New Trial For Frank Opposed in Thirty Affidavits

TOM WATSON INDICTED FOR QUASSED COURT OF DEFENDERS

Star Athlete's Temporary Suspension Threatens to Develop Starting Countercharges.

Pulling Bed Covers Constitutes Cruelty; Wife Gets Divorce

CHICAGO, Oct. 21.—Her husband's habit of pulling the bedcovers off of her on January nights constitutes cruelty, Mrs. Pearl E. Smith told Judge Baldwin in the Circuit court today. She was granted a divorce.

"He took the quilts away from me in January," she testified. "He tickled me and pulled the covers off the bed. Once he pulled me on his lap when he became angry and squeezed me."

"That was pretty affectionate treatment, wasn't it?" the court asked.

"No, not the way he squeezed me; no, sir," she replied.

Grand Jury Bill Defective and Unfair to Defendant, Asserts Judge Foster

AUGUSTA, Oct. 21.—Judge Foster in United States District Court here this afternoon sustained the motion of counsel for Thomas E. Watson, the Thomson editor, lawyer and politician, to quash the indictment against him, charging the sending of obscene matter through the United States mails. This motion, presented Monday by S. Guy McLenahan, chief of counsel for Mr. Watson, charged that to try him on this indictment would be to deny him his constitutional rights as a citizen and the clause-granting freedom to the press.

Judge Foster, in sustaining the motion, throwing the case out of court, held that it was not proper for the state to sue for the sending of obscene matter through the mails without the aid of a grand jury. However, should another indictment be brought, which appears to be extremely improbable, the entire article and not extracts therefrom would have to be used in the indictment.

If the case had gone to the jury, stated the court, the jury would have had only that portion of the article which was included in the indictment—that is, the three extracts alleged to be obscene—and that it was only fair to the jury to have the entire article so as to judge from its context whether or not it was obscene as a whole.

The announcement that the court had sustained the motion to quash was followed immediately by vociferous applause on the part of several hundred people who had packed the courtroom. There were a great many who were unable to get in because of the limited capacity. Mr. Watson was warmly congratulated. District Attorney Akerman was asked for a statement as to whether or not he would attempt to indict Mr. Watson again, but refused to make a statement.

The indictment against Mr. Watson was the outgrowth of publications in The Jeffersonian attacking the Catholic Church's confessionals and the oath taken by initiates in the Knights of Columbus, a Catholic fraternity.

Watson Arrives Early.

Court opened this morning at 10:10 o'clock. The room was packed to capacity long before that hour. Mr. Watson was an early arrival. With him sat Mr. McLenahan, his leading counsel; Judge J. B. Burnside, associate judge; and J. T. Osburn, P. E. W. Johnson, W. M. Jefferson, D. Townsend and A. L. Watson, fellow jurors, commended both Henkle and Johnson as high-minded and disinterested judges.

Henkle Doubtful of Guilt.

"It was the invariable testimony of the jury jurors that the law was to cast a doubtful ballot," he indicated that he was the most reluctant to make up his mind to what all the rest of the jurors seemed to have agreed on.

There was much testimony in regard to the cheering and demonstrations, all tending to show that the trial was a success.

Some 30 Affidavits to Support the State's Contentions that Leo M. Frank had a Fair Trial were Made Public Tuesday by Solicitor Dorsey. They will be used Wednesday in the fight against the defense's motion for a new trial before Judge L. R. Roon.

Some of the affidavits dealt with the probability and character of A. H. Henkle and M. J. Johnson, jurors who were accused of bias, some attack the trustworthiness of affidavits for the defense, and others assert that no influence could have been exerted on the jury by the cheering and demonstrations on which the defense is basing much of its theme of appeal.

Gally Nellie Character.

W. P. Nellie, the defense's attorney, who stated he saw a spectator "talk to one of the jurors and grab him by the hand," is referred to in the affidavit of J. W. Clayton, of the Central Carriage Company, as of bad character and one whom Clayton would not believe under oath.

Samuel Aaron, whose affidavit was made during the trial, is mentioned by Juror Henkle, who himself attacked by Mr. W. Webb, whose impeachment was in the usual form, that he was not a juror on his oath, having known him many years.

Time Element Eaten.

