EUROPE TO BACK UP SCOLE SAM  
President Now Preparing Note in Which He Will Tell of Contemplated Action.

The Powers interested in Mexico are planning to aid the United States in getting rid of Huerta by "moral suasion." President Wilson is at work on a note to the Powers covering the matter. Secret plans of the United States for quick mobilization of 100,000 guardsmen, in addition to the regular army, for duty in Mexico, in case intervention is found necessary, are disclosed. Germany and France will back up any policy formulated by the United States to get rid of Huerta. It is learned from high sources. The wives of Evaristo and Daniel Huerta, brothers of the ex-President, appeal to United States Congress for their husbands, arrested by Huerta for treason. Four United States battleships sail for Mexican waters under rear admiral, making seven American warships on the coast, a fleet capable of maintaining a complete blockade of the coast. Huerta will order another national election for February, according to reports, and keep office until then. Persistent rumors at Vera Cruz that General Jose Y. Salazar, rebel leader, had been assassinated near there.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29.—President Wilson to-day began the preparation of a statement of his Mexican policy for the benefit of the European powers, which, it is believed, may lead to the final elimination of General Huerta from Mexican affairs, through the "moral suasion" of the governments interested in Mexico. The President had an early conference with Secretary Bryan, and later John Bassett Moore, counselor of the State Department, sent to the White House documents believed to contain the statements of the English, German and French governments of their willingness to await the announcement of this country's attitude in Mexico before taking further action. Just when this note will be presented to the powers is not known.

Six Girls Are Gone; Police Are Asked To Look for Them

Atlanta Prison Gets 'Dr.' Murry, Friend Of Hans Schmidt

NEW YORK, Oct. 29.—"Dr." Ernest Murry, friend of "Father" Hans Schmidt, was to-day sentenced to seven and one-half years' imprisonment in the Federal Penitentiary at Atlanta for counterfeiting. Murry pleaded guilty to the crime of counterfeiting, saying that he wanted to go back to his home in Germany and attend the business of his life with his mother. Judge Hunt could have imposed a sentence of 30 years, but as the prisoner is a victim of insipient tuberculosis he was lenient.

Popular Government Measures Approved

JACKSONVILLE, Oct. 29.—At a special election here Chapter 676 of the State Laws, providing for the initiative, referendum and recall, was approved by a vote of 482 to 255. By an almost similar vote the newer law, providing that property owners may pay two-thirds of the cost of sewers, was annulled. This means that suburban residents will have fewer sewers. While less than 10 per cent of the registered vote was cast, the result of the election is regarded as a victory for popular government in Jacksonville.

Bowen Wins Fight To Retain Office

JACKSONVILLE, Oct. 29.—County Commissioner F. S. Bowen has won his fight in the Circuit Court to retain his position as a county official. Judge Daniel A. Simmons this afternoon sustained his demurrer to county warrant proceedings brought by George W. Clark, who claimed that the commissioner had vacated his seat on the board by accepting a deputyship under Sheriff W. H. Dowling. The point was made that the law required the filing of a bond by the deputy and that Mr. Bowen had never filed such bond, and had therefore not qualified as a deputy sheriff.

### Mrs. Eaton, Acquitted, Shouts for Joy

### ROAN PREPARES FRANK DEED

### FINDING TO BE MADE PUBLIC FRIDAY

Lawyers for Factory Superintendent are Prepared for Appeal if Ruling is Adverse.

Judge L. S. Roan was busy Thursday writing his opinion on the granting of a new trial to Leo M. Frank. Although the hearing closed Wednesday afternoon, the judge wished to look over a number of affidavits and the amended motion for a new trial before he announced his decision. It will be known Friday morning whether the man convicted of the strangling of Mary Phagan April 26 in the National Penitentiary will get another chance for his life by the decision of the trial judge.

