

Huerta Takes Refuge in Fort

ROBBERS TRY TO BURN HOME

After Drugging Mrs. Jackson and Looting House, Lighted Lamp Is Placed in Rubbish.

Robbers early Tuesday morning entered Mrs. Samuel Jackson's home at 1414 Marietta street, as she lay sleeping with her 7-year-old child, and ransacked her home. Nearly \$100 in money and other valuables were taken.

A lamp was left in the center of the room, burning, and was surrounded by clothing and papers taken from bureau drawers and a trunk. It is believed the intention was to set fire to the house.

"Blonde" was used to open a window in Mrs. Jackson's bedroom. A lamp was soaked with the drug and Mrs. Jackson put under the influence of it. Whether or not her child was chloroformed physicians have not been able to determine as yet.

After drugging Mrs. Jackson's senses, the residence was turned topsy-turvy in a wild search for valuables. Trunks were emptied, the contents of two trunks scattered about the room, and carpets turned up. A pocketbook under Mrs. Jackson's pillow six \$10 bills and other money were found. The pocketbook was left in the room.

Placing the lamp in the center of the room on the floor, with rubbers laid Tuesday morning Mrs. Jackson awoke. The smell of the drug was in her nostrils and she was sick. The influence of the drug called a neighbor and the police were notified.

"I don't remember anything about it," said Mrs. Jackson. "I know I was drugged, for I could smell the drug when I woke up this morning and I was sick from the effects of it."

"I am a very light sleeper and the noise could not have robbed of my money taken from under my pillow had I not been drugged."

Mrs. Jackson is a widow. She occupies the house with another family who live in the second apartment.

General Huerta took up his residence in the old fortress of Chapultepec on the outskirts of the city.

JURY TRIAL ASSURED IN LIQUOR CASES

Overthrow of Prohibitionists by Decision Throws Question Back to Old Status.

The militant hosts of prohibition in Georgia, recently aggressively at work under the so-called "nuisance and injunction" laws, received a staggering blow at the hands of the State Supreme Court Tuesday when that tribunal, in the case of Cassidy vs. Howard, from Bibb, sweeping reversed Judge Matthews, and ordered the Cassidy matters heard before him on the equity side of his court.

The effect of this decision seems to be to put the problems of "blind tiger" convictions right back where they have been for years, and to force their permanent disposition through jury trials alone.

This will have the effect of readjusting the methods of warfare proposed to be employed by the various Law Enforcement Leagues of the State, and incidentally would appear to reopen the entire question of locker-club and near-beer saloon abatement in Georgia.

The case of Cassidy against Howard came up from Macon on an appeal from Judge Matthews in the Superior Court. The Law Enforcement League of Bibb County through J. B. Howard, its representative, enjoined Dan Cassidy, a near-beer dealer, from operating a saloon, under the charge that it was a "blind tiger" and, therefore, a nuisance within the meaning of the statute.

This injunction was granted, both temporarily and permanently, and in addition thereto, Cassidy's license was forfeited and he was permanently disqualified from holding licenses in the future. These orders were appealed to the Supreme Court, with the result to-day as stated.

Has Right of Jury. The Supreme Court holds, in a unanimous opinion, that the Superior Court of Bibb was right to grant the temporary injunction against Cassidy, thus to set up an issue for trial by jury, but that it erred in not permitting the question of permanent injunction to go to the jury, and that it erred again in forfeiting Cassidy's license and he was permanently disqualified from holding licenses in the future.

This makes it imperative upon future movements against "blind tigers" in Georgia, whether operated under the guise of locker club, near-beer saloons, or what not, to proceed, after temporary injunction, to trial by jury and not otherwise.

Prohibition leaders have contended that so long as they could keep cases from the equity side of the court, and away from juries, they could enforce the prohibition laws. They have claimed that "blind tigers" was the ever present stimulant to their way to enforcement of the law.

Three prohibitions have enjoyed much success of late shutting up saloons in the State, so long as they were kept on the equity side of the courts. Some have been shut up tight under in Savannah, Atlanta and other cities, with the object of running the "lid" on these cities in like manner.