In the interval of preparing the affidavits, Henkle stated that he fancied those affidavits had been sworn to hearing Henkle say in Barnesville "same time in June" that he had been drawn on the jury until Friday, June 26, at 5 o'clock in the afternoon; that he remained in Atlanta Saturday and Sunday, and did not start for home until Monday.

The Solicitor evidently had been calculating on the various dates on which Henkle might have been held by saying he was "on the Frank jury," but what deductions he had made would have to superintend for the rest of the prosecution's affidavit. Henkle praised Johnson's affidavit as a juror without bias or prejudice; Johnson praised Henkle in similar terms, and J. T. Osburn, P. E. W. Johnson, W. M. Jefferson, D. Townsend and A. L. Watson, fellow jurors, commended both Henkle and Johnson as high-minded and disinterested judges.

MAYOR TAKES PART OF MILL STRIKERS

An appeal from a committee of the striking employees of the Fulton Bag and Cotton Mills for relief from alleged intimidation by the city police on Monday afternoon resulted in a promise from the Mayor that he would take the matter up at the special meeting of the Police Commission, Tuesday night.

"Unless you are disturbing the peace or resorting to violence the police have no right to interfere with you," said Mayor Woodward, "but I think there will be no further cause for complaint against the police."

F. W. Flynn, a weaver, was the spokesman for the delegation. L. C. Cotton and Albin Flynn were with him. Down on Forsyth street a large crowd of the strikers awaited the attitude of Mayor Woodward.

Flynn Talks with Mayor.

Flynn told the Mayor that the strike was based on general grievances brought to an acute stage Saturday by the discharge of an employee.

"For one thing, the water in the factory has been too warm to drink since October 1, when the mill quit giving us ice water," he said. "The pipes run all around through the mill and the water becomes heated. A complaint was made to the authorities for better water. There was no reply to it."

"For quite a while the mill has had a system of holding back five days' pay. In the weaving department, the normal wage is \$1.00 a day. When the normal wage is for the week. But the person who takes the place of the regular employee gets only \$1.25 a day. That gives the mill a net profit of \$4.00 on every day that a regular weaver is ill."

"From this source and the back-pay system the mill makes thousands of dollars of profit every day."

"Public Meeting Held."

At the evening meeting, the mill Monday they were doing nothing more than insuring that they are given their back pay. Every one of them thought they had a legal right to this money. Then the city police came and it looked like intimidation."

JOE HICKS HUNG TWO STATES

He Is the Man Who Went With Fisher to Chief of Police.

A search extending over two States was begun by the police Tuesday in an effort to locate Joe Hicks, companion of Ira W. Fisher. Hicks is the man who accompanied Fisher to the office of Chief of Police Bodeker in Birmingham, where Fisher made his weird but quickly discredited accusation of the murder of Mary Phagan against J. C. Shirley, of No. 800 Marietta street, Atlanta.

Chief of Detectives Lanford and Charles J. Graham, attorney for Shirley, believe that they will have disclosed the deeply laid plot against Shirley, if such a plot actually has existed, when they have found Hicks to talk and when they have grilled Fisher in a sober condition. Threats were made yesterday that two prominent Atlantans might be arrested if any hints were found for belief in the plot theory. Later it was said that a searching investigation was being made of the possibility that Hicks still higher up was the moving spirit in a diabolical scheme to fatten the crime of an innocent man.

Graham was undecided Tuesday as to whether Fisher's sensational story was merely a vaporous tale or a well-ordered and crisy intellect or the outcropping of a genuine conspiracy that had gone wrong through the inability of Fisher to tell a convincing story.

"I think we will know all when we find this man Hicks, who Fisher says was his constant companion in Parkville, and later in Birmingham," said Graham. "Hicks played a mysterious part in the affair. Fisher himself admitted that Hicks did most of the talking when they went to the office of Chief Bodeker. Hicks appears to have told most of the story and Fisher merely corroborated it."

There also is the possibility that Hicks suggested the story to Fisher from day to day, and finally built up in Fisher's mind the structure of the ridiculous tale he has told in Birmingham and here in Atlanta, a story which was starting enough as a simple and direct accusation, but which broke down the instant the man was forced to give any alleged details.

"We are working on several possibilities. One is that there was a conspiracy against Shirley. If there was such a plot it may have been engineered along by Fisher. Hicks may have been a party to it. In this case it was simple blackmail."