Judge Roan, as soon as he renders his decision in the matter, will resign from his position on the Stone Mountain circuit and will become a member of the State Court of Appeals, to which bench he was appointed some time ago by Governor John M. Slaton. Judge Ben Hill, now on the appellate bench, will become the judge of the new Atlanta circuit. Solicitor Reid, of the Stone Mountain circuit, will become the presiding judge and George N. Narrier, of Decatur, will act as Solicitor General.

**Fight to Last Ditch.**  
An immediate appeal to the Supreme Court of the State will be made by Frank's attorneys in the event the motion for a new trial is denied. Attorney Rosser asserted in his closing argument Wednesday afternoon that he was in the case until he drew his last breath or so long as his positive conviction in Frank's innocence remained. The lawyer intimated that the fight in the courts would be prolonged until every legal recourse had been tried. No advantage will be overlooked in the determined battle to save the factory superintendent from the gallows.

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### Several Not Poisoned, Says Jury

Verdict Freeing Accused Widow Greeted in Early Morning by Cheering in Courtroom.

PLYMOUTH, MASS., Oct. 29.—Mrs. Jennie May Eaton today was acquitted of the murder of her husband, Rear Admiral Joseph Giles Eaton, formerly of Alabama, after the jury had deliberated her case eleven hours.

The verdict of not guilty was returned at 5:08 a. m. after a crowd of lawyers, relatives, friends and curious persons had kept an all-night vigil in the courtroom.

A remarkable scene took place when the foreman announced the verdict that cleared Mrs. Eaton of the charge of having poisoned her husband with arsenic at her home in Astoria, Mass.

The acquitted woman rose to her feet and, gripping the hands of her lawyers, exclaimed in a shrill voice: "Thank God! I have the best lawyers in Massachusetts."

About 200 persons were in the courtroom when the verdict was announced. In spite of a previous warning from the bench, the spectators in the rear of the room rose in their seats and started to cheer when the verdict was acquitted.

Almost immediately Mrs. Eaton, accompanied by her lawyers, left the courtroom. With all possible dispatch Mrs. Eaton left for Astoria to rejoin her aged mother, Mrs. Virginia Harrison, and her daughter, Dorothy.

**Delay Worried Watchers.**  
It had been expected by friends of the accused woman that very few ballots of the jury would be necessary to acquit Mrs. Eaton, but when the hours began to drag the mass assembled to predict a disagreement. Very few who followed the trial closely believed that Mrs. Eaton would be found guilty. One of the most optimistic of the group that watched the verdict was Mrs. Eaton's attorney, William A. Morse, who kept saying that he felt morally certain that his client could not be convicted on the evidence.

About 5 o'clock unwanted activity in the jury room indicated that a decision had been reached. This shook the sleep from the eyes of the court watchers, and the rest in the courtroom were soon filled. A message was dispatched to Judge Allen at his home, and within a short time the jurist had taken his place upon the bench.

Mrs. Eaton, who had spent the night toasting upon a pallet in the executive chamber of the judge, was aroused and led into the courtroom. Although pale, she showed great composure, being buoyed up by the constantly reiterated declarations by her lawyers that she would be acquitted. Her pale face was accentuated by her black dress, but she showed no outward agitation.

**Silence Quasi Verdict.**  
About 9 o'clock the jury returned to the court hall on the question as to whether or not the jurors had agreed upon a verdict and as to its nature. The foreman of the jury replied: "Not guilty, and then sat down." The stillness for a few moments remained unbroken. In the dim light of the lamps, for dawn had not yet broken, the figures in the room sat motionless. Then the overstrained feelings gave way.

### Discharged Guards to Testify

Despite Efforts of Warden Moyer to Block Penitentiary Inquiry, Probe Is Ordered.

With an investigation of the Atlanta Federal Penitentiary ordered by Attorney General McReynolds, despite the efforts of friends of Warden William H. Moyer to sidetrack a probe and minimize the importance of the charges made by Julian Hawthorne, Dr. W. J. Moron and a number of former employees of the institution, interest has centered in the testimony seven discharged guards of the institution are expected to give when the investigation is under way.

