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MAYOR THREATENS TO SLUG CUMMINGS WITH MOUTH WELL

Proposal to Allow Fire Chief to Enter Woodward's Private Office Aroused the Mayor's Fighting Tendencies

CUMMINGS' SECRETARY WAS SENT FOR INSTEAD

Councilman Lee Didn't Want to Give Department Any Hearing at All, but Secretary Was Allowed to Appear

Heroic Attempt of Six-Year Old Boy Fails to Save Child

Little Jack Langley Endangers Self in Effort to Save Brother From Flames

In spite of a heroic attempt at rescue made by Jack Langley, 6 years old, little Oscar Langley, 4 years old, son of Jack and Mrs. W. Langley, of 1135 West Peachtree street, was fatally burned at 11 o'clock Tuesday morning.

The baby brother was alone in the front room, and there he was playing with his toys.

Jack Langley, on the front porch, heard screams from Oscar, and then saw the flames, and rushed toward the house, with his clothing and hat flying.

Jack, crying for help, took Oscar by the hand and ran with him to the back porch. The flames had by this time surrounded the smaller boy, his clothing and hair having been almost burned off.

Jack, calling for his mother, took a cup and poured water from a bucket on the back porch over Oscar's head. This was of little use, however.

The baby's screams were heard by the mother, who was at the front of the back of the house, and ran toward the Langley's house.

The mother reached the porch and found the child lying motionless. Oscar's clothing had practically burned themselves off. The little boy, a mass of charred bones, was lying on the porch.

Jack, crying pitifully, was still pouring cups of water on Oscar's head.

The crowd gathered around the house was large. The fire department was called, and the ambulance was sent for.

At a late hour this afternoon the ambulance arrived with Oscar. The child was taken to the hospital, but he was not expected to live.

The burns extended over his entire body. The mother is prostrated with grief.

Jack Langley escaped without injury.

FIREMEN ARE KEPT BUSY FIGHTING CONFLAGRATIONS

Four Alarms Sound in Rapid Succession in Widely Separated Sections—No Persons Seriously Injured

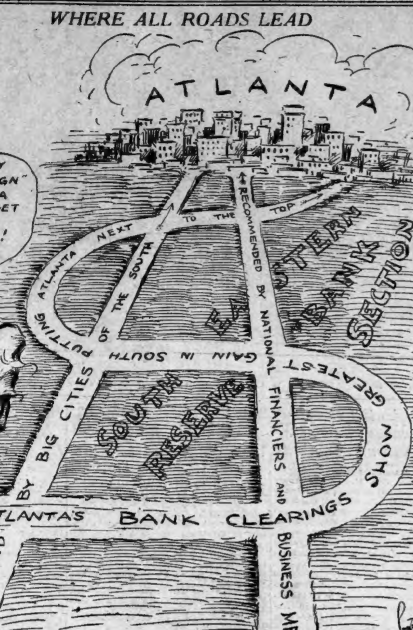

NEW YORK, Jan. 14.—Four fires in rapid succession in widely separated parts of the city caused intense suffering to nearly 1,000 tenants this morning while the conflagration raged around zero.

The first blaze in a rowing lodge house drew 120 firefighters to that structure, 408 from a lodging house adjoining and 25 families from tenement houses. Half an hour later 150 men, women and children were forced into the icy streets from the Glenside, an apartment hotel in Harlem.

Before this blaze was extinguished fifteen families were routed from a burning five-story apartment house at Sixty-first street and Columbus avenue. While the blaze was in progress, fire attacked a lower East Side tenement, driving 300 to the streets.

\$250,000 LOSS IN WHITEHALL STREET FIRE

Principal Losers Cotton States Belting and Supply Co., B. F. Avery and Sons, Mrs. E. Z. Black and J. R. Smith

A fire loss of approximately \$250,000, as the destruction of the factory and business at 314 and 316 Whitehall street, will be sustained among the Cotton States Belting and Supply company, B. F. Avery and Sons, Mrs. E. Z. Black and J. R. Smith, the building company, and the contents of both buildings and their contents.

