PLUMBING THIEF GANG CAPTURED BY DETECTIVES

Officers Think They Have Caught Criminals Who Loot Vacant Residences

The city detectives are convinced Friday that at last they have rounded up the gang of thieves who for a year or more have been plundering vacant houses, carrying away all the plumbing fixtures and piping, which sometimes they were unable to cart away.

Charged with the numerous burglaries of four negroes from getting the detectives already have recovered about \$1,000 worth of brass and copper wire in custody. Plumbing thieves have during the last year damaged various houses in the city to the extent of probably \$10,000, according to the detective reports, and most of this work was done, they charge, by the gang just rounded up.

HUNDRED HORSES ROBBED. More than a hundred different vacant houses, some of them new structures, which had never been occupied, have been entered by plumbing thieves in the past few months, and the piping and fixtures torn out and carried away. In each instance the thieves did damage to the extent of many dollars to secure junk worth only a few cents.

Police Seek Small Boy Used as Burglar Tool

As the result of a burglary on Edgewood avenue Thursday night the city detectives are searching for a gang of burglars, one member, small boy probably about twelve years of age. The dry goods store operated at 200 Edgewood avenue by Max Yuleson was entered during the night and about \$150 worth of goods stolen. Entrance was gained by a small boy who lifted or who climbed through a barred rear window in the establishment, and then unlocked the back door for his confederates. The space between the bars is very narrow, and the police are confident that no one except a small boy could have climbed through them.

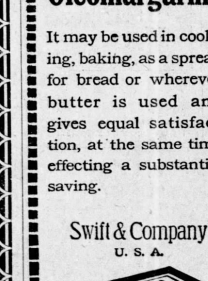

TURNER UNCORKS HOT REPLY TO CHAMBERS

Says He Has Some Questions to Ask Concerning Former Councilman's Record

In reply to charges preferred against him by the Cotton States Electric company through Adolph Chambers, its attorney, City Electrician Turner announced Friday that he would make Mr. Chambers two questions.

First, I will ask him, said the electrician, "if it is not true that the Georgia Railway and Power company contributed a large sum of money—several thousand dollars—to his campaign for last year when he ran for mayor, the contribution being made through Thomas K. Glenn, president of the Atlanta city company, whose brother, W. H. Glenn, is a vice president of the Georgia Railway and Power company?"

Second, I will ask him if it is true that a representative of the Barber Asphalt company met with other representatives of Atlanta in a hotel room in New York during the summer of 1912 and paid over to them a sum of money.

In the summer of 1912 Mr. Chambers, then a member of council, and with an aide named Atlanta, a county commissioner-elect of Fulton county, took an extended trip through the state.

"I think by the time I got through with Mr. Chambers the public will be able to see in one word record needs investigation."

As for his charges, they are vague and not specific. If he has anything specific to charge against me, let him charge it. I'm not the man to investigate. I want to be investigated. I may Friday morning and told him it was my desire that he approve the resolution ordering the investigation."

A DEBT TO COLOMBIA

A perplexing problem confronting the United States, growing out of acquisition of the Canal Zone

By WILLIE J. ABBOT, Author of "Panama and the Canal in Picture and Prose"

Out of the "perplexing" nature of the department of state in Washington, there comes an occasional word about a debt owing by the United States to the Republic of Colombia. The diplomats are never prone to be exceedingly explicit in what they tell about their business, and the department sent out from Washington are apt to be written as if the country as a whole knew exactly what was the matter with Colombia, and why it owed her a sum seemingly plus \$100,000,000, and just why an offer is not made to pay it, and the Colombians refuse to consider taking it.

Ten years is a long period in the public mind, and it is probably safe to assume that many have forgotten the things that happened on the Isthmus of Panama in 1903, and which Colombia had not forgotten. The French had a partially canal down there, and a railroad across the Isthmus. They wanted to sell both to the United States for \$40,000,000, but the franchise for their canal was not available. All they could offer was the dilapidated machinery, the abandoned diggings and the railroad. To make these of any particular value a treaty with Colombia was necessary. One was negotiated, offering \$10,000,000 for the franchise, and the other, for \$40,000,000, for the canal and the railroad. The treaty called for the return of the Isthmus to Colombia, and the Colombians were to be paid \$10,000,000.

In Washington was President Theodore Roosevelt, keenly desirous that work on the canal should be begun under his administration. In Washington, too, were representatives of the French, who were very desirous of making that \$10,000,000. There were also representatives of the United States, desirous to see the canal built, and to see the Isthmus of Panama as a province of Colombia. What was the result?