These men lose their jobs because, Warden Moyer claims, they were responsible for the charges made by Hawthorne and Dr. Moron, who, he says, assailed his administration of the prison at the instance and request of the disreputable man. The discharged guards, since they left the prison, have indicated that they have a complete knowledge of the hardships of the institution, and that they are ready to talk when the proper time comes, and to the proper people.

**Date of Probe Secret.**  
It is regarded as virtually certain that when Attorney General McReynolds' investigation starts, these men will be called before the investigator and that their testimony will play a large part in the inquiry.

Dispatches from Washington Thursday said that the Attorney General refuses to make public the date the investigation will start, nor will he give out any of the details of the probe. It is understood, however, that it will be conducted by a civilian, along the lines of the probe recently made into conditions at the Leavenworth, Kans., penitentiary. Mr. McReynolds has stated that the investigation will be thorough, and that no stone will be left unturned to determine the truth of Hawthorne's and Moron's charges against Warden Moyer.

The latter has consistently demanded an investigation of the prison, though his friends have endeavored to prevent one being made. When Mr. Moyer was in Washington recently the Attorney General told him he would be held to a strict personal accounting for conditions at the prison, and it is probable that the Warden will lose his official head if the charges are sustained.

### ARMY GETS READY FOR ORDER TO INVADE

Mexican Prisons Filled by Huerta With Diaz's Friends, Whose Plot He Discovered.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30.—The Mexican situation assumed a more ominous aspect today when it was officially admitted for the first time that a heavy movement of troops toward the border is now in progress. It is a significant fact that the troops being sent southward are all cavalry. This force can move more rapidly than infantry if any invasion is ordered.

In the official announcement made by General Leonard Wood, chief of the United States army staff, it is stated that the troops sent to the border will "relieve" those now there. There is no doubt, however, that, if conditions warrant, all available forces will be held for immediate action.

A shift of troops at this time is regarded as ominous. The situation leads to the belief that the troops to be replaced really will not be replaced, but will be left at the border, augmenting the fighting force ordered southward.

**Order Confirmed by General Wood.**  
General Wood said: "Orders already have been given for the removal of the Second and Fifth Regiments of cavalry from Fort Bliss, Texas, and Fort Huachuca, Arizona, and their replacement by the Tenth and Fifteenth Cavalry. The Tenth Cavalry now is at Fort Ethan Allen, New York, and there will embark on army transport for Galveston, Texas, whence it will proceed overland to Arizona."

### RULING WILL BE KNOWN FRIDAY

Judge L. S. Roan, who is to deliver his decision Friday on a new trial for Leo M. Frank, was given a copy of the amended motion of Frank's attorneys Thursday for his approval.

Solicitor Dorney and Leonard Haas held a conference Thursday forenoon for the purpose of going over the amended motion and seeing that all of the references suggested by the Solicitor and ordered by the judge were properly incorporated. This done, the motion was submitted to Judge Roan for his signature and order of approval.

Judge Roan returned the motion Thursday in preparation for the announcement of his decision, paying particular attention to the allegations of bias against Henesee and Johnson and to a number of legal points involved in the defense's claim of error.

Some of the leading lawyers of the city who have been following the case expressed the opinion that, disregarding the contention that error had been committed, the defense had established a powerful reason for a retrial in the alleged bias of A. H. Henesee.

### Chance for New Trial

The chance for a new trial on this ground alone, they said, hinged on whether Judge Roan would accept the argument of Solicitor Dorney that Henesee, even if he made the remarks credited to him by the defense—which the State does not concede—need not have been prejudicial in the sense that he could not get into the jury box with mind open to the evidence, or whether the judge would hold with the defense that Henesee entertained an inextricable bias against the defendant.

The defense submitted affidavits from well-known citizens in Sparta, Monroe, Albany and Atlanta identifying that the signers had overheard Henesee not only express his belief in Frank's guilt, but roundly denounce him and say that he would like to have a hand in his punishment. There were eleven affidavits. Of these, Solicitor Dorney sought to impeach three. Attorneys Rosser and Arnold argued that if the Solicitor had been able to find anyone who would swear against the other eight he certainly would have done so.