"There also is the possibility that Fisher or Fisher and Hicks were merely tools in a conspiracy and that the real conspirators are men higher up. If this is the case, Atlanta will have a sensation the like of which it has not experienced in years. On the other hand, the whole story may be simply the ravings of a drunken and besotted mind. Fisher's own relatives say that he was an extraordinary man when in his cups."

Ordinary occurrences were reversed Tuesday. Shirley, he accused, was walking the streets a free man. Fisher was occupying a cell in the police station in charge of the criminal. He had been preferred against him, based in view of the fact that as far as is known Fisher made the charges against Shirley. 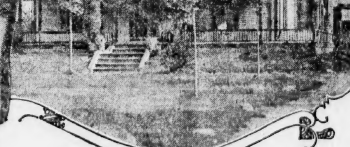

STRUGGLE CENTERS ON CLAIM OF DEFENSE OF PREJUDICE OF JURORS

THE COMPLAINT. STRIKERS' COURT CHEER ATTACK ON WILL

FIRE ROUTS GUESTS OF HOTEL

Owner of Building Accuses Former Tenant as Incendiary Because of Grudge.

Following sensational charges of arson made by Jim Brown, who owns the damaged building at Forsyth and Walton streets, detectives Wednesday began a thorough probe of the fire which did between \$5,000 and \$5,000 damage.

Brown's soda fountain, Williams House No. 2, and the Southern Dry Goods Co. were all damaged and the nearby cost the life of Dr. G. Ford, a dentist, who was dragged unconscious from his rooms over the fire.

Brown charges that the man he accuses set the fire to the building to satisfy a grudge because he had been expelled from the place a week ago for non-payment of rent. Detectives have not yet been able to find any circumstances that connect the accused man with the fire, but they expect thoroughly to investigate Brown's accusation.

When the fire was discovered at 1 o'clock Wednesday morning, the interior of the cafe was ablaze, and in a few minutes the entire block bounded by Forsyth, Marietta and Walton streets, was doomed. The flames sprang to Jim Brown's soda fountain on the corner of Walton and Forsyth streets, and the engine and rails were badly burned and scorched. The flames ran up between the walls and invaded the offices and living rooms of Dr. G. Ford, above the cafe, destroying most of his office equipment. Dr. Ford was found in bed, unconscious, by firemen who broke the windows. He was carried to the city hospital, worked over him for nearly half an hour before he regained consciousness.

Half a hundred guests of the Williams House No. 2, which adjoins the cafe, were aroused by the smoke, and fled into the street in their night clothing. Only slight damage was done to the hotel, the firemen preventing the flames from spreading to that building.

The fixtures and a quantity of clothing in the offices of the Southern Dry Goods Co., which is between the cafe and the hotel, were badly damaged by the smoke.

CHARGES SOLICITOR IS TRYING TO CHANGE FRANK ON THE DOTTING OF 'I'

Angered by Solicitor Dorsey's persistent objections to the wording and grounds of the reasons for a new trial for Leo M. Frank, Luther Rosser, chief of counsel for Frank made a virulent attack upon the Solicitor during the hearing Wednesday, charging that an attempt was being made to hang a man upon the mere matter of the dotting of an 'I' or the crossing of a 'T'.

"This is the most marvelous affair I have ever witnessed," Rosser declared. "We are sitting here manning and flogging as though someone were using for a cow killed on a railroad track, instead of arguing the broad grounds for a new trial for a man whose life is at stake."

"They are trying to hang a man on the mere technicality of the dotting of an 'I' or the crossing of a 'T'."

Attorney Reuben Arnold who has assisted Attorney Rosser in the preparation of evidence for a new trial, reinforced the charges of Rosser by the accusation that Solicitor Dorsey was using a high-power microscope in an effort to pick out every conceivable point which might argue against another trial, without regard for actual justice.

Hearing in Capital. A small room in the State Library in the Capitol Building was the scene of the arguments. Besides the half-dozen men who were trying to save Frank and the two who were there to block efforts to keep the convicted man from the gallows and Judge Rouse, were a dozen newspaper men and people directly interested in the result of the arguments.

Quoted were two dozen curious people who were not allowed in the room.

Justice Rosen sat near the center of a long table. To his left was Herbert Hays, Leonard Hays and Reuben Arnold, attorneys assisting Luther Rosser. On the judge's right was Solicitor Dorsey and Assistant Solicitor Rivers.

