The interest of society and of every one of us demands that law and the courts be sustained. If my

boy is guilty and should prove to be the villain he is painted, I would not turn my hand, and not one penny would be spent to save him. I would say, let the law take its course. It would be hard, of course, to see the extreme penalty imposed, and I might ask for a commutation of sentence, but nothing more. ## PRISON HELD CLUE IN BARRON MYSTERY

### Diphtheria Lurks in Mails, Dr. Harris Warns

#### GERMS PUT EXPERTS TO ROUT

Diphtheria Bacilli Cripple State Laboratory—Danger in U. S. Mails.

Normal diphtheria germs sent into the laboratory of the State Board of Health in the Capitol Building for examination have crippled the department, spreading an epidemic of the disease and making it necessary for the laboratory to close down for disinfecting.

According to Dr. H. B. Harris, of the state board, Tuesday all but three members of the laboratory staff have caught the disease, and the fortunate ones which include himself, are expected to show the symptoms daily the laboratory will be closed for two weeks.

The disease was spread, Dr. Harris learned, through a specimen of an infected child's membrane which was sent into the laboratory last week along with its insecure wrapper, the assistant caught the disease.

The public is daily being subjected to infection through specimens of contagious diseases sent through the United States mails was the startling declaration of Dr. H. B. Harris, of the State Board of Health, Tuesday.

The physicians declared that hundreds of such specimens are being sent with the mails which they contaminate and that the germs are being spread broadcast throughout the country.

Insecure packing was ascribed by Dr. Harris as the cause for the alarming situation. He declared that already practically every member of the laboratory department of the board of Health had contracted a mild form of diphtheria from opening such specimens and expressed the fear that germs of the disease may have gotten into other mails.

#### Criminal Offense

"Daily we receive in the State Board laboratory specimens of diseases for examination," said Dr. Harris. "As a rule these specimens are not properly packed."

He said many of these samples are of contagious diseases. Some of them are of the most deadly or they have mingled with the other letters and packages in the United States mail sacks and could easily slip out of the mail.

In this manner these germs may easily be spread and an epidemic of the worst type created.

"In the laboratory recently we received an infected membrane from the throat of a child. It was perfectly sealed and in the opening of it a young lady assistant became infected with the same disease, which was diphtheria. Since that time practically every person in the laboratory has caught diphtheria. Only three including myself, remain unaffected. It has become necessary to close down the laboratory that it may be disinfected before further work goes on.

"The trouble arises with the physicians in small towns who send in new specimens for examination. Sometimes they do not even pack the samples, but simply wrap them in a piece of paper and inclose them in an envelope. This is most dangerous to the public."

The board has sent out many circular letters to physicians of the State warning them against doing this, but without avail. As a matter of fact, such a custom is a criminal offense and it should be bandied as such.

The big city water reservoirs on Hemphill avenue have been a temptation to Atlanta anglers for many years.

William Rupp, superintendent of waterworks, substantiates the belief that they are full of fish with an account of the bursting of the 36-inch water main that runs to the reservoirs from the river. When the water had run out of the pipe a bushel of fish was picked up.

#### AMHERST PRISONER OF FREEDOM

### Famous Prisoner Quits Federal Penitentiary To-morrow, Improved in Health and Happy.

Julian Hawthorne, the novelist, Tuesday is spending his last day as a prisoner in the United States Federal Penitentiary. Wednesday he will be free, having served his full term of a year and a day and, with Dr. W. P. Morton, who was indicted and sentenced with him on the charge of fraudulent use of mails, will go North on the first train available.

Planning to-day for his release, Hawthorne was questioned as to his clothes. He looked over the sober gray suit rather shabby and threadbare which he wore when he came to Atlanta a prisoner. Then he discarded it, and decided in favor of a suit of clothes made in the penitentiary shop.

When measurements were taken it was found that Hawthorne is a more stalwart and a broader person than when he began his prison term.

The life within the prison walls, with its daily requirement of exercise, his regular hours of recreation, reasonable food, and wholesome surroundings, has made Hawthorne a healthier, redder person than he was when he started his term. He has become his ten miles walk around the prison inclosure, and of all the free hours in the summer months, Hawthorne was the most enthusiastic.

At one time during his prison term he even confided to his prison term the ambition that he might walk to New York City, a journey which he has planned to make in the summer months. Neither Hawthorne nor Dr. Morton likely will remain long in Atlanta, but will make their way at once from the prison to the railroad station, to board their homeward-bound train.

#### GIRL'S DEATH IS MAJOR TO FOOTPRINT LEADS TO ARREST OF SUSPECT IN THOMASVILLE HOTEL

THOMASVILLE, Oct. 14.—Wm. T. W. Duane, about 50 years old, held on suspicion, the police are this afternoon continuing their efforts to clear up the mystery surrounding the murder of pretty Miss Dorothy Haug, the 11-year-old Valdosta stenographer who was found dead in her room at the Southern Home, Thomasville, Monday morning.