### Lawyers Announce They Will Carry His Fight to the Last Ditch.

The anxiety which the solicitor (Frank) expressed if another trial is granted. I deplore, your honor, that a new trial would be such a boon to the judiciary that future trials would have to be under the guard of the militia, with bayonets and rifles standing by the presiding officer in the courts of justice.

**Convicted on Perjury Charge.**  
Attorney Rosen made the starting statement to Judge Roan that Frank was not convicted on the evidence that he was the murderer of Mary Phagan, but that he was tried and convicted solely on the "unsubstantiated and utterly false" tale of perjury that was told by the negro, Jim Conley, on the stand.

"You damned him the starting you brought in that false and filthy testimony," Rosen shouted at Solicitor Devey. "Democracy is the majority of all crimes. Once installed in the minds of the jurors the idea that a teacher is a degenerate and they will tumble over themselves in their eagerness to believe him guilty of murder or any other crime in the whole calendar.

"The law guarantees to a man the privilege of being tried only for the crime with which he formally is charged and on the charge which he is brought into court to answer. The law specifically declares that no evidence may be brought in of any independent, distinct and wholly disconnected crime.

"Yet this was done in Frank's case to his extreme injury and irreparable harm. Crimes were charged against him for which there was no warrant in fact and of which there was no evidence except that of the miserable lying negro.

"The testimony was inadmissible. There is no question about that. We believe your honor made it out when the defense made its most emphatic objection. That this motion was not made until the jury had been under cross-examination a day and a half did not diminish the force of the motion. The court did not relieve the court from its duty to have stricken from the record all the testimony of Jim Conley. Your honor, we contend, was led into error, and this furnished more than sufficient ground in itself for a new trial."

### Defenses Affidavits

Attorney Rosen made much of his attention to the manner in which Solicitor Devey and the detectives had conducted the investigation into the murder mystery and the prosecution of Frank.

He then alluded to the charges of prejudice and bias which the defense had lodged against the jurors. A. H. Hamble and Marceline Johnson. He spread out the affidavits against these men and declared that in view of the prominence reputation and character of the affiants there could be no doubt of the truth of the charges.

The lawyer began the address when the hearing opened at 9 o'clock and concluded about 4:45 in the afternoon.

### Illinois Guardsmen Ordered Ready

CHICAGO, Oct. 26.—Colonel Milton J. Foreman, commander of the First Cavalry of the Illinois National Guard, today issued a call for 1,000 volunteers. They will be organized into three new troops which will complete the regiment. Governor Danneberg has issued an order that the troops hold themselves in readiness for marching orders.

Although General Wood, chief of staff of the army, in a circular issued in Washington, said that the Fifth Cavalry, which will leave Fort Sheridan tomorrow, was being sent south to relieve the Second Regiment, the move was considered important to army officials in Chicago and the urgency of the move was also commented upon.

### Wilson to Demand Huerta's Resignation

WASHINGTON, Oct. 26.—That President Wilson is preparing a demand upon General Huerta calling upon the Provisional President of Mexico to resign his office immediately is a report that is current in official circles today. It is circulated even at the White House without denial.

President Wilson is expected to issue before Huerta the ultimatum of putting the interests of Mexico before his organizations, or of withdrawing himself in power notwithstanding that he is now considered a legitimate Mexican ruler.

President Wilson, now so well-to-do with the assistance of the United States, is expected to be withdrawing the powers of his office until he is certain of the support of the chief European powers in the United States. Even if the ultimatum can not be obtained, however, it is expected that he will issue his statement, and trust to the moral influence of the United States to effect the elimination of Huerta.

He is expected to grant the Constitutionalists such recognition as will not enhance the chances of their ultimate success.

