Cloud to the Atlanta Georgian, Oct. 17.—Twenty-seven men and officers of the Empire's fleet of dirigibles were killed when the new dirigible, No. 1, the biggest airship in the world, exploded 3,000 feet above the city of Atlanta, Georgia, on Friday morning.

Sulzer Gets Magazine Offers Also. Bitter Statement Is Expected From Deposed Executive.

ALBANY, N. Y., Oct. 17.—William Sulzer was removed formally from the office of Governor of New York at 11:59 o'clock to-day by the vote of more than two-thirds of the high court of impeachment which convicted him of falsifying a public record, of perjury and of attempting to induce another to commit perjury.

The vote was 43 to 2. A Chief Justice Cullen and Senator Martin H. Glynn became Governor by virtue of succession from the office of Lieutenant Governor, and Robert G. Wagner, President of the Senate, became Lieutenant Governor.

Further Action Talked. Purely collateral was another accusation as to whether or not an attempt would be made to bring criminal prosecution against Sulzer.

The indictment was that no further action would be taken against the former Governor unless he made such charges against "harmful workers" as demanded a war of extermination.

SENIOR REMOVED FROM OFFICE. CONSIDERS OFFER OF CHAUTAUQUA DATES

ALBANY, N. Y., Oct. 17.—William Sulzer was removed formally from the office of Governor of New York at 11:15 o'clock today for the vote of more than two-thirds of the high court of impeachment which convicted him of falsifying a public record of perjury and of attempting to induce another to commit perjury.

The vote was 42 to 12. Chief Justice Cullen and Senator Wende did not vote. There was bitter denunciation of the governor in the closing hours when the court proceeded to dismiss articles 7 and 8. Disbarrment was based upon the head of the conviction of falsifying a public record of perjury and of attempting to induce another to commit perjury.

At the time of the actual judgment, Martin H. Glynn became Governor by virtue of succession from the office of Lieutenant Governor and Robert G. Wagner, President of the Senate, became Lieutenant Governor. Glynn formally was sworn in as the forty-third Governor of the State of New York, this afternoon by Chief Justice Cullen, of the Court of Appeals.

This is not an occasion for exultation. I have no such feelings," said Governor Glynn. "To me it is an occasion of solemnity mixed with sadness. I am charged with the duties of Governor, not through any act or desire of mine, but because the law which I am sworn to uphold imposes the obligation upon me under the direst circumstances of the situation that has arisen."

Speculation as to what revelations, if any, Sulzer will make when out of office took the place of the impeachment in the minds of the political workers.

Further Action Taken. Purerly collateral was other speculation as to whether or not an attempt would be made to bring criminal prosecution against Sulzer.

The conviction of the charge of perjury laid an indelible offense fully sustained by the court of last resort and made the way easy for indictment of one more.

The court voted unanimously not to disqualify the Governor from future office of trust.

The indication was that no further action would be taken against the former Governor unless he made such charges against them as would be demanded by a vote of extermination.

The court voted free to-day on articles 7 and 8, which charged him with having traveled Frederick L. Cullen from testifying. The unanimous vote was not guilty.

The article 7 was read and "not guilty" voted in short order. The larceny charge had received its first blow at the beginning of the court when Chief Justice Cullen stopped evidence bearing upon the question of larceny long enough to point out the legal shortcomings of the article.

Articles 7 and 8, charging that the Governor used the authority and influence of his office to effect legislation on his first primary bill and other bills, and with attempting to influence the price of stocks on the New York Stock Exchange, were sustained through the same rapid-fire system of dismissal.

