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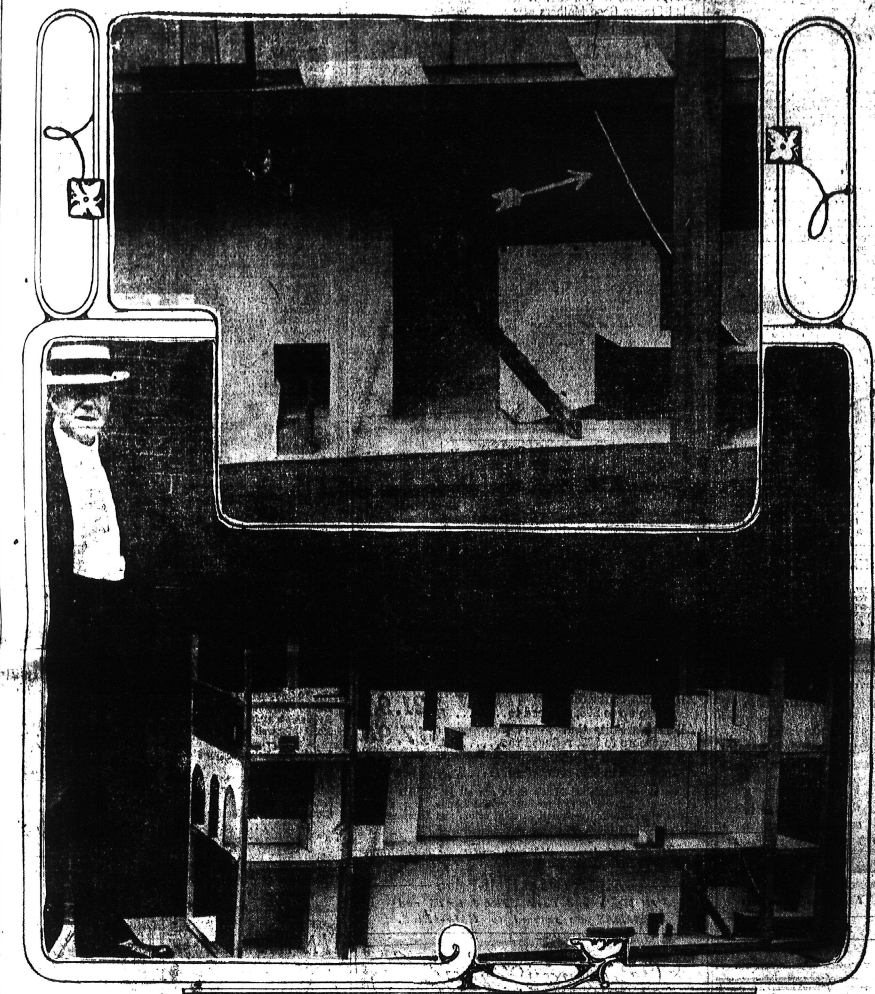

BANKERS FROM WEST ASK U. S. FOR \$25,000,000

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8.—At a conference today between treasury officials and bankers of the central west regarding the distribution of government deposits to help move crops, Assistant Secretary Williams declared the treasury was prepared to deposit \$25,000,000 if necessary. The official plan called for \$100,000,000. The exact amount will be determined after the bankers' views have been ascertained. Bankers of Chicago and Indianapolis were asked to prepare a report on the amount of deposits to be secured by state and other bonds, exclusive of government bonds and by commercial paper. Treasury department probably would issue an additional security of \$100,000,000 in United States bonds.

HOUSE-PASSES MEDICAL PRACTICE REFORM BILL

The medical practice bill, amended and still carrying sweeping restrictions of the practice of medicine in this state, was passed by the house Friday by a vote of 121 to 3. This measure bill introduced by Senator Long. As it was passed in amended form, it will have to go back to the senate for action on the amendments. The main amendment was the increase of the board of state examiners from eight to ten members, five of whom shall be allopaths, three a lectric and two homeopaths. The bill is almost entirely against quackery. "There are other regulations, one in relation to the measure provides that, each member of the board of medical examiners must have practiced five years in the state, and that no more than one member shall be a graduate of a medical school. Huerta's Message Received At White House, But Lind Will Go Ahead to Mexico