Duane, who was arrested this morning, denies any connection with the murder or any knowledge of it until after the girl's dead body had been discovered by her mother, who had gone to her room to awaken her in time to catch a morning train to Valdosta. Duane roomed just across the hall from Miss Haug's apartment. It was in the room that Mrs. Haug went for a match to strike a light when she discovered her daughter dead.

Footprint Chief Clue.

The clues that led to the arrest of Duane were the finding of a blood-stained footprint and a blood-stained towel in his room. Thus far he has not satisfactorily explained their presence to the police.

Little is known of Duane here. He was in the room that Mrs. Haug saw from Tampa, and has been employed in a meat market. Saturday he showed he had no acquaintance with Miss Haug.

A rumor that Owen Deaton, of Douglas, Ga., a young man, was a Sunday-to-day dealer in the town of Thomasville, Ga., was also mentioned. He is said, it is said, very much to have with her, but she did not reciprocate the affection.



#### AGED FATHER CALLED BELIEVE HIS SON GAVE DRUGS TO KILL WIFE

The investigation into the mysterious death of Mrs. Sallie Lou Barron, wife of Dr. Cary A. Barron who is in the Henry County jail charged with poisoning her, approached its climax in Atlanta Tuesday as the analysis of the contents of her stomach neared completion.

Dr. Edgar Everhart, of the Atlanta College of Physicians and Surgeons, who is conducting the chemical examination, announced that he probably would complete his work by Wednesday forenoon. On the result of Dr. Everhart's analysis the fate of the accused man likely will rest. If traces of poison are found, it will be proof positive in the minds of the dead woman's relatives that her husband is her murderer and they will press his prosecution with all possible vigor.

Dr. Everhart said any report that he had or had not found poison was purely gossip.

Dr. Everhart will make his report directly to Dr. T. H. Maddox, one of the relatives of the dead Mrs. Barron. It was Dr. Maddox and Dr. Huckabay, of Milner, who hastened to Atlanta with the stomach and other vital organs as soon as the body had been exhumed.

Owners Deny, However, That the Vessel Had Been Threatened by Striking Seamen.

NEW YORK, Oct. 14.—Local officials of the Uranium line today refused to put any credence in a sensational cable report from Liverpool that a bomb explosion in the hold of the Volturmo may have set the fire which cost over 100 lives.

General Manager Thomas of the line, branded the story as "absurd."

According to the report from Liverpool, Captain Tinley, of the Royal Naval Reserve, asserted his belief in the theory that a labor dispute caused the explosion, and that the Volturmo was carrying a large quantity of dynamite.

He said that he had received a letter shortly before the Volturmo sailed saying:

"If the Uranium line does not give us our demands their ships will be burned at sea."

The letter purported to come from a seaman on the line.

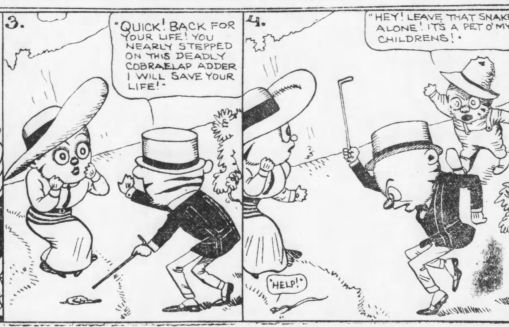

We Have War ALWAYS in This Country

It is War for Money in Which a Man is Maimed Every Nine Minutes of the Day, and Many Killed Every Hour.

Nothing excites us like a battle and "sudden death" when the sudden death occurs in WAR.

But how little attention we pay to the real war, and the real battle and sudden death, which go on in INDUSTRY, RAILROADING, MANUFACTURING, MINING.

Did you happen to read the testimony of William Lee, representing the Order of Railway Trainmen, before the Board of Arbitration in New York City?

It is interesting to hear a man testify under oath that "A member of the Brotherhood of Trainmen is killed every seven hours and fifteen minutes, and that every nine minutes a man is maimed."

And that is simply in ONE line of work. Multiply that by all the other kinds of work. Add to the railroad men that are killed and maimed for life the men that work in sulphur and die of "phossy jaw," the men that work under air pressure in caissons and die of "the bends" in horrible agony; men killed by fire damp and explosions in mines, men caught and killed by the machinery of factories, men that fall from high buildings and bridges—and the death and the maiming in hundreds of other directions—AND YOU REALLY HAVE BLOODY WAR.

It is not necessary to take the testimony of the workers themselves.

The Interstate Commerce Commission of this country in its last report on June 30 declared that in the year THREE THOUSAND SIX HUNDRED AND THIRTY FIVE RAILROAD EMPLOYEES HAD BEEN KILLED.

Remember that of these thousands of deaths every year, a great many of the maimed and mangled were caused by the refusal of employers to adopt safety devices, WHICH COST MONEY.

Remember that of the deaths described as due "to the employee's negligence," many are due in reality to the fact that the employe has worked such long hours that his tired brain and body and nerves can no longer protect him against the danger of his labor.