MRS. BARTON FIGHTS FOR SEVERAL SOUS OF CUYLER FOR ALIENATION

ATLANTA, Oct. 17.—Mrs. Isabelle Barton, who is being sued for \$10,000 by Talemom Smith Cuyler, a wealthy student farmer of Atlanta, today alleged that she had been treated for her husband's alienation of her property in the case where she and Mrs. Barton are appealing to her home in San Francisco with the detectives in pursuit. 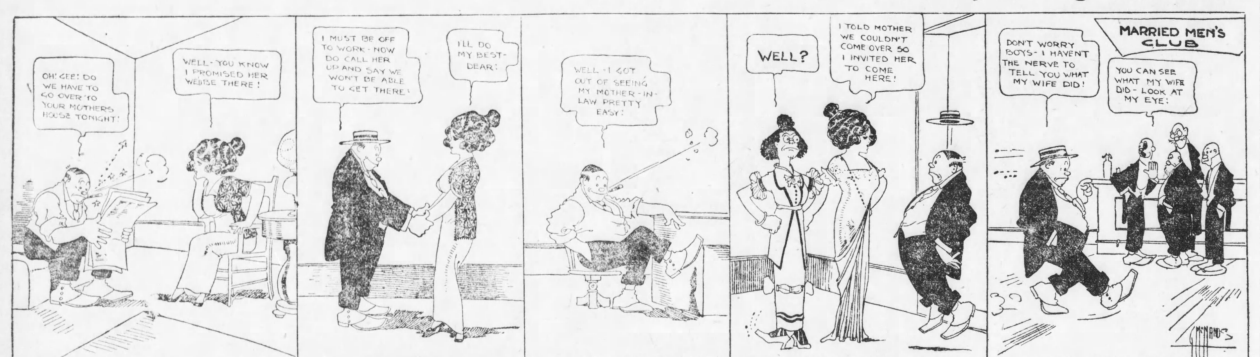

SOUTHERN ROAD REPORTS FINE FISCAL YEAR

Despite Great Increase in Operating Expenses, System Pays 5 Per Cent Dividend.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16.—Despite the great increase in operating expenses the Southern Railway, after paying a 5 per cent dividend on its preferred stock of \$4,125,000 last year, carried a balance of \$4,125,000 to the credit of surplus account during the year, which is a little more than 1912, and makes its total surplus available according to the annual report today.

Tracks between Cross Keys and Gainesville, completed; double track between Norfolk, Va., Gainesville, and between Cross Keys and Atlanta, nearly completed. Early in 1914 the double track between Atlanta and Washington will reach 44 per cent of the total. The extraordinary efforts the Southern Railway is making to increase the farm yield in the South and to encourage an influx of farmers from other sections are referred to at length. There are 2,714 farmers who are following the instructions of the Southern Railway's field agents and they are using these improved methods with success on 42,000 acres. Gross operating revenues of the road for the year were \$68,229,450, an increase of \$4,929,161 over 1912, but operating expenses increased almost the same amount and became \$63,723,323 or \$4,577,887 more than in 1912. Net operating revenue, therefore, shows an increase of only \$4,551,414. Revenue from auxiliary operations increased, "deductions" decreased a little, and so did interest on bonded debt. Net income, however, increased in "other income" more than offset these gains, leaving a balance of income over charges of \$7,678,825, which is only \$315,598 greater than last year. The \$4,577,887 increase in operating expenses was due—17 per cent to maintenance cost, 23 per cent to transportation cost, 7 per cent to development of traffic and the rest to administration expenses. About 212 per cent of the increase in the cost of transportation was due to higher wages.