Justice Rosen, big and deep-toued as usual, was in the center of the room, over practically every reason that came on the floor always preceded his saying anything.

A hot dispute developed over the incorporation of the entire financial sheet in the brief of evidence as soon as the hearing began. This wrangle was followed by a series of others over practically every reason that was put forward by the defense.

Before the hearing had progressed far, it became evident that unless the opposing attorneys could reach some sort of an armistice the hearing would last four or five days. Attorney Rosser declared during a heated argument with the Solicitor that the hearing would drag out two weeks if Dorsey continued his objections to every paragraph of the brief.

Dorsey and Rosser, in supporting their reasons for a new trial, charged that the stenographers had failed to make a record of many of their objections and the grounds of the objections.

Dorsey defended the stenographers, and said they had recorded the words of the different attorneys. Referring to this statement, Arnold called attention to several places in the record where the stenographers had merely stated "Counsel argued" instead of "Counsel argued this question per and con."

Questions Its Impact. Dorsey's objection to the first reason in the defense's brief was that the use of the whole financial sheet, including the feature of Frank's name beyond its proper importance in a condensed brief of evidence.

"Counsel argued that down," said Attorney Arnold, "because its object is to show the volume of work done."

FIGHT MADE FOR 1,000 TO JOIN

Union Organized Among Strikers. Police Propose Only to Preserve Order.

The strike at the Fulton Bag and Cotton Mills grew more serious Wednesday when 28 women employed in the dress room of the bag department walked out through sympathy with the striking weavers.

Following an effort to organize the strikers into a union Tuesday afternoon efforts were being made Wednesday to get all of the 1,500 operators in the factory to affiliate with the movement for better conditions.

So far there has been little critical action among the strikers. A committee went before Oscar Elias, president of the company, Tuesday to state their complaints.

They asked me to restate an employe named Fowler, who struck Metzger, assistant superintendent of the weaving room, and McElhannon, who it seems encouraged Fowler to misbehave.

"We have 10 per cent more employes in the weaving department today than yesterday. I believe that all who do not want to go back to work will be replaced by new employes by the end of the week.

After the trial of three of the strikers Wednesday a committee of twelve made charges before Chief Beavers that G. A. Johnson, general manager of the mills, had used profanity before some employes. Chief Beavers ordered Captain Mayo to notify Mr. Johnson to appear before Recorder Broyles to answer the charges Thursday.

Bond for Accused Striker. The strikers were cited at another turn. Will Tamlin, a striker who was found over by Recorder Broyles under a \$200 bond for interfering with the laborers, was released from jail when his friends gave the bond. He was congratulated by many women and men when he returned to the mill village just as the employes were on their way home for the mid-day meal.

To gain additional strength, leaders of the strikers said that plans were being arranged to secure a brass band and have a parade through the village Wednesday afternoon. No one would admit being an active participant in making these plans, all of them admitting that they feared arrest.

WILBURN PUT BLAME ON WOMAN

STORY OF IMMORALITY IN REHEARING BATTLE

The testimony of Jim Conley, which led to the bitterest fight in the trial of Leo M. Frank, again was the bone of acrimonious contention at the hearing for a new trial before Judge L. S. Roan Wednesday.

That the defense is determined to make a desperate fight for a new trial because the revolting story told by the negro of Frank's alleged immorality was allowed to get in the record and never was expunged was made evident when Attorneys Rosser and Arnold marshaled before the judge a series of reasons for another trial, all based on the fact that the testimony was allowed to go before the jury during the trial and again while the arguments were in progress.

Fighting back savagely at every move of Frank's lawyers, displaying every doubtful point with the same insistence and determination that marked his conduct of the Phagan murder trial and remaining undisturbed by the caustic remarks of Arnold or the more vigorous attacks of Rosser, Solicitor Dorsey presented an obstinate figure throughout the day's hearing, which was but preliminary to the struggle which will follow when the actual arguments are begun.

The first day was devoted to a review of early portion of the defense's 115 reasons for a new trial.

Deadlock Soon Comes

So insistent was the Solicitor that every reason be given in conformity to the testimony and evidence as he interpreted it that the hearing had not progressed far when the noon recess was taken. The Solicitor and Attorney Arnold had endeavored to come to an agreement on the grounds for the new trial the day before, but they became deadlocked almost on the first reason submitted by the defense and on this account it was decided to take the entire motion with the 115 reasons after Judge Roan for his adjudication.