We make a great pretence to do about a half dozen men killed in the war with Spain. It is a good idea to get excited about that.

It is well enough, also, to pension generously, when they deserve it, the gentlemen who got as far as Florida in that war and came home with a stomach ache.

But would it not be a good idea also to get excited about REAL war, the war of industry and commerce, in which thousands are killed every year, and in which men are maimed every minute of the day and killed every hour? If we had a little war with some little country now, we would think nothing of spending fifty millions, a hundred million or a thousand millions for the safety of soldiers engaged in that war.

Wouldn't it be a good idea to spend a little money in this never-ending war of industry that wipes out useful workmen in tens of thousands?

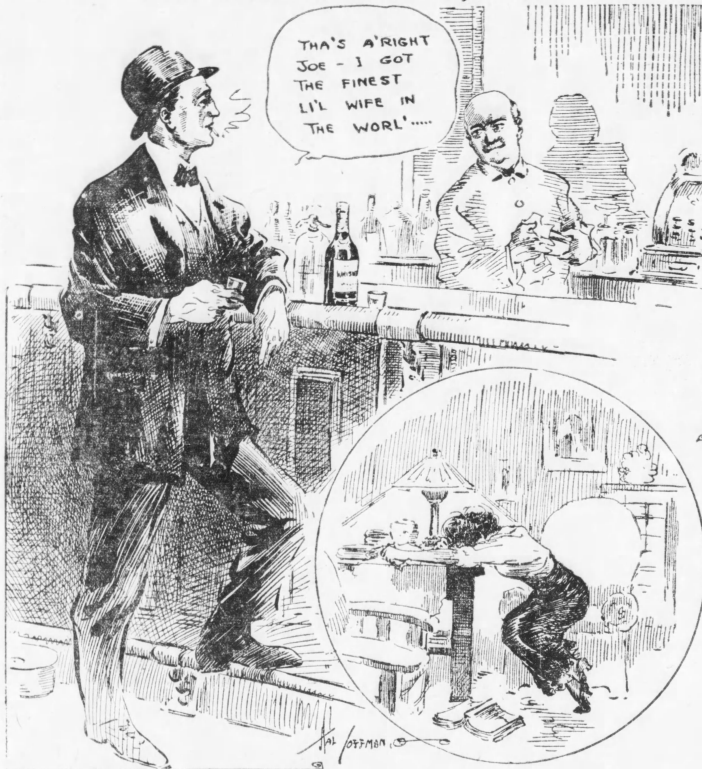

Writes on Punishment as Reformation

Our Jails Should Save the Convict and Preserve His Humanity—If They Do Not, They Need Reforming, and at Once.

By DR. CHARLES H. PARKHURST.

THERE is a readable little monthly magazine published in the Atlanta Federal Prison. From some unknown friend I received three copies of it late for some time been coming to me. The articles are not only well put together, but contain much that is interesting and also instructive to those out of jail as well as to those in.

Their special excellence is that they give the prisoner's point of view, and their point of view is liable to be as nearly correct and valuable as that of people who have never been convicted—more accurate probably and more valuable, for when they write about prison life, its effects, its justice and injustice, they know what they are writing about, and that is something which others can have only a borrowed or a theoretical knowledge.

If some one sticks a pin into me I know better than he who it feels and how I am physically affected. And when, instead of being a matter of pin-pricking it is a matter of punishment by imprisonment, the most important thing to know is still how the convict is affected by it, and that is something that the convict himself can speak and write about more accurately and intelligently than any one outside of jail or than the prison keepers on the inside.

How the Jail Aff. etc. the Prisoner is a Frim Factor.

And how the prisoner himself is affected by being jailed by the present method of felling is a prime factor in the solution of the prison problem; it is so if we are to understand how a convict can so be dealt with as best to correct his criminal quality of character. Any aim and object less radical than that is unworthy of any civilization, least of all of a Christian civilization.

The leading article in the October issue of the prison magazine just mentioned is entitled "The Final Aim of Punishment is to Instruct and Direct," and the first clause of the article reads: "Punishment is rightly interpreted involves the idea of saving or reformation. The writer's way of treating the subject implies that his own experience as a prisoner does not permit of his feeling that reformation is the natural result of prison discipline as at present maintained."

He writes intelligently and dispassionately. It would appear that his presentation of the situation should be taken at its face value. If it is claimed that from the nature of the case his estimate must be a prejudicial estimate, perhaps so, but it is more so than the estimate of a non-convict is a prejudicial estimate.

It is not to be remembered that our convicts there are the best part of a man is the human and his own. His very sense of humanness, and whatever sense of crush out that does more than damage the body, it evokes the lifeblood of the soul, and not only fails of the ameliorating results which prison treatment ought to yield, but unmans the convict, robs him out of all proper relation with life, disallows him for the restoration of life's duties, and upon his graduation from jail drives him out upon the world fit to be active but to still none of a criminal and clapped him, to go to prison again as a second or third term.