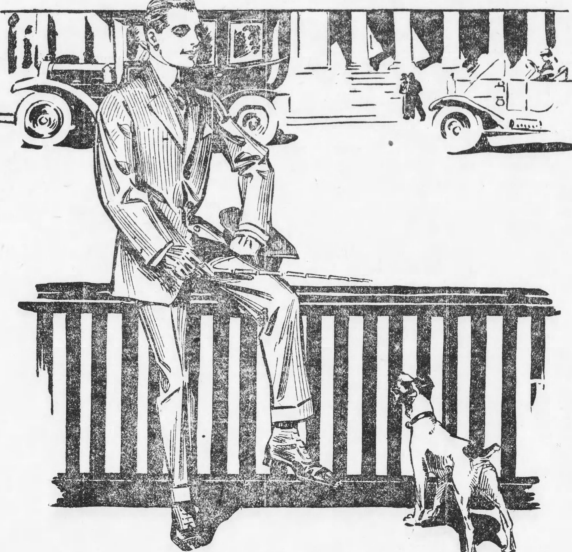

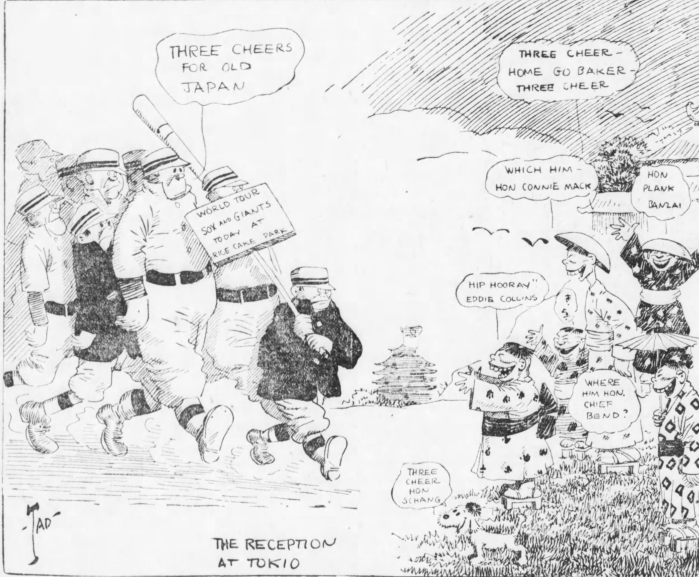

There is not a single man in the amount they are allowed to eat. That the prisoners are treated with every kindness that discipline will permit.

That there are no variations of degrees of punishment.

That the charge of "blow murder" is ridiculous.

Says Moyer is Capable.

In all of my two and a half years here, he said, I never witnessed the things Hawthorne and Morton described. I don't take any stock in their story. I can not understand why they should seek to blacken the character and belittle the ability of a capable and conscientious man like Moyer.

The statement that the men are being starved is poppycock. I know what they are given to eat, and it is just about what a day laborer could afford for his lunch. They are given all the bread they want to eat, and they want very much more vegetables of most all they have to do to raise their hands and the man at the head of the table gives them what they ask for.

There are many occasions when a certain food has been served before the men and all they wanted of it, but such things as that happen at the restaurants once in a while. It takes some practice to determine just about how much of a certain kind of food the men will want at a certain hour.

Saw No Craft Punishment.

As to the craft punishment Hawthorne talks about, there was none of it while I was here, and I left only a couple of months ago.

Corporal punishment, he allowed, there is some of the strapping up by the flogging or stocks, a practice which Hawthorne evidently wanted people to believe was still in vogue at the Atlanta penitentiary.

The worst punishment that a guard or a deputy warden can inflict upon a prisoner is to put him in "solitary." If he is put in for some minor offense such as "stealing out" a guard, he is let out as soon as such as to promote him to do it again, and appoint him to the guard. The length of time that a convict spends in "solitary" as the solitary cell is called, is generally dependent on his willingness to become amenable to discipline.

There are some pretty desperate characters here, and they have to be treated with more firmness than is necessary in dealing with the bulk of the prisoners. If they weren't kept in such discipline soon would be destroyed and it would be the prisoners

who would be conducting the institution and not the warden and his aids. I have never known anything approaching cruelty to be used over in punishing these tough characters, although they are inclined to run at you.

The only way to control them would be to make discipline more strict in my opinion. That Warden Moyer has been extremely kind and that the conditions at the prison have been greatly improved. The warden has done much to improve conditions. He may have made some mistakes, who are taking the occasion to attack him, but I am sure a careful investigation will reveal nothing against the whole institution.

"THE beginning of a conversation is something like fishing," said a clever tailor. "You must make a few throws to see if you can catch anything. 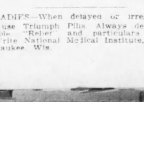
