Foreign Producers Acclaim Our New Tariff Bill, Which Neglects Reciprocity

Why these ringing huzas throughout Europe over our new tariff bill, now in operation, with generally lowered rates and no adequate reciprocity provisions?

What is it that 'marks an spoch,' as the London Chronicle repictes, and prompts its staid editor to the rhapsody, 'No more remarkable man (than President Wilson) has reigned in the White House since Abraham Limoin?'

They are mightily delighted about it in Europe, as the cabled special dispatches to The Georgian plainly demonstrate. They are so mightily delighted that it looks suspicious. So hugely rejoiced that they must be thoroughly convinced that a very good thing has befallen THEM. And it has—a very good thing indeed, for THEM, a new American tariff law that opens our markets to foreign producers, but does not open a single foreign market to our producers.

To the London Daily Express a year ago, William R. Hearst

A new tariff law without adequate reciprocity provisions and one hundred million dollars' worth of foreign-made goods turned loose on this country at lower rates, or no rates at all, ofton bonded warehouses and waiting ships within a few hours of its

A hundred million dollars' worth already, from foreign fac-tories, with foreign rents, foreign cheap wages and foreign stand-ards of opportunity and civilization!
And in return not a single brick out of any foreign tariff
wall, not a single foreign market an inch wider open to any
product of any American manufacturer, of any American workman!

No wonder that in London, Paris, Berlin and all other trade centers of Europe they are penning paeans in honor of "the new epoch." No wonder that in the great German capital, as The Georgian's dispatches tell us, the merchants are already organizing to take advantage of our "new freedom," the freedom to sell more freely to the Americans, but not to buy more freely from the Americans.

We have made a present, under this new tariff law, of freer trade to the foreign producer. He knows it and rejoices. But there is no gift to the American producer at all. Not only does this bill give him nothing, but it takes away from him that part of his own home market in which foreign-made products can undersell him by force of lower wages and cheaper conditions. The neglect of the policy of RECIPROCITY—of give and take, of scientific FAIR trade, fair alike to the American and foreign producer and wage-sarner—is the glaing feature of this tariff bill, which accounts for the "song of triumph" rising to its cestatic climax on the OTHER side of the ocean.
