HUERTA'S BEATEN ARMY PREPARING FOR LAST STAND

Falling to Regan Juarez, Federals Struggle Toward Chihuahua City, Only Stronghold in Northern Mexico
FLUSHED WITH VICTORY
REBELS PLAN ASSAULT
Insurgent Chief Will Give His Men Two Days' Rest Before Moving on Capital-Prisoners Are Spared

(By Associated Press.)
EL PASO, Tex., Nov. 25.—Insurgents, and practically without ammunition the survivors of the army government soldiers who for two days fought to regain Juarez for Huerta, continued their struggle to reach Chihuahua City, where they hope to entrench themselves in the final campaign.

In Juarez today General Villa continued preparations to move against Chihuahua City, which even now may be in the hands of the federal forces under General Manlio Chaves, who was reported to have been in the vicinity of Juarez.

For another day at least the commander of the rebels will permit his men to rest, while in the meantime the army will be on the attack on the federal garrisons, which, if successful, will give the constitutionalists complete possession of the state and will drive the federals from their last stronghold in northern Mexico.

STORIES OF BATTLE.
Soldiers today in the vicinity of Juarez told their friends that they were sure they would win the battle. They said that the federal army had been routed and General Villa's main body of troops had advanced to within a half mile of the city.

They said the federals, who from a distance of about five miles detained, followed their flight and were in the attack. Desperately fighting continued until about 10 o'clock, when the constitutionalists attacked the main column of the federals. They were routed and the main body of the federals was driven to the south, arriving at the camp of about 10 o'clock.

Before the sound of conflict, the troops from left and right were hastening to the front. The cavalry was ordered to maintain charge on the enemy, both on the left and right, and the infantry to follow the main column of the federals in the scale of battle and turned what might have been a defeat into a victory.

BEFORE THE BATTLE.

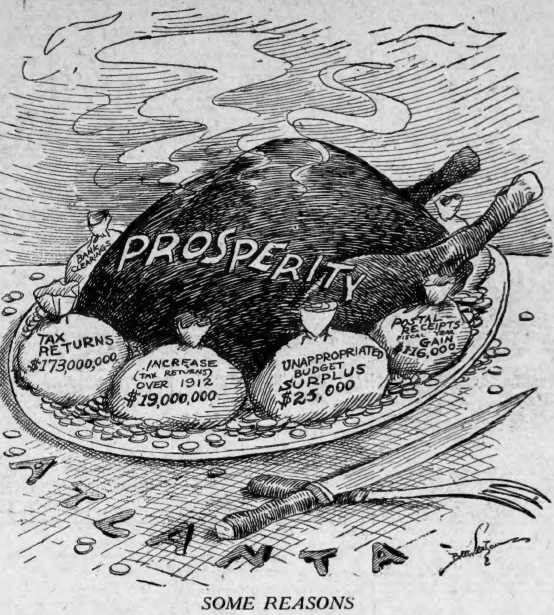

ZELAYA HELD PENDING EXTRADITION HEARING State Department Awaits Official Documents From Nicaragua

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, Nov. 27.—Official documents asking for the extradition of former President Zelaya for the alleged murder of two countrymen in Nicaragua, were received today and what was to have been a hearing was postponed until a conference between Solicitor General Clegg and Secretary Baughen, Zelaya's attorney, was arranged last night.

Mr. Zelaya was a prominent executive of Cannon and Groce, two American firms, in San Juan, Nicaragua, according to advice here. Diplomats here have been told that the extradition treaty with Nicaragua, Zelaya's attorney is negotiating for the extradition of Cannon and Groce unless his extradition is immediately effected, and that the murder of his countrymen is held a month in which he was in Nicaragua, he would have to serve a year in prison.