It does not pretend to know what action President Wilson will take on the new developments in Mexico, said Senator Borah, who will attend a conference with the President today. "It seems inevitable that a new policy based upon the results of the election must be forthcoming. There may be a call upon the United States to deal in a positive manner with a situation which rapidly is becoming intolerable."

Among the President's advisers on the situation today was Sidney Brooks, an English writer on international affairs. Brooks, who has been sent to the United States by the British government to ascertain the facts of the situation, was reported to have returned from the United States in Mexico.

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 26.—Every prominent supporter of Diaz is being secretly arrested on orders issued by General Huerta. Many have been arrested in the federal district and at Vera Cruz. Among the prisoners are wealthy men who furnished the funds for the Diaz presidential campaign.

It became known today for the first time that the conspiracy aimed at putting Diaz in power in Huerta's stead was widespread. The plot, which had fully worked out that it was necessary only to get Diaz's signature on the supporters to make a formidable result. Diaz, weakened, however, some of his supporters really criticized him in public and this gave Huerta the clew that resulted in the arrests. It is believed that the conspirators had just in time. If he had delayed five hours he would have been arrested. An hour before it became known here that he was on the run. Boat-whaling an order for his formal arrest on a charge of sedition was drawn up. This is still standing, but no attempt will be made to serve it unless he lands on Mexican soil.

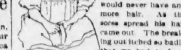

# RECORDER BROYLES SEES ABOLITION OF WHIPPING IN HOMES AND SCHOOLS

I am in favor of the rod only in cases of absolute necessity in the home.

I do not believe the rod should be tolerated at all in our schools.

If an offending child can be corrected without being whipped it is much better for both child and parent.

The rod is a relic of barbarism and is destined to be banished from our modern life.

I must admit, however, that the time for its abolishment has not arrived.—From Recorder Broyles' interview.

Recorder Nath Broyles is strongly of the opinion that the day is not far distant when corporal punishment for children, both in the home and in school, will be regarded as barbarous and when the training and correction of youngsters will be accomplished by precept and kind words.

The Recorder has closely studied the question of punishment for children for their varied petty offenses against the discipline of home, and has well defined views on this subject. He expressed these views Wednesday morning in an interview with the Georgian, advancing opposition to the whipping of children as a general proposition.

He referred to the rod as a relic of barbarism, and said he hoped to see the time come in his own day when in reality it would be a mere relic in every sense of the word. He added significantly, however, that this time has not arrived, and that there is yet place in modern, everyday life for this little instrument, regarded by the offending juvenile as a retorting weapon of oppression.

"Rod Sometimes Necessary," said Broyles. "I am in favor of the rod only in cases of absolute necessity," said Judge Broyles. "This applies to use in the home. I do not believe it should be tolerated at all in our schools."

"There are some instances of instances of home rules that demand the rod. In such cases, it is not justice, and I believe, tends to a betterment of home government." But in his opinion, a child should not be whipped unless he has been thoroughly tried and have proved a failure.

"If an offending child can be corrected and shown the error of its way without being whipped, it is much better for both the child and the parents. In many instances, the rod serves only to terrify and cow the child, and instill in his subconscious fear of his parents. Correction through love and kindness, I believe, is conclusive to a much better development of the heart and disposition.

"In my opinion, it is a mistake to permit corporal punishment in our schools. The teacher has other means by which she can correct a child rather than by the rod. I think a far savor punishment is to keep the child in the schoolroom during recess, while the other children are out in the fresh air running and playing.

"The city of children I feel about it when I was in school. I didn't mind a whipping near so much. The teacher said she imposed demerit for any infraction of school rules. This is the moral dread of the average child because of the consequences at home."

"If a child becomes so disobedient that a thrashing is the only thing that will suffice, the punishment should be inflicted in the hands of the parents. I don't think the teacher should attempt to whip a child. The teacher could write a note to the parents explaining the offense of the child and recommending a whipping. It is necessary because of the consequences depending the child must be shown that a whipping has been administered.