Rosser repeatedly charged Dorsey with quibbling, splitting hairs and on one occasion intimated that the Solicitor was seeking to hang a man "on the dotting of an 'i' or the crossing of a '1'."

The hearing had not progressed to the fifteenth of the 115 reasons by the end of the forenoon hearing. No mention had yet been made of the charges of bias and prejudice against Jurors Henlee and Johnson. The early reasons had to do with errors which the court had committed, according to the contentions of the defense, in letting in certain testimony of Detectives Black and Barnes and Newt Lee and keeping out a part of that of Black.

Conley's testimony became the subject of heated discussion immediately on the reading of the tenth reason of the defense. In this it was argued that the court had been in error in denying the motion of the defense to strike out all of Conley's testimony in regard to the alleged perversion of the defendant on the ground that it was immaterial, irrelevant, illegal and highly prejudicial to Frank.

The Solicitor was insistent with his objection to this loose use of the grounds for the arguing of a new trial. He contended that this motion by the defense had not been made at the time the evidence was put in.

Arnold retorted that the objection was put in and that the records showed it. The Solicitor contended that the motion had been made, but called attention to the fact that this action had not been taken by Frank's lawyers until after Conley had been cross-examined by Rosser a day and a half.

Dorsey Scores a Point

Dorsey was successful in his effort to have added to the reason the fact that the motion was made and denied only after this lapse of time. The motion on the subject of perversion and this also was incorporated in the reason, the Solicitor having the privilege of investigating the records of the question.

Section 10 and 11 deal with the same subject except that one was in permissive form and the other in question and answer. Both were certified to by Judge Roan after the recess had been made.

CERTIFIES TO CHEERS IN COURT; HEARING MAY GO ON ALL WEEK

Prospects for a new trial for Leo M. Frank were made much brighter Wednesday afternoon by Judge Roan's certification of the defense's description of the disorder and demonstration in the courtroom on various occasions during Frank's trial.

The facts to which Judge Roan certified were contained in the defense's charge that immediately on the announcement that Conley's testimony, taken to show perversion and immorality and acts wholly dissociated from the charge of murder, was to stand, there were immediate cheers, clapping of hands and stamping of feet in the courtroom.

Jury In Adjacent Room. The jurors were in an adjacent room at the time, so close, in the opinion of Judge Roan, as to be able readily to hear the demonstration.

The defense also held that the court was in error when it refused at the time to grant a mistrial for which Attorney Arnold moved, and did not clear the courtroom as was demanded by both the attorneys for the defense.

It also was charged by the defense that during the examination of one of the witnesses the crowd made a jeering demonstration against Attorney Arnold.

Judge Roan certified to all of these facts as represented by the defense, a circumstance which is regarded as most favorable to Frank's chance for a new trial.

Solicitor Dorsey won a slight victory when the battle ranged around section 13 of the motion which declared that the Solicitor had continued his cross-examination of witnesses to draw out particular acts of immorality on the part of the pencil factory superintendent when Judge Roan had ruled against such questions.

Mrs. Dorsey demanded that this particular reference to him in the motion be struck out and it was granted by Judge Roan, after a bitter struggle.

Continued From Page 1. fered against him because all of his charges were verbal.

Grand Jury Called On. That the Fulton County Grand Jury will be asked to investigate the origin of the accusations was the statement made by Graham.

This action was decided upon following a lengthy conference between Shirley, Graham and Chief of Detectives Lanford. Its purpose will be to determine whether Fisher's story was the result of a conspiracy against Shirley or simply the result of a drink-crazed mind.

A right probe to the foundation of the story will be asked, persons named by Fisher as his associates since his departure from Atlanta will be questioned, especially those with whom he had dealings just prior to the time he appeared before Chief of Police Lanford in Birmingham and made his startling statements.

If the investigation shows that others had a hand in the accusations against the furniture dealer, they will be prosecuted together with Fisher in a conspiracy charge. Many believe that this will prove the fact.

Attorney Graham stated that he would have a conference with Solicitor Dorney later in the day and an early date for the grand jury would be fixed.