Mr. Zelaya was arrested on December 1, 1912, after his release. Under the circumstances it seems the proceedings against him are entirely disconnected from the murder of the two American soldiers of the Nicaraguan Sent to Jail Pending Bail Examination

NEW YORK, Nov. 27.—Jose Santos Gomez, former president of Nicaragua, arrested in New York at midnight on charges of having committed murder in Nicaragua, was held today without bail for examination on December 1. Pending the arrival of a request for extradition to Nicaragua, he was remanded to the custody of the United States attorney, Mr. Wood charged that a warrant for Zelaya's extradition for murder had been issued in Nicaragua. It was said, however, that they were two entirely disconnected cases and that the death of Lopez Cannon had occurred in 1909 in the Estancia revolution, having nothing to do with General Zelaya's arrest.

NEW YORK, Nov. 27.—This was a "Thanksgiving" day for the Young Men's and Young Women's Christian associations of this city, jubilant as they were of having established a world's record in fund raising by obtaining over \$4,000,000 within fifteen days. The announcement was reported last night that the total \$4,082,501 had been raised, and followed today by some interesting details of the unique campaign.

The act of the odd dollar of the over-subscribed amount came at the last moment from the janitor of a downtown building who sent it with the following simple and earnest, if ungrammatical note: "I see by the paper this morning that you have not got your four million dollars, and so there is nothing for me to do than help you. This morning a lady gave me one dollar for me to be without turkey and send that one dollar for your fund. I am a janitor that loves the lord. God bless you."

It is shown that 17,544 separate contributions were made to the fund and that five of these contributors gave so generously that their gifts alone totaled \$1,750,000. John D. Rockefeller was the chief contributor, having given \$1,000,000. A number of rich persons gave a million dollars. Cleveland H. Lodge was a close second with gifts of \$500,000. The number of rich persons who clothed their philanthropy with modesty and the total of anonymous gifts was over \$400,000.

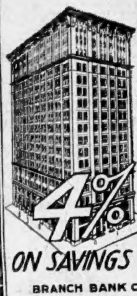

More Homes Needed for Farm Boy Visitors—Schools to Help Get Them

Members of the Atlanta board of education will ride in carriages in the Georgia corn show parade Thursday, December 4.

The invitation to participate was accepted by the board at the meeting Wednesday afternoon, and at the same time the board adopted a resolution requesting the 2,000 boys of the two high schools and of the sixth, seventh and eighth grades of all the grammar schools to participate in the parade.

The board directed that the high schools and these three grades of the grammar schools be dismissed at 4 o'clock.

With these 2,000 Atlanta school boys in line, and all of the other organizations which go to compose the parade, it will extend for more than a mile through the streets of the city.

Superintendent W. H. Blalock, giving his imprimatur to the movement, will command a division composed of the Atlanta school boys and the corn club boys and will be assisted by Fitzgald Diker and Oliver, who have given special aid in the matter of homes.

Letters received by the Atlanta board of education indicate there will be at least eighty-five counties represented by the corn club children and that from these counties there will come to Atlanta not less than 900 corn club boys, probably more.

Up to Thursday home had been secured for only 180 boys and the request continues to come very freely. There will be districts throughout the pupils of the sixth, seventh and eighth grades of the grammar schools.

At 9 o'clock this morning when the sale opened a long line of people had assembled to await their turn to reach the box office window and secure seats for the play.

It is expected that the students of Georgia Tech and of the Peachtree-High school may also take part in the parade, as cordial invitation to do so has been extended them.

McDuffie, of Atlanta, is counsel for the corporation, which is capitalized at \$500,000.