"The rod is nothing more than a relic of barbarism and is destined finally to be banished from our modern life. Correction through love and kindness, I believe, is conclusive to a much better development of the heart and disposition.

"In my opinion, it is a mistake to permit corporal punishment in our schools. The teacher has other means by which she can correct a child rather than by the rod. I think a far savor punishment is to keep the child in the schoolroom during recess, while the other children are out in the fresh air running and playing.

"The city of children I feel about it when I was in school. I didn't mind a whipping near so much. The teacher said she imposed demerit for any infraction of school rules. This is the moral dread of the average child because of the consequences at home."

"If a child becomes so disobedient that a thrashing is the only thing that will suffice, the punishment should be inflicted in the hands of the parents. I don't think the teacher should attempt to whip a child. The teacher could write a note to the parents explaining the offense of the child and recommending a whipping. It is necessary because of the consequences depending the child must be shown that a whipping has been administered.

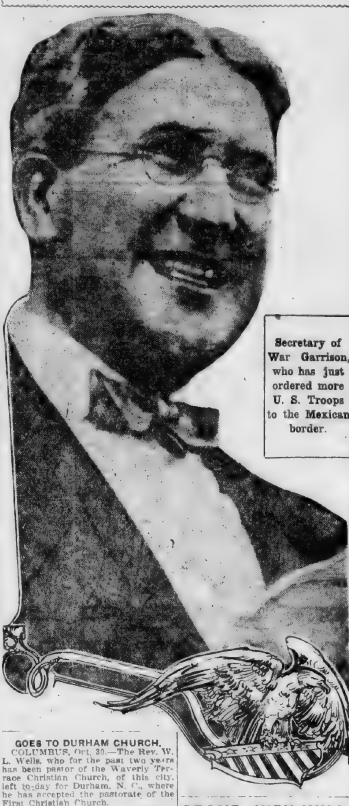

Texas, and Fort Huachuca, Arizona, and their replacement by the Tenth and Fifteenth Cavalry. The Tenth Cavalry now is at Fort Ethan Allen, Vt. It will be moved by rail to New York and there will embark on an army transport for Galveston, Texas, whence it will proceed overland to Arizona.

In the meantime the three squadrons of the Fifteenth Cavalry which now are located at Fort Leavenworth and proceed southward to Fort Bliss, relieving the Second Regiment. Both the Second and Fifth Regiments will be relieved of border duty and moved to posts in the North, the Fifth going to Fort Ethan Allen and the Second being divided between Fort Myers and Leavenworth.

# Wilson to Demand Huerta's Resignation.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30.—That President Wilson is preparing a demand upon General Huerta calling upon the Provisional President of Mexico to resign his office immediately is a report that is current in official circles today. It is circulated even at the White House with some hesitancy.

President Wilson is expected to place before Huerta the alternative of either resigning his office or withdrawing himself from power notwithstanding the intervention of the United States in Mexico's interest.

President Wilson now is believed to be withholding the issuance of his note until he is certain of the support of the chief European powers in the stand he has taken. Even if this support can not be obtained, however, it is expected that he will issue his statement, and urge to the moral indignation of the United States to effect the elimination of Huerta.

# Prisons Filled With Plotters for Diaz.

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 30.—Every prominent supporter of Felix Diaz is being secretly arrested on orders issued by General Huerta. Many have been taken in the Federal district and at Vera Cruz. Among the prisoners are wealthy men who furnished the funds for the Diaz presidential campaign.

It became known to-day for the first time that the conspiracy against Diaz in power in Huerta's stead was widespread. The plot was so carefully worked out that it was necessary only to wait for an opportunity to lead his supporters to make a formidable front. Diaz was not approved. Some of his supporters rashly criticized him in public and this gave the clue that resulted in their capture.

# FORT McPHERSON TROOPS READY FOR ACTION

"The troops at all the Southern army posts are in good condition and ready for any emergency," Lieutenant Tucker, aide to General Robert K. Iverson, commander of the Department of the Gulf, United States Army, declared when he returned to Atlanta, Thursday, after accompanying General Evans on a month's inspection tour of the posts in the Southern territory.