Shirley said that he either would put Fisher in the asylum or in a penitentiary. He will bring his books to the police Tuesday to show a complete alibi. Lanford has received an investigation of the charges of conspiracy and will make arrests at once if he finds them substantiated. The names of the men named in the alleged conspiracy have been identified with the "Frank case." The other one is known to have been with Fisher in Birmingham.

It was pointed out by Chief Lanford Tuesday that were Fisher's story true in every particular, there is nothing in it to connect him with the murder of Mary Phagan. The name Fisher said Shirley mentioned as that of the girl he was in love with, Shirley asserted that he never even knew Mary Phagan by sight.

Fisher was put under arrest at the police station on the charge of criminal libel, the complaint being sworn to by Russell Shirley, a brother of C. C. Shirley. Shirley stated that he saw him after he had repudiated his weird story Monday night in the presence of the man he accused.

The warrant had already been made out, and as soon as it became apparent that Fisher said by some means an irresponsible drummer, Lanford was going to stick by his story. Chief of Detectives Lanford gave the order to Detective John W. Starves and Fisher was locked up.

Fisher underwent a searching examination that lasted for three hours. He detailed the story first to Chief Lanford, then to Chief of Detectives Lanford. Little effort was made at this time to cross-examine him, the purpose being to get his story together as he told it. Lanford told it so that every feature might be investigated in the most complete and dispassionate manner.

Chief Lanford said that Fisher Starves and Fisher then told Fisher through a lawyer questioning and he then was taken to the police station on the day of the crime. While he was gone, Fisher was at the request of Chief Lanford, Fisher came back to the police station, and any warning fight into the room. Standing before him was the man he accused.

Fisher was taken back for an instant, but recovered himself at once. He was placed in a chair near the chief and the questioning was resumed. Chief Lanford, Charles J. Graham, attorney for Shirley; Russell Shirley and the accused man himself took turns in firing questions at the would-be murderer. Aside from a nervous movement of his hands, and a frequent striking of his forehead, Fisher showed no sign that he was disturbed by the unusual position in which he found himself.

Shirley isn't held. Because of the positive statements obtained in the first announcement of Fisher's story, some possibility was stated that Shirley might be held at the police station until the story had been investigated.

So many glaring improbabilities and conflicts, however, crept into the main narrative of Chief Lanford that he declared that he couldn't think of holding Shirley until the main facts of the story were cleared up. Another of his statements which he said he had seen on the street April 24 which was a "Frank case" day, either while he was walking about Fourth Street from about 10:30 to 11:30, or the other

noon or while he and Shirley, according to his story, were driving across Peachtree street and down Decker street and then to the Union Station. He said that he did not see any of the streets in all other than would naturally be on some Saturday afternoon.

The progress of his wagon never was stopped at any time as he was driving from one place to another. It is claimed that this alone brands his story as ridiculous as there were large crowds on the street.

Still another discrepancy which the grand jury will probe is that he first said that he met C. W. Burke, agent for Atlanta Lumber Bazaar, on Friday night in Birmingham. Before he decided to tell his story, he declared that the first time he saw Burke was last Saturday night when Burke met him on the street and brought him to Atlanta. Burke also is declared to have told that he met Fisher first on Friday night.

Burke Did Talking. Fisher was questioned very discreetly about his story. He said that he met Burke and Reuber, Arnold had not talked to him at all, but that Burke had done most of the examination.

"I told me up there that you could have a hard time down here if the detectives got hold of me," he naively told Lanford.

Fisher gave all of his replies in a calm, almost disinterested way. When he charged Shirley a volume to the pencil factory to meet Mary Phagan he said that he thought he would have a hard time down here if the detectives got hold of me, he naively told Lanford.

"You did it, you now you did it," he said to Shirley.

"You lie, you thank you know I will not be arrested," he said to Shirley, and he started from his chair in a paroxysm of anger. Detectives grabbed Shirley and averted a fight.

"This dramatic scene was enacted when Shirley was brought to headquarters. He was arrested, and Fisher was ordered to tell his story in the furniture store.

"Then we are entitled to all our evidence in extenuation if that goes in," replied Dorey.