Starting about 11 o'clock Tuesday night, the fire continued until early Wednesday morning. It originated in the Cotton States Belting and Supply company's building, where there was no night watchman. Whitehall is a narrow street, and the fire spread rapidly. The fire department arrived at the scene about 11:30 p. m. and worked until 1:30 a. m. when the fire was finally extinguished. The building and its contents were completely destroyed.

John W. Pennington, of the Police court, said Wednesday that he had served to buy the building and its contents. The deal had not been closed yet.

The Cotton States Belting and Supply company moved the little there was left to move, back to 9 South Street, Wednesday morning. There was a former establishment, recently vacated for the new building. The company will hold an inventory of the business in temporary quarters.

Other damage was done. A one-story frame dwelling, adjoining the Avery building, occupied by James Taylor and his family, was burned like paper after the furniture had been saved. The next dwelling, a two-story frame house occu-

pled by J. Carlin and family, caught on fire repeatedly notwithstanding that two streams of water were playing constantly upon it. Fire brands carried into the air by the big configuration of smoke on other roofs in all that section part of the city and were a constant menace. Volunteer fire-fighters formed bucket brigades and saved much residence property from this danger.

Water pressure was low and hindered greatly the work of the firemen, according to Chief Cummings. At 11 o'clock the chief telephoned to headquarters of the waterworks department and urged a better pressure at once. He said that the number of streams played on the fire, and not their force, had it in check. The whole fire department was engaged, except some emergency apparatus. Thousands of spectators gathered in the surrounding streets and pressed against the fire lines.

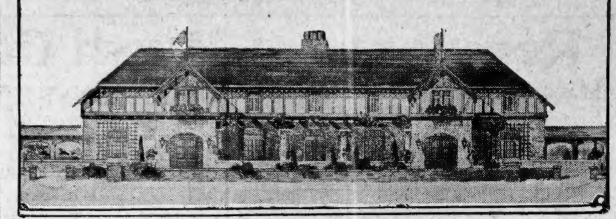

ERUPTIONS OF VOLCANO AWK-INSPIRING SCENE

Hundreds of Persons Crushed to Death as They Flew From Their Homes

(By Associated Press.) NAGASAKI, Japan, Jan. 14.—A vivid description of the awe-inspiring scene on the island of Sakura during the eruption and tidal wave of Monday was given today by the captain of a Japanese steamer which arrived here from Kagoshima. The captain rescued 300 persons.

It was perilous to approach the land, he says, "as columns of water burst up continuously from the gulf, while on the land pillars of fire rose into the air from the acres of blasting volcanoes. At the same time smoke and cattle ran pell-mell toward the beach in a wild effort to escape."

"The disaster at Kagoshima was almost indescribable," declared Judge Urabe, a refugee from that town. "On the evening of January 12 two volcanoes in Kagoshima erupted up and fell in the very bed of the harbor. Refugees were crowded into their houses, and many were killed. The water was so high that many of the houses were carried away. I saw many people carrying their families on their backs and fleeing toward the sea. Others were crushed to death with them and their homes."

"Hundreds stood along the shore unable to find any means of escape. Some of them waved towels and clothing attached to bamboo poles to attract attention."

WIDENING OF PEACHTREE
DRAGED BY R. F. MADDOX

Former Mayor Asks Finance
Committee to Give \$25,-
000 for Project

That the proposed widening of Peachtree street would be more to relieve traffic congestion than any other plan, is the opinion of Ex-Mayor Robert F. Maddox, who appeared before the finance committee Tuesday to urge an appropriation of \$25,000 for the project.

Mr. Maddox stated to the committee that the property owners along Peachtree from Harris street to the intersection of Pryor and Forsyth are holding up millions of dollars' worth of work waiting for the city to make the appropriation of \$25,000 necessary to commence the work.

The proposed plan, as outlined by Mr. Maddox, is to widen Peachtree street 20 feet between Ellis and Harris streets, making a street 100 feet wide instead of the present 60-foot wide, and to make the street 70 feet wide between the junction of Pryor and Forsyth and Ellis streets.

"This widening of the 'bottle-neck' on Peachtree is bound to come sooner or later, as a necessity to relieve the congested traffic of Atlanta's greatest street," said Mr. Maddox to the committee. "And the work ought to be completed at once."

