Dependent because detective had made a case against him, George W. Bredlove, aged manager of the Pryor hotel, swallowed several ounces of carbolic acid in his room at the hotel, 1-12 South Pryor street, Saturday morning and was dead within four or five minutes.

His death is said to have resulted from brooding over trouble which occurred Friday night. At that time, according to employees of the hotel, Bredlove sat at the desk when a railroad man came in and asked for a room.

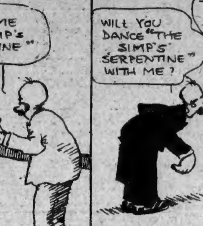