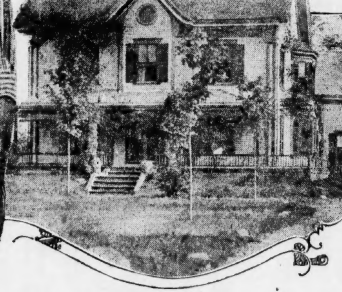

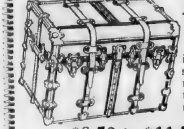

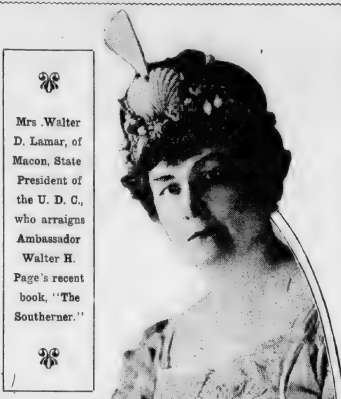

Julian Hawthorne, whose arraignment of conditions at the Federal prison, where he was an inmate for several months, created a sensation, is heard at work stirring up sentiment to bring about changes in penal institutions everywhere. In a plea to the Governor of New York, he points out some needed reforms. "First," said Mr. Hawthorne, "the State must provide adequate appropriations so that prisoners may be properly housed and fed. In this connection, too, it is most important that the guards, who exercise such charge should be of high type than those employed by the Government in Atlanta. Men who know how to treat the inmates humanely and to mingle mercy with justice must necessarily receive good assistance. Lock-Step is an Evil. "So long as a prisoner's spirit is not broken he does not become a depraved man. The antiquated system in force in many of the State institutions is certain to drive men into crime. The rules should be abolished; the honor system should be instituted; the cells should be lighted; above all, inmates should be treated as human beings. Prisoners who have families should be paid for their labor. The money should be remitted at stated intervals to those who have been deprived of the prisoner's support. The money which will turn the prisoner into a desperate character so quickly as the worry over the fate of the loved ones left behind to depend upon the charity of an unfeeling world. "The policy of limiting a prisoner's privilege of writing letters is extremely cruel. What advantage is there in preventing the prisoner's first offender from communicating with his friends and receiving from them, their which will help him to lead a better life? "In this connection I would suggest that much good might be accomplished by permitting the prisoners' relatives and friends to visit him more frequently."

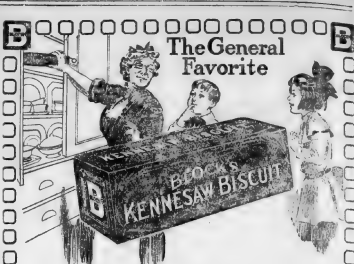

THE JURY SYSTEM OF GEORGIA ON TRIAL--A Vital Question That Interests Every Man and Affects the Integrity of the Courts.

There has been projected into the proceedings in the matter of a motion for a new trial for Leo M. Frank a question of the gravest importance to every man and woman in the State of Georgia; and one that should be studied carefully and thoughtfully, for it is deeper than some of the legal points involved in the arguments to be made for a new trial for Frank.

The affidavits published extensively in all the newspapers and now filed in court, to the effect that one of the jurors in the Frank case had expressed violent prejudices against the accused before the trial, and, therefore, was disqualified to act as juror, bring forward an issue that the people everywhere in our State have a right to discuss, for if our jury system fails, the whole fabric of our courts is destroyed.

Whether Frank is entitled to a new trial or not may safely be left to the wisdom of the eminent judges whose duty it is to consider the whole case.

It is NOT the duty of newspapers to express opinions on disputed points of law while the case is still undecided and in the hands of judges whose fairness is unquestioned, and whose knowledge of the law is conceded.

Judges of our courts in the future, as in the past, may be depended upon to safeguard the interests of those who come before them accused of crime, as well as the interests of the public, and all that is comprehended in the term society.

If it be true that one of the jurors expressed himself as reported, he was, of course, UNFITTED TO ACT AS A JUROR, and it is this point in which the great public is interested. We must be sure that every juror, in any case, petty or capital, is honest, fearless, open-minded, and willing to render a verdict according to the evidence.

Every man sitting in the jury box wants to know that the man next to him has the same integrity of purpose that he, the honest man, has, and every property holder and every person on trial for his life wants to know and FEEL SURE the verdict as rendered shall be without premeditation or malice, and based on the evidence brought forth in court and on the interpretation of THE LAW laid down by the honorable judge.

