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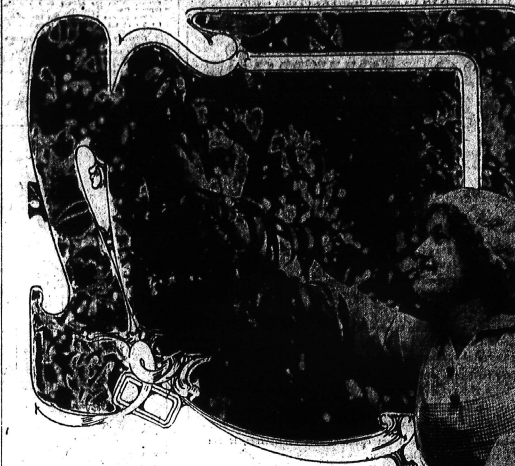

#### WOULD DIE TO GET VOTES, SAYS MILITANT

**Miss Annie Kenney Makes Impassioned Plea in Court in Defense of Women**

(By Associated Press.)

LONDON, June 17.—An impassioned plea in defense of the outrage committed by militant suffragettes was delivered today in the central criminal court by Miss Annie Kenney, on trial for conspiracy.

Her address asked to explain, the speaker said, why she and her comrades should be punished for the crime of "conspiracy to defame the king." She said she would die willingly, "if I have got to die to get the vote," she said, "I will die willingly, whatever the verdict of the jury."

Greater interest was taken in today's proceedings than in any previous stage of the trial. The court room was crowded. Women formed the majority of the audience among them being Mrs. W. F. Wood, the wife of the prisoner, and Miss Kenney, daughter of the prisoner.

Miss Kenney asserted that the fact that she had been arrested on the charge of conspiracy to defame the king, was not a disgrace, but a source of pride.

#### ARRRESTED FOR BIGAMY, WADE DENIES CHARGES

**Man from Unadilla, Ga., Held on Telegram from Home Town**

Up until a week ago, says Wade, he was master mechanic for the King Oil & Lumber company, of Unadilla. He came to Atlanta on the 10th to work for the American tire company, he says, in the construction of the Healy building.

"I am an eighty-year-old and married," declared Wade, "but I've got my wife here. I can't account for this charge, unless some fellow woman had a grudge against me and decided to set me up."

A few years ago, Wade continued, "a man whom I knew to be already married was trying to elope with a girl in Augusta. I broke it up, and he got sore at me. I suppose this is the way of taking revenge on me, to tell a lie based on his own polygamous convictions."

A dispatch from Unadilla says that Wade is wanted there because he married Miss Lockman on May 11, when he already had a wife and children living in Columbus. It says further that Wade is wanted in Unadilla a week ago because of this alleged marriage. It says that he worked for only a few weeks in Unadilla and was little known there.
