R. V. "You may state positively," said Mr. Ladow, just before a meeting of the parole board at the prison, "that I am not in Atlanta to investigate any charges made by Mr. Hawthorne or Dr. Morton, but to see that the department of justice does not consider the charges of sufficient importance to warrant an investigation."

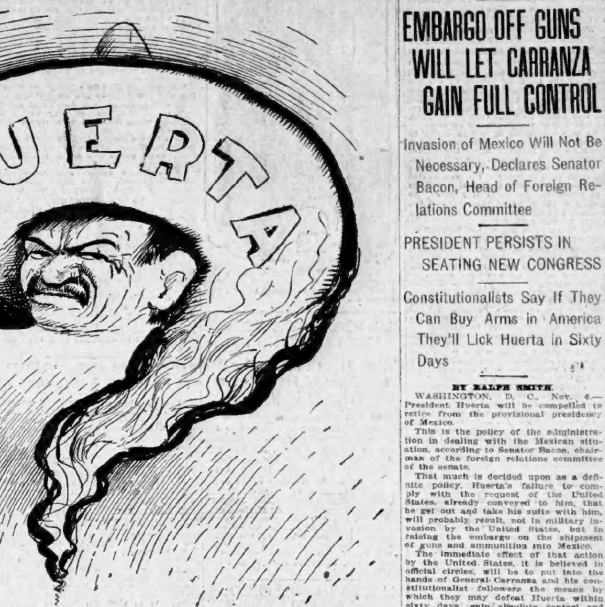

NEW MUNICIPAL COURT WILL BE ATTACKED SOON

Attorney Robert R. Jackson Retained by Justice Jordan, Who Loses Place

Justice that the proposed municipal court, which is to take the place of the justice of the peace courts in Atlanta, will be attacked on the ground that it is not constitutional, was removed Thursday by a statement to The Journal by Attorney Robert R. Jackson, of the firm of Gesser & Jackson.

Mr. Jackson has been retained by W. T. Jordan, one of the several justices who will be automatically removed from office by the new court, to fight the invalidation.

Mr. Jackson says that he will start litigation just as soon as the new court begins to issue orders of the county's money, which will of necessity be in the next few days, and that he will be prepared to fight the new court to the limit of his power. It is expected that several other justices will also be retained to fight the new municipal court.

The new municipal court will be attacked upon a number of grounds, and Mr. Jackson declares that he is confident that the supreme court will declare it unconstitutional.

It is probable that the five judges of the new court will receive their commissions from Governor Thomas E. Watson on Friday morning. The five men whose recommendations were accepted are Eugene C. Thomas, T. O. Hutchinson and Luther Z. Rouser, Jr. The first three named are active applicants for the position of chief justice.

DECATUR VOTERS DEFEAT CHARTER AMENDMENT

Mayor and Council Retain Power to Make Appointments to City Offices

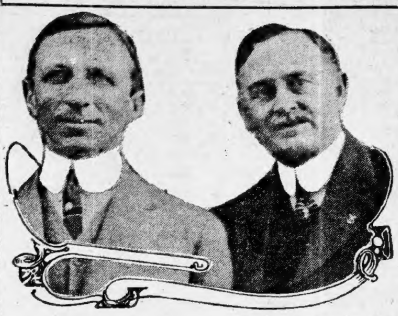

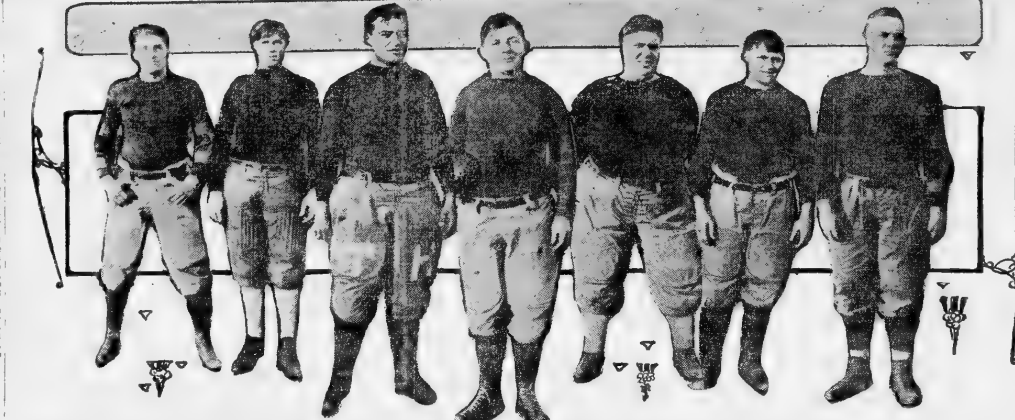