When Lind Arrives, the Proposal He Carries Will Be Made Public in Washington, in Mexico City and to All Governments of the World, in the Hope That Public Opinion Will Force a Peaceful Settlement. (By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, Aug. 8.—After a conference with President Wilson at the White House early today, Secretary Bryan announced that they had today received the message from Manuel Huerta, acting minister of foreign affairs in Mexico, declaring his belief that Mexico would be considerably benefited unless he brought recognition of the Huerta government. The message had been transmitted through the American embassy at Mexico City, but was transmitted during the night and was presented only today to President Wilson. MOTORMAN AND CONDUCTOR SAY NEWSBOY EPPS WAS NOT ON CAR THAT BROUGHT MARY TO CITY

They Swear That She Left Car at Broad and Hunter Streets at 12:10, the Very Hour Monteen Stover Claims to Have Left Factory—Daisy Hopkins Swears She Never Visited Factory, With Dalton and That She Did Not Know Frank. NEW THEORY OF HOW CRIME MIGHT HAVE BEEN COMMITTED. INTIMATED BY ENGINEER'S TESTIMONY. Albert Kauffman Describes Passageway on First Floor Leading to Chute, Through Which He Declares Human Body Could Easily Have Passed—Spots, Said to Be Blood, Found in Passageway.

A new theory of the Mary Phagan murder was hinted at by the witness at the trial of Leo M. Frank Friday while Albert Kauffman, a civil engineer, was under examination. From questions asked by Attorney Arnold, Mr. Kauffman testified that there was a chute in the rear of the National Penitentiary factory building leading from the first floor down into the basement and that the trap door to this chute was large enough to slide a human body through. In fact, he said it was large enough to slide several bodies through at the same moment. He told of a first and narrow hallway leading from the rear of the building by the stairway back to the rear by the trap door. Many questions were asked concerning this hallway and chute and trial observers believe that the defense is preparing a way for introduction of other testimony possibly bearing out the theory that the child was murdered just as she would to leave the building, was taken to the basement, this dark hallway and dropped through the chute into the basement. Questions were asked the engineer about a vat in the metal room. He declared that it was plenty large enough to hold the body of a girl who measured five feet and three inches tall.

BLOOD IN DARK PASSAGEWAY?

It is known that the defense has found dark red spots, presumed to be blood, on a door leading to the dark passageway, which goes to the rear of the building and to the chute, to which the body was said to have been taken. The dark spots on the door have been clipped off and analyzed, the result of which is not known.

This circumstance is certain to be used by the defense in an effort to show that the murder could have been committed on the first floor without the knowledge of the defendant. Indications were, after the defense had been introducing testimony several days, that the jury will agree that there is a possibility that the body of the girl who was murdered had been carried to the basement. It is known that a search of the basement of the factory was made by the police and that no body was found. The testimony given by George Epps, the newsboy who said that he rode to town with Mary Phagan on her last trip shortly before she met death at the National Penitentiary factory, was repudiated by two witnesses, W. M. Matthews, motorman, and W. T. Hollis, conductor, on the English street line. They testified that they each saw the girl Phagan at 12:10 on Friday street and that she was alone at the time. Both were positive that they never saw George Epps at that time.

Matthews testified that Mary Phagan did not leave the car at Marietta street as was sworn by the newsboy, but remained on it until the car reached Hunter and Broad and left in company with another girl going toward the penitentiary factory. The girl who was with her was identified by the witness as Daisy Hopkins. He declared that his car was on schedule lines and passed Hunter and Broad at 12:10 o'clock. IMPORTANT WITNESSES FOR DEFENSE

After proving the correctness of the cardboard model of the Penitentiary factory made by T. H. Willett, of 100 Highland avenue, who made it from Kauffman's blue prints, the defense, it is understood, will call Darley or Hollis to the stand, to contradict statements made by the negro witness. The next witness is expected to be Herbert Schell, Frank's young assistant at the factory, and his is one of the most important of the state's witnesses. Mr. Schell, it is said, testified that subsequent to the murder, when the police were there and there was considerable excitement, he found Conley hiding under a pile of boxes on one of the upper floors and apparently very much frightened.

Schell will also identify the financial statement made out by Frank on the afternoon of the murder, and will show the tediousness of the work, and will declare that it certainly took the superintendent several hours to complete it. The journal has learned that there is little doubt, now, that the defense will not question the character of Frank in issue. This means that the trial will be postponed some time, as fifty or more well-known citizens are ready to swear to the good character of the defendant.
