CONGREGATIONALISTS WOULD CHANGE CREED

Members Object to Doctrinal Statement—Meeting in Kansas City

(By Associated Press.) KANSAS CITY, Mo., Oct. 22.—The most important conference of Congregationalists in a decade was begun here today when Moderator Nathaniel Boynton of Brooklyn called to order the general assembly of the National Council of Congregational churches in the United States.

The moderator there are four candidates: Rev. William Howard Fay, of Los Angeles; Rev. Samuel H. Woodrow, of St. Louis; Rev. Charles R. Brown, dean of Yale divinity school, and Rev. Charles C. Mills, of Morristown, N. J.

Reports of commissioners and committees received most of today's session. That of the commission on polity concerning the doctrinal statement was considered the most important. The commission also recommended the cancellation of the number of church societies and the appointment of a national secretary. The statement on doctrine which is objected to by some of the members because of its broadness, follows:

"We believe in God the Father, infinite in wisdom, goodness and love; and Jesus Christ, His son, our Lord and savior, who for us and our salvation lived and died and freely overcame and by the Holy spirit who taketh of the things of Christ and revealeth them to us, rendering, comforting and inspiring the souls of men."

"We are united in striving to know the will of God as taught in the Holy scriptures and in our purpose to walk in the ways of the Lord made known to us by the mission of the church in Christ to proclaim the gospel to all mankind, exalting the worship of the one true God and laboring for the promotion of progress, of the promotion of justice, the triumph of peace and the realization of human brotherhood. Desiring as did our fathers upon the original guidance of the Holy Spirit we seek with faith for the triumph of righteousness and for life and glory everlasting Amen."

\$25,500,000 IS SPENT BY FARMERS ON FERTILIZER

More Used in Season Than Ever Before Except in 1910-11

Approximately \$25,500,000 was expended in Georgia for commercial fertilizers during the period from October 1, 1912, to October 1, 1913. More fertilizers were used in the state during the past season than in any other season of the state's history, except that of 1910-11, which broke all records.

During the season of 1910-11 the state consumed 1,292,222 tons of straight fertilizers and 129,748 tons of cotton seed meal. This last season it used 1,139,629 tons of straight fertilizers and 123,978 tons of cotton seed meal.

At the very conservative estimate of 25 a ton the farmers invested during the season just closed \$2,415,840 for straight fertilizers. Figured on an average price of \$35 per ton they invested \$1,274,212 for cotton seed meal.

The state collects a tax of ten cents on every ton of fertilizer and cotton seed meal sold in Georgia, and these fees during the past season aggregated \$139,388.

A comprehensive report on the sale, use and analysis of fertilizers used in Georgia has just been issued by the state department of agriculture.

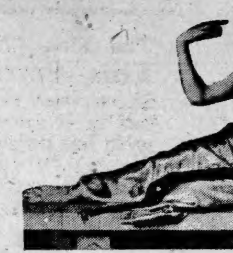

NEGRO QUESTION MAY BE UP TO SOUTHERN BISHOPS

Problems Again Are Debated by Protestant-Episcopal Bishops

(By Associated Press.) NEW YORK, Oct. 22.—The old question of negro representation in the house of bishops was again to be dealt with this afternoon by the general convention of the Protestant Episcopal church. The outlook was for a stormy meeting of an hour's duration in the house of deputies and for an unlimited debate in the house of bishops.

Both houses will have to concur in legislation before the present status of negro communicants can be changed. At present the negro membership in the house of bishops is under the direction of white diocesan bishops. A minority of the deputies committee on racial episcopacy would place this entire membership under the direction of a single negro bishop and give to this bishop a vote in the house of bishops.

Sentiment in the house of deputies today appeared to be almost evenly divided in the house of bishops, however, there was a strong feeling that the wishes of the southern bishops, who would be most directly affected, should determine the action of the house.