There were Panama secret agents in Washington. President Roosevelt was still eager to dig that canal. Rumors of revolution were heard in Panama. The Colombian envoy at Washington telegraphed warnings to Bogotá. The Colombian authorities, desiring the help of the garrison at Panama City, telegraphed the commanders of two

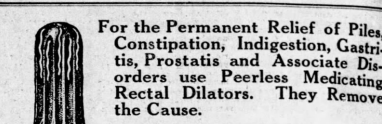
INVESTIGATE RELATIONS OF U. S. AND ORIENT

DEMAND PROBE OF CITY ELECTRICIAN'S CONDUCT

Cotton States Electric Co. Charges Turner With Misuse of Office

The Cotton States Electric company, through its attorney, Adley Chambers, Thursday afternoon filed written charges against City Electrician H. C. Turner to the effect that the electrical contractors of Atlanta are organized in an association, that Turner is under financial obligation to this association; that he has used his official position to compel members of the association to send him money, and that in appointing electrical examiners to examine applicants for electrician's licenses he has named men suggested by the association.

The charges were filed with the electric light committee of council and the city board of electrical control acting jointly, and will be formally heard beginning next Monday afternoon. The company demands a specific answer in writing to each article of the charges and demands the right to introduce witnesses on each article. The charges should Turner deny them.

Speaking for the committee, Attorney Chambers states that they may ask the board to impose discipline against H. C. Turner if they prove all they have charged, and more if necessary.

CHARGES FOLLOWED BY CONVICTION. The charges are the outgrowth of a row between Turner and the Cotton States company over various jobs of wiring the company's office in this city. The company's office is in Birmingham. The company's office in Birmingham approved its work in several buildings and then it was discovered that Turner had tampered with the work in several buildings, thereby damaging the company.

The company Thursday afternoon asked the joint committee to direct Turner to release its license so that it might examine in business pending the investigation of the charges against the electrician. This request Turner himself granted without direction from the committee.

Turner, who has in the past fought his own battles, was prepared to do the same Thursday afternoon and was keeping Attorney Chambers busy replying to his charges, when Carl Hutchinson, a member of the Atlanta bar, in his appearance with some law books under his arm, among others being a city code, and announced he was going to represent his friend, the city electrician, in the capacity of attorney.

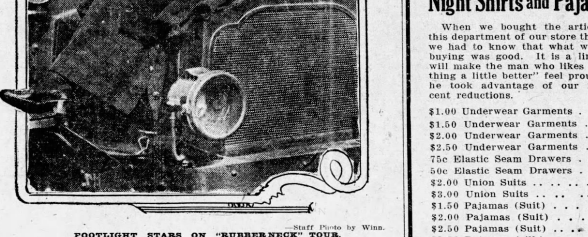

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THE POSTAL SERVICE

XV—MONEY ORDERS AND REGISTERED MAIL, BY FREDERIC J. HASKIN.

There are more than 20,000 postoffices in the United States, where almost without a checking account in a bank may go and buy exchange in the shape of postal money orders. The people avail themselves of this facility to the extent of some \$1,000,000 monthly.

A graphic idea of the size of the money order system of the country may be gathered from the statement that although the average fee for issuing money orders is less than 6 cents, the total receipts of the postoffice department from these small fees amount to about \$5,000,000 a year.

As a general rule, the second-class postoffice account of money orders issued and paid in the amount of money orders issued, while in the larger of the two classes, the money orders issued are more than the value of those issued. The department never kept for redemption.

In the international money order business each country remits its frequent intervals to the other countries of the money order union, sufficient to cover the excess of orders issued by it over the value of the orders received.

These remittances are made through bills of exchange and a total of \$1,500,000 a week goes abroad in the form of bills of exchange.

It has been recognized for a long time that the restriction of the money order system against payment of any amount in excess of \$100 is a disadvantage of the system.

One of the difficulties that hitherto have been encountered in the handling of money order business has been the necessity of auditing the money order accounts of the 50,000 postoffices of the country.

With the extension of the money order system to the issuance of additional postoffices, there is a slight tendency for the number of registered letters sent out each day to increase.

The bulk of the registered mail of the country is handled in pouches carrying rotary locks, keys to which are possessed only by postmasters and others having direct occasion to open them.

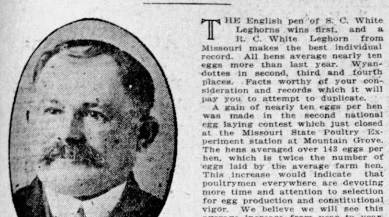
