties, but carried eleven of fifteen precincts reported giving him 494 for his two opponents. He will probably get a slight majority of the total vote for his district, but the other counties was Livingston a leading factor.

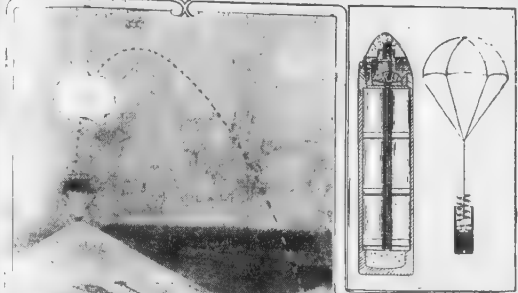

In the new Postal Savings Banks the deposits now amount to more than \$36,000,000. The Government pays only 2 per cent interest on this large sum.

A deposit as small as 10 cents is received by the Postal Savings Banks, and no one is allowed to deposit more than \$500.

More than 600,000 persons have thus left their savings with the Government AT A LOWER INTEREST RATE THAN IS PAID BY ANY OTHER GOVERNMENT IN CHRISTENDOM.

What does our Government do with this money? Does it use these vast penuries of thrifty, patriotic people to aid in the industry and the production of the country...

Not at all. The Government, in the Postal Savings Bank Law, does not act as if the consumers of the country, or even the postal depositors, were worthy of any special consideration.

It acts as if the interests of private bankers were of the first consideration or paramount in importance. Postmasters are required immediately to redeposit all savings received by them in the nearest "solvent bank willing to accept such deposits."

What does the national bank do with the money? It is forbidden to loan any of it to any farmer upon the security of his farm, no matter how good that real estate security may be.

But the bank is free to loan it to other customers, or to send it to any "Central Reserve City" (New York, Chicago and St. Louis), where the money is used for the most part to promote speculative operations in the Stock Exchange or grain pit.

The Government of Germany has given direct aid to loan associations making a specialty of lending money to farmers on improved farms at 4 1/2 per cent interest.

The Government of France helped to create a financial lending agency to furnish money to French farmers at 4 1/2 per cent interest.

Even the Government of England, traditionally cruel and unjust to Ireland, has provided a Royal Commission and an Irish Land act to improve the farm conditions of Ireland, providing money for the farmer at about 3 1/2 per cent.

But in the United States the Government takes the small savings of the people, pays 2 per cent for them, and turns them over to national banks expressly forbidden to make loans to farmers.

THE AMERICAN FARMER IS FORCED TO PAY AN AVERAGE OF 8 1/2 PER CENT FOR THE MONEY ESSENTIAL TO HARVEST HIS CROPS.

The six million farms of the country carry an average debt of \$1,000. They support twenty million farm workers. They feed the hundred million Americans. And they pay an EXCESS INTEREST CHARGE OF 210 MILLION DOLLARS a year alone (8 1/2 per cent instead of 5 per cent), while the reserves of all the 7,473 national banks of the country, amounting at the last Comptroller's statement to 240 million dollars, are deposited under the law, in Central Reserve Cities for the benefit of speculators in stocks and bonds and to finance new trusts.

Is there anywhere such a perversion of government as this? Was any government ever guilty of more monstrous favoritism than the United States Government has long shown to the speculator and the banker, who by themselves create nothing, over the toiler and the actual producer, who by themselves produces everything that we eat or wear or require for our health or well-being?

Was there ever a more monarchial government in the world so unscrupulous and short-sighted as the Government of our own glorious country when it takes the savings of the poor people, who trust the Government, and then uses those savings to finance the trusts, the banks, the speculators, the stock promoters, at the expense of the people?

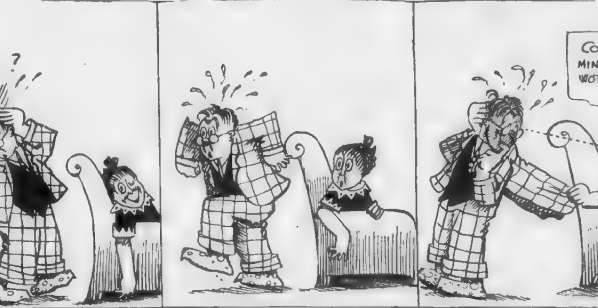
