side at those schools, keeping them busy during practically every hour of daylight.
A number of instances the reports showed grades full up to near the present maximum of pupils per room and in excess of the maximum of forty which Superintendent Dillion advocates earnestly.

THREE EXCEEDED CAPACITY.
Among the forty-eight white schools for which reports were submitted, only three were found with a greater total enrollment than total seating capacity. The remainder had more total capacity than pupils, varying from two at Highland school to 213 at Ashby street school.

VACANT SEATS.
Further analysis of the principal's return shows that among the schools there is surplus room, idle in every grade at one instance, and in some cases the deficiency of capacity in corresponding grades is made up by the other schools ten times over at a conservative estimate.

Another reason pointed out by Superintendent Dillion is that not in all instances are the seats actually vacant. The principal's instructions being to report capacity—that is, where seats are used for or might be put in their classrooms. The fallacy of these figures is betrayed by the report of the principal of Calhoun street, who reports "Seats vacant, 77," and there under the heading "Grades reported," in one instance it is obvious that seats actually being used are numbered. Mayor Thinks School Congestion was Exaggerated

Mayor Woodruff's view of the school situation in Atlanta is very much the same as that indicated by The Journal's figures. In other words, he doesn't think the congestion is nearly so great as it has been pictured. He announced Wednesday morning that "it would make a complete tour of the schools on Thursday to ascertain for himself just what is needed."

"My opinion is that the school houses have not been located as they should have been. It is not so much that the schools are too close together, which would be to say that the property is so located as to prevent the establishment of circular streets around the school houses."

State Agricultural Department Experts Address Large Audience in Taft Hall

Atlanta's milk supply was severely arranged Tuesday night at the meeting held in Taft hall under the joint auspices of the state department of agriculture and the Atlanta chamber of commerce.

Dr. Halliday stated that the department has examined between two and three hundred samples of milk taken in and around Atlanta, and from these examinations he summed up his conclusions as follows:

"The conclusion I draw is that Atlanta on the whole, is not getting good milk. I may state, however, that much improvement can be taken place and we find that dairymen are taking advantage of the suggestions offered them by the department of agriculture."

HUNDREDS CLAMOR FOR JOBS IN CIVIL SERVICE

Examinations for Postal Carriers and Clerks Will Be Held November 5

Over 300 applications, an unusually large number, have been received by the Atlanta civil service office for the examination for postal clerks and carriers which will be held here on November 5.

While no tabulated records are kept showing a number of white and colored applicants, it is understood that an unusually large percentage of the applicants are white.

The number of applicants to take the examinations in Atlanta is about one-third of the total number in the fifth district, applications having been received from about 1,500 applicants.

On November 5 also will be held an examination for a bookkeeper, typewriter and stenographer, all in one, for the post at the United National Park Commission at Pittsburgh, Pa.

For the qualifications comprised in these three offices the government offers the annual salary of \$900.

Prices are quite low for the position and wages eligible to compete.

Examinations will be held December 30 and 31 for teachers in the Philippines, and both men and women are eligible as applicants.