Property owners are now waiting on the action of the city to spend millions of dollars along the present 'bottle-neck' section of Peachtree. As to whether the city should spend the money to widen the street, Mr. Maddox is waiting until the street widened to develop any property on the corner of Peachtree and Ellis, and many other property owners are in exactly the same position as Mr. Candier and myself.

AGREEMENT IS SIGNED.
Mr. Maddox said that an agreement was reached between the property owners and the city to widen Peachtree street and already been given by the property owners, and that an agreement had been signed by the city between Harris and Ellis streets to give the feet on both sides of the street.

Mr. Maddox told the committee that he appeared before them to urge the proposed improvement, but stated that a citizen he thought, the widening of the Peachtree bottle at this point was a necessity to the city.

"It is a mathematical certainty, not a theory, that this improvement will do more to relieve the congestion of traffic on Peachtree street than any other plan," said Mr. Maddox.

While the committee did not decide definitely whether or not the money for this improvement would be forthcoming at once or in the near future, the property owners who appeared before the committee Tuesday stated they were pleased with the interest shown by the members of the committee.

Among the others who spoke in behalf of the project were Forrest Adair, Cash Richardson and J. C. Grant. Forrest Adair urged that the money be given and the work commence at once, so that it could be completed before the Shriners' convention in March.

Peachtree street is at present eighty feet wide between Harris and Baker streets. The proposed improvement would give an eighty-foot street from Harris to the junction of Pryor and Forsyth.

"The Money Moon" he wants something entirely different from either it or "Peg o' My Heart" or any play now holding the Gotham boards. And he wouldn't care if an Atlanta author was the one to write it.

"Write me a new play of the hard-boiled man hewing out skyscraper and bridge," he says. "A romance or the everyday and who tells to the sky-line of the great city; a psychological study of race that is the East Side of every large city; a tragedy, an independent old age in a town flat; a bizarre comedy of the Mississippi valley. We are writers in the most human, the most varied, the most human history; our dramas are floating in an ocean of variety; and we must swim desperately afloat to avoid the narrow, private pond."

THE ATLANTA IMPROVEMENT COMMISSION WILL BE ASKED FOR CIVIC IMPROVEMENTS

Stewards Make Grand Circuit Rules for '14

Schedule of Races for Coming Season Will Commence on July 20 at Cleveland and Will Close on October 5 at Lexington With Two Weeks' Meet

By Associated Press. Jan. 14.—The stewards of the Grand Circuit, in session here yesterday, decided upon the following schedule of racing for the coming season, which probably will start July 20: July 10, Cleveland; July 27, Detroit; August 3, Grand Rapids; August 10, Kalamazoo; August 17, Detroit; August 24, Detroit; August 31, Syracuse (New York state fair); September 7, Detroit (Michigan state fair); September 14, Columbus (two weeks); October 5, Lexington (two weeks). It was announced that the week of July 8 has been attached to New York and the following week to Salem, N. H. These are tentative dates however, and if they are not satisfactory to the two associations the meeting will open at previously planned at Cleveland on July 20. The old officials of the association were re-elected, following: E. J. DeWitt, Cleveland, president, and F. E. Kline, Cleveland, secretary and treasurer. The place and date of the next annual meeting was not announced. Among the new rules are the following: Every member of the Grand Circuit each year shall close his yearling closing events 18 days before the opening of his regular meeting. Entrance fees on every horse named in early closing events shall be 3 per cent of the purse. In sweepstakes races that may be given in place of stakes, at least \$500 shall be added and the payments shall be three of six. Where two or more horses are entered and start from the same stable or are owned by the same man, they shall be coupled in the betting and in the paddock. Only the winner of a race shall be penalized with a record. Records made by performers against time and in public races by non-members shall not be considered a bar to eligibility to race. A horse that has started in two consecutive races and in outside the money shall be allowed to start in the next race in a class two seconds lower than his best record; if he has started in three consecutive races and won no money, he shall be allowed to start in the fourth and if he is started in four, four seconds. The entry fee in late closing horses shall be 5 per cent of the purse. Two horses from the same stable may enter in the same purse for any entry fee of 5 per cent of the purse. Additional two entries or fractions thereof made in the same race, however, would add an additional fee of 5 per cent each to be paid. All races conducted by the Grand Circuit shall be made by the Grand Circuit.