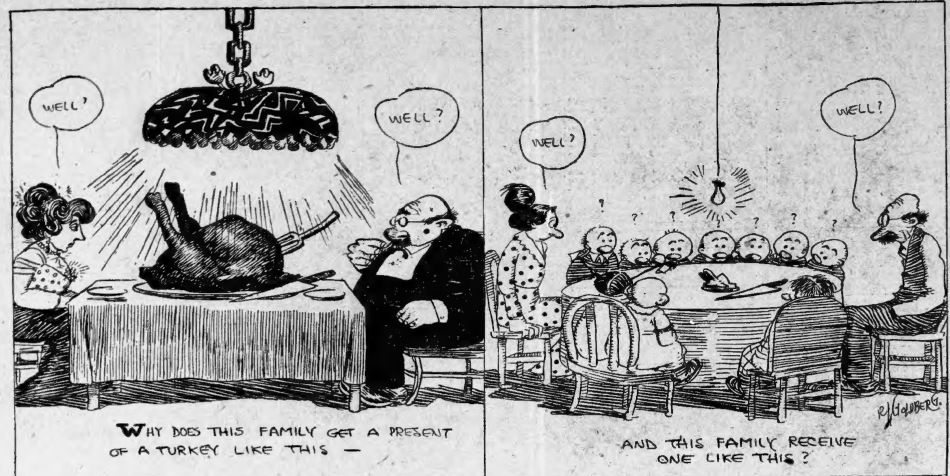

WOMAN DOCTOR'S DEATH CHARGED TO DEAN CRAIG

Head of College on Trial for Murder of Dr. Helene Knabe at Indianapolis

SHELBYVILLE, Ind., Nov. 27.—Dr. William H. Craig, dean of the Indiana Veterinary college at Indianapolis, will be placed on trial here tomorrow to answer to an indictment charging him with the murder of Dr. Helene Knabe at Indianapolis the night of October 23, 1911. Dr. Craig was indicted at Indianapolis December 31, 1912, on evidence submitted by a private detective employed by women of the state. The grand jury also returned a bill against Alonzo M. Ragsdale, an undertaker and administrator of Dr. Knabe's estate, charging him with being an accessory after the fact to the murder. The date for his trial has not been fixed. The murder of Dr. Knabe has been one of the most puzzling in the criminal history of the state. She was found dead in her bed with a deep gash in her throat, by her office girl, Miss Katherine McPherson, when she went to Dr. Knabe's apartment the morning of October 24, 1911. The police after a long investigation declared her death a case of suicide. The Marion county coroner reported that Dr. Knabe was murdered. Two grand juries investigated the case without returning any indictments. Two women of the state raised a fund and hired a private detective to investigate the murder and the indictments were returned by the grand jury on testimony submitted by him. He will be the principal witness for the state at the trial here.

MARKET DAY AT PANAMA

Some New and Unusual Species of the Vegetable and Animal Kingdom Offered by Vendors.

By WILLIS J. BARBOT, Author of "Panama and the Canal in Pictures and Prose." (Copyright, 1913, Syndicate Publishing Co., New York. All rights reserved.) Star-like markings and is sometimes called the star apple. It is eaten with a spoon and is palatable. The manna, however, like the mango, requires a specially trained taste. Like most people of a low order of intelligence, the mongrel natives of Panama are without the slightest sense of humanity to dumb animals. He does not seem to be intentionally cruel—indeed he is too indolent to exert himself unless something is to be gained. But he never takes any consideration for the suffering of an animal affect his method of treating it. The iguana, ugliest of lizards, which he eats with avidity, is one of his chief victims. This animal is usually taken alive by hunters in order that he may undergo a preliminary fattening process before being committed to the pleasant to contemplate. Here at the market are digit of tea, living, painted, looking out on the strange world across above their backs, and the sharp claws on one foot are thrust through the fleshy part of the other so as to hold them together without other fastenings. A five-foot iguana is fully three feet tall, and of that colossal giant at least two feet of its tapering length is useless for food, so the native calmly chops it off with his machete, exposing the mutilated but living animal for sale. Fish is apparently the great staple of the Panama market, as bebeses a place which is practically an island and the very name of which signifies "many fishes." At the time I was there the variety exposed for sale was not great. The codfish, apparently about as large as that of our north, and a few West Indian lobsters, about as large as our average sized lobsters, but without claws, having antennae, perhaps eighteen inches long, instead. Butterflies and small mollusks were plentifully displayed. In one notable instance this Panama market differs from most open-air affairs of the sort. The vendors make no personal effort to sell their goods. There is no appeal to passing buyers, no crying or wares, no "salubros," to employ the language of Cuba Island. What matter there is, is chiefly among the buyers, who, holding up their wares, are more apt to receive a prospective customer's inquiry than with their eagerness. 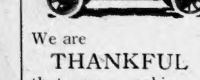