Today's decision of the highest court of review in the State deals a body blow to these movements, however, all cases coming up under this "nuisance and injunction" law hereafter, must go to juries for adjustment.

Dictator Hides in Fort Where He Orders Arrest of Former Followers.

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 18.—General Huerta's defiance of the United States was made complete this afternoon when both Houses of Congress met and completed plans for their permanent organization.

Charles O'Shaughnessy decided today not to attend the meeting of Congress Thursday.

Three important towns in Michoacan have been captured by the Constitutionalists, who are steadily advancing in the north.

International complications were aggravated today by discovery of a plot among General Huerta's former followers to oust him from the Presidency. In this connection there were four startling developments during the night and to-day.

1. General Huerta took up his residence in the old fortress of Chapultepec on the outskirts of the city.

2. From the presidential headquarters in the fortress the dictator ordered the arrest of many of his political foes.

3. General Blanquet, Minister of War, took practical possession of the National Palace. Blanquet's own men were detailed there as a precaution against those selected by Huerta who he took office.

4. Officers and soldiers of the Federal expedition threatened to mutiny because they have not been paid.

5. Domestic pressure brought upon him through European and South American diplomats. Huerta is maintaining his policy of defiance of the United States. He summoned Dr. Urrutia, former Minister of the Interior, to his old post, which was made vacant by the resignation of Manuel Garcia Aldape.

Urrutia is expected to accept. His return has been announced and he is expected to go into the Cabinet, he will undoubtedly use all his influence against the United States.

Huerta Watching Congress.

An important development in the situation involving the American and Mexican Governments is now expected before Thursday. On that day Congress is scheduled to complete its permanent organization.

General Huerta is keeping close watch over all the Congressional leaders. This was shown to-day when he detailed an officer of his military household to act as bodyguard for General Francisco Prisco, chairman of the Senate. This officer is in real life a spy, and all of Prisco's movements are immediately reported to the dictator.

Significance is attached to troop movements which took place during the night. Part of General Blanquet's old Twenty-ninth Regiment was sent to the National Palace. This movement took part in the battle of Mexico City, when Madero was overthrown, and the men, through long years of close association, have been deeply attached to their leader.

Preparations for Siege.

All of the prisoners arrested by order of Huerta are held incommunicado. Among them are politicians and army officers. The execution of these men was left to trusted soldiers who served under General Huerta.

When Huerta went to Chapultepec fortress, the preparations indicated that he expected to be held there until he refused to resign, machine guns and great quantities of provisions and ammunition were stored in the old fortress during the night.

Drury Cabinet Minister is being watched. The city swarms with secret police. Secret political meetings are held nightly. Political intrigue is undermining what little strength the dictator has.

With the regime of Huerta drifting toward what seems to be inevitable revolution, belief was expressed that the United States Government would continue its policy of watchful non-interference.





SIDELIGHTS on GEORGIA POLITICS

By JAMES B. NEVIN

Representative William Schley Howard, of the Fifth District, will introduce in Congress this winter a bill which he thinks will provide the necessary machinery for greatly lessening railroad accidents in this country.

He has discussed the proposed measure with numerous railroad men, both employers and employees, and he believes that it will be supported in both directions.

Discussing his proposed measure Mr. Howard said:

"Ninety per cent of the accidents occurring on railroads come from one of three causes—defective rails, defective ties or improper track elevations on curves. When I say accidents, I mean derailment wrecks."

The National Government provides for boiler and equipment inspectors, but it does not provide for road inspection, and yet of the two most important lines of infinitely more importance. It does not matter how fine the rails are, unless the ties are sound, the tracks run, how secure the ties are, unless the rails are sound, the train will be wrecked. It is the ties that are the most important factor in the creation of Federal boards of road inspectors to have on many miles of every road engaged in interstate commerce under their individual jurisdiction. The members of these inspecting boards shall be put under the same conditions that good and competent men once placed in office, may be kept there. It shall be the sole business of these boards to see that the rails are the best procurable, the ties always sound and the curves properly elevated. If these things are left at the limit of efficiency the number of accidents every year will be tremendously cut down all over the country."

