MEXICO CITY, Nov. 15.—In a view of Secretary Carrera's reputation as any of the mediators by an alliance with the United States, President Huerta has been seen to have this idea in his expression of interest in the settlement and magnanimity of his dignified attitude toward Washington.

COMMERCIALIZING FOOTBALL.

(Yale and Harvard are against numbering football players on the grounds that it tends to "commercialize the game.")

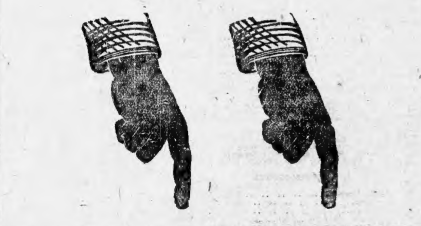

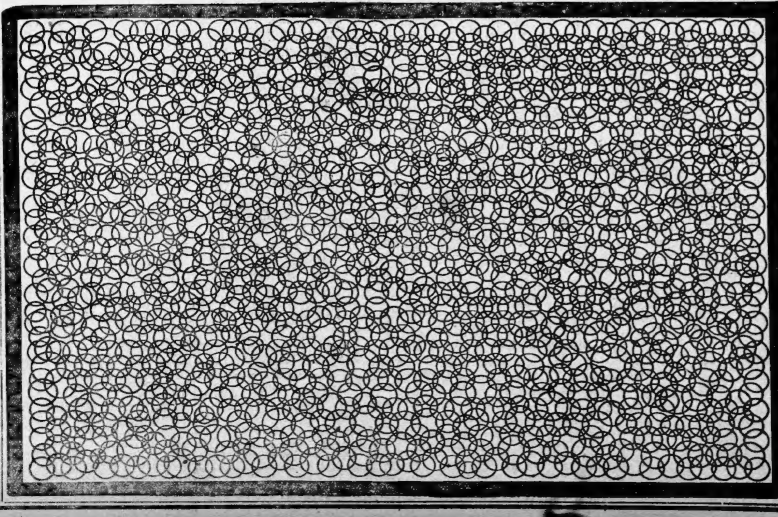