CONSIDERED IN ITS BROADEST SENSE, THE WHOLE JURY SYSTEM OF GEORGIA IS NOW ON TRIAL.

Leo M. Frank's guilt or innocence is not bound up in that question at all. Judge Roan and the higher courts will decide justly and fearlessly the legal points raised by counsel, and decide without regard to anything except the law and the facts.

It is a waste of time and energy to talk seriously of the stability of any of our institutions, and PARTICULARLY OF THE IMPREGNABILITY OF OUR COURTS, unless every man and woman in the community is absolutely certain that THE JURY SYSTEM HAS NOT FAILED anywhere, even in part.

"In the administration of justice, and especially criminal justice, it is quite as important that justice appear to be done, as that it be done."

This is the eloquent summing up of a great jurist, who spent years on the bench, and was a master of criminal law.

The time to study great questions of vital importance is when these questions are uppermost in the public mind, and THE TIME IS NOW to consider the defects in our jury system, and the protection to be thrown around the selection of jurors in the future.

Not only is this a matter of fairness to those who may be accused, but fairness also to those who may not know that a GREAT CRIME or a great tragedy can be committed in the name of THE LAW.

And while the words THE LAW may seem ponderous and unintelligible to some people, there is a definition so simple and clear that even a child can understand:

"What then would not have done to thyself, do not to thy neighbor."

THIS IS THE WHOLE LAW. ALL ELSE IS COMMENTARY.

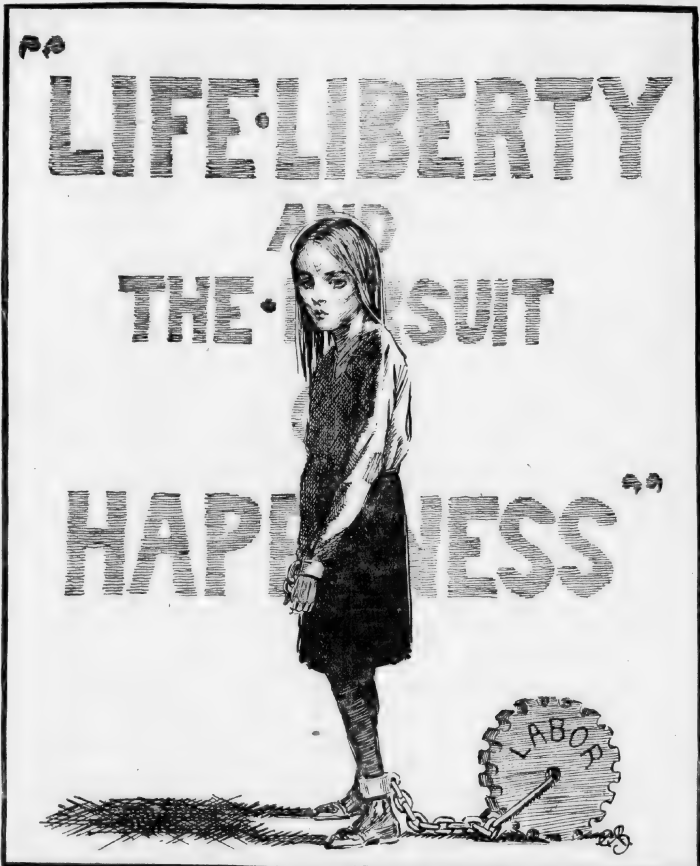
It is the Golden Rule "to do unto others as you would have others do unto you."

And no matter how many lawbooks have been written, or how many thousands may be written in the future, they will be merely commentaries on the definitions foregoing given.

Our present judiciary has aptly been described as "exact, scrupulous and minute." And it is most important that it should be kept so.

ON—Talk and Action. Most People Imagine the World Gets Better While They Are Telling How It Ought to Be Done.

TALKING and writing about how the world can be made better seems so much like the real thing, so much like the actual process of making the world better that, even while his tongue is wagging or his pen scribbles a clean page of foolscap, a man has a self-congratulatory feeling that things are at that very moment really on the make.

Two men downtown—I had the incident from one of them—were debating the best method of dealing with families that had become reduced to poverty and generally demoralized in consequence of the drunken habits of the husband and father.

"Let's Quit Talking and Go Over to See What We Can Do."

"There is just such a family living in the next block; let us quit talking and go over there and see what we can do."