General Evans will not return to Atlanta until about November 10, having accepted invitations to deliver several addresses in Mississippi on behalf of the Army League, an organization which is endeavoring to interest the people of the United States in the army.

Lieutenant Tucker declared that the equipment at all the forts was found to be in excellent shape, and that the entire Southern division is prepared for instant movement.

The posts at Little Rock and at Fort Bliss, Ark., were among those inspected by General Evans, and the troops at both places were active and fully equipped. General Evans also spent several days at the "fire school" at Fort Sill, where tests are made of field guns.

McPherson Expects Order.

While the officers at Fort McPherson are relaxed concerning the prospect of an invasion of Mexico, it is known that they are anxiously awaiting orders from the War Department in Washington to send the Seventeenth Infantry for the border, and everything is being prepared for the instant movement of the regiment.

The troops at the fort have been active for some time, and have just returned from a tour of inspection. Within the past few weeks the equipment has been put on a war basis, and everything made ready for field service.

The plan of reorganization of the United States Army proposed by the general staff, which will be brought to the attention of Congress and strenuous efforts made to obtain its enactment, has been received at the local army headquarters in the Cavalry Building.

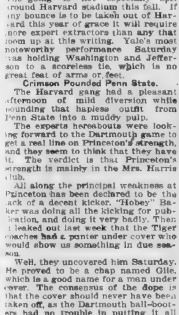

Wireless Telephony, Now an Established Fact, Will Make It Possible for the Human Voice Soon to Travel Around the World.

By GARRETT P. SERVISS

THERE is no longer the slightest doubt that the time is coming, and perhaps close at hand, when we shall habitually talk to one another at distances of hundreds, or even thousands of miles without the intervention of any wires connecting the speaker with the hearer.

Wireless telephony is an established fact, but the apparatus still needs development before it can come into general, everyday use and displace the existing telephonic system.

There is something weirdly impressive in the thought of transmitting the feeble human voice over continents and seas, and making it virtually encircle the earth. Man speaks and his planet hears! At his command a little electric demon transmits his voice into waves that traverse the ether with the speed of light.

More, there, anywhere on the surface of the earth other little electric demons vibrate upon the speeding waves and change them back again into the human voice. Was anything equally marvelous ever imagined about the power of our imaginations to create?

Many inventors are working upon the problem of making wireless telephony at great distances commercially successful. It is probable that several different systems will be perfected, but the base of all is the same. It is always the electric waves that carry the impulses transmitted by the human organ of speech. Ready to be retransmitted, when they reach their destination, into articulate words. The difficulties are purely technical. There are American systems, German systems, French systems, Italian systems, and all of them are more or less successful.

As far as I am aware, the record of distance at present is held by Mr. Vanak, the director of the tele-

graphic institute of Rome. He has transmitted human speech by electric waves from Rome to Sicily, from Rome to Tripoli, across the Mediterranean Sea. The greatest distance yet attained by him is a thousand kilometers--about 620 miles. For shorter distances the transmission is easy not only by his apparatus, but by others.

Carries Voice Infinitely Quicker Than Sound Could Do It. One curious fact about wireless telephony is that it carries the voice almost infinitely quicker than it could be transmitted by sound, provided that sound could be heard so far. A sound wave would require more than three-quarters of an hour to go 60 miles through the air; an electric wave goes that distance in one-third-hundredth of a second! Practically we may say that the transmission is instantaneous.

Another thing of course, true of simple signals transmitted by wireless telephony, is that it could go round the earth in about one-seventh of a second. This fact is about to be taken advantage of in order to ascertain more accurately than it is known at present the longitude of Washington. It is planned in winter this year, and continuing until April next, signals are to be exchanged for this purpose between the Eiffel Tower in Paris and the Naval Radio Station at Arlington near Washington.