It is believed, too, that Congress will enact such a law as the one I propose when once its purpose is made clear. The trouble about most wrecks is exactly within the three causes I have mentioned. The Federal Government owes it to the people that these causes be removed, if possible, and it certainly is possible to remove them.

SENATORS YIELD TO G. O. P. ON MONEY BILL

Concede Public Ownership of Regional Banks, and Rapid Action on Measure Is Expected.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17.—The chief point of dispute between the two factions of the Senate Banking and Currency Committee was removed to-day. Rapid action upon the pending currency measure is expected as a result.

The principle of public ownership of the proposed regional bank system was conceded by the Administration Senators. They have provided in the draft of the currency bill which they hope to report to the Senate Thursday that if the banks do not subscribe the necessary capital the stock shall be thrown open to public subscription.

This decision on public ownership is a victory for Senator Hitchcock and the five Republican members of the committee.

Senator Overman today presented the Democratic faction of the committee figures showing the amount of money which will be shifted if the currency bill should become law and all banks both State and national come into the group.

After the crown groups of the committee had completed the draft of the bill, it was feared that unless the figures on reserves were changed money stringency might result from the new law.

According to the new Warden of Joliet Prison, in Illinois, the honor system will one day be in vogue in every penal institution in this country.

It was he who established free speech among convicts, an innovation which many prominent penologists even now look at askance. But Allen declares it is the silent man who conspires.



NO citizen has a right to stay away from the polls. The sin of doing nothing is the deadliest of the seven deadly sins.

We can no more neglect the plain duties of citizenship than we can refuse to pay our debts. Indeed, the discharge of the duties of citizenship is in essence the payment of a debt, a debt the more sacred because one which only honor can enforce.

Our safety, our liberty, the education of our children, the well-being of the home, the priceless honors of religion, have been won for us by the untold toil of the obscure, the silent and the dead.

It is dishonored to accept and enjoy blessing for which we have not labored while refusing to contribute a share of usefulness to the common stock.

A man who says "I am not interested in politics" and means by that that he is not interested in the good government of his city, ought to be ashamed of himself.

It is pleasant to observe how the salutation of American cities proceeds apace. In 1895 I was a guest in the home of Major Bond, the most famous of American lecture agents.

I observed that the drinking water in the table was from Michigan or Maryland or somewhere else, and in my untraveled ignorance I asked: "Have you no waterworks in Jersey City?"

His answer staggered me. It came like a blow in the chest. "To this hour I recall the impression made upon me by his calm, matter-of-fact reply: 'Of course. But you see, every city in America has been run by thieves.'"

This was eighteen years ago. There is not a man or woman in America who will assert to-day that all our cities are run by thieves.

THE return of William F. McCombs from Paris with the re-elected French Ambassadorship on his hands is a thing once more to the front the practical exclusion of high-class Americans from important diplomatic posts unless they are rich men.

Mr. McCombs is not now in a position to be compelled to decline the French Ambassadorship, but it is an open secret among his friends that his essential reason in the beginning for refusing this dazzling honor was because the salary of \$17,500, joined to his own income, was not deemed sufficient for him to fill this place acceptably.

In other words, through a long process of elevating rich men to foreign missions, we have come to the sorry pass that no American of whatever social or moral caliber either can or thinks he can represent the interests of his country at the seat of a European government upon a yearly income of \$25,000!

"Dollar" Diplomacy. Our boasted democracy is a sham so long as this condition of affairs is permitted to exist in our diplomatic history.

This is the real discreditable "dollar diplomacy" of to-day. It is the diplomacy that is not permitted to exist at all unless it has a surplus of dollars to gild its existence.

I do not intend to reflect upon any American holding a foreign post under our Government to-day. But I distinctly challenge the records that for two decades the multi-dollar has been well nigh the indispensable prerequisite of the foreign Ambassadors and Ministers of our country.
