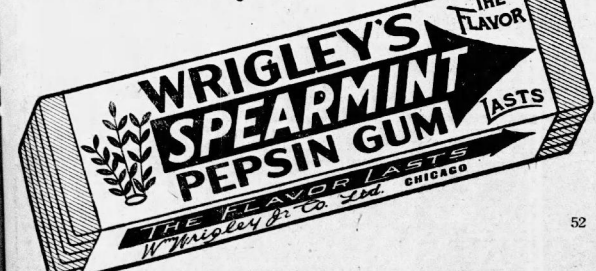

He continued: 'The real opposition to this bill is not as to government control, under which we shall never yield; it is not as to the capital subscription required, which is precisely that the scheme unanimously endorsed by the American Bankers' association. It is not as to the 3 per cent dividend allowed members, the exact limit prescribed in the Aldrich bill; it is not as to compulsory membership, which was provided in another way in the Aldrich scheme; it is not as to the bond refunding provision, infinitely simpler and less exacting than the Aldrich plan. It is in these of these things that vexes the big money interests, the exact limit prescribed from a system which makes them the legal custodians of all the reserve funds of the country, \$348,000,000, of which funds on the 24th day of November, 1912, they had not left the master of Wall street stock operations.' 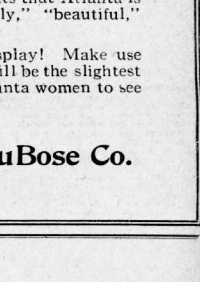

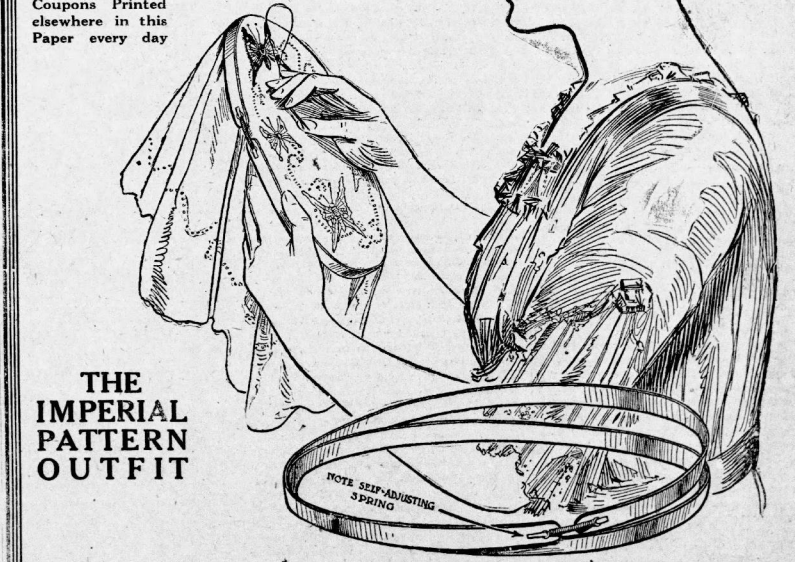

The Tariff Victory.

Real tariff reform, with all that it means to free business and free government, has at last been accomplished. To this great end Democracy has fought through arduous and trying years...

The struggle has been waged in a people's behalf and it is the people who have won. The passage of the tariff bill in the Senate yesterday shows that Government by particular interests is over and that Government by the public mind and public conscience has truly begun.

The passage of the bill is a distinctive tribute to the unwavering and tactful leadership of President Wilson. To his earnest purpose to redeem the party's highest pledge, the precision and energy with which the measure was urged through Congress is very largely due.

Particular credit must also be given the magnificent work of Senator Simmons in the Senate and Mr. Underwood in the House. And to the great rank of file of Democrats in both Houses the country is singularly indebted.

Now for Currency Reform.

The supremely important business now before Congress is the banking and currency bill which was reported yesterday by the House Committee and which will soon be well on the way to enactment. This legislation is made doubly imperative by the passage of the tariff measure, for it is equally a part of the great task of economic reconstruction in which the country's vital interests are concerned.

If the emancipating effect of tariff revision is duly to be enjoyed, it must be followed promptly by the steady, sustaining influence of financial reform.

The reduction and removal of a crushing tariff tax will go far toward lifting the burden of monopoly from American enterprise and will release fresh stores of commercial and industrial energy. But an adequate system of currency and banking is necessary to supply the means and material through which this new freedom can be utilized.

This, the leaders in Congress keenly realize and there are cheering indications that they will press the banking and currency bill to speedy passage. It has the unanimous support of Democrats in the House; some of them, to be sure, differed over matters of detail but all such conflicts of opinion have been settled in the party conferences and when the administration measure comes to a vote the party ranks will stand unbroken.

Rumors that a movement to postpone currency legislation has been developing in the Senate are unfounded. There, as in the House, the President is staunchly supported in his appeal for the promptest possible action.

Railroads are doing everything possible to avoid a car shortage during the coming rush season, according to a statement issued from the offices of the Southern Railway company Wednesday morning. The statement follows: "Heavy business conditions throughout the southeast during the fall and winter are indicated by the action of the railways of this section in calling upon shippers to add them in maintaining an adequate car supply during the crop moving season. Anticipating a heavy demand for cars, the railways are themselves doing everything possible to increase their car supply. Steps are being run at full capacity to put every available car in repair and car builders are being urged to turn out new equipment as rapidly as possible. Steps are also being taken to provide for the most expeditious handling of cars at terminals and transfer points. While the railways are making these preparations for the rush of heavy business, it is recognized that shippers can render assistance of the greatest importance by loading and unloading cars as promptly as possible, thus avoiding unnecessary detention of cars and by loading cars to their full capacity. As an efficient car supply is so important to shippers individually and through trade and commercial bodies to add the railways in their effort to secure the maximum efficiency in the use of cars."

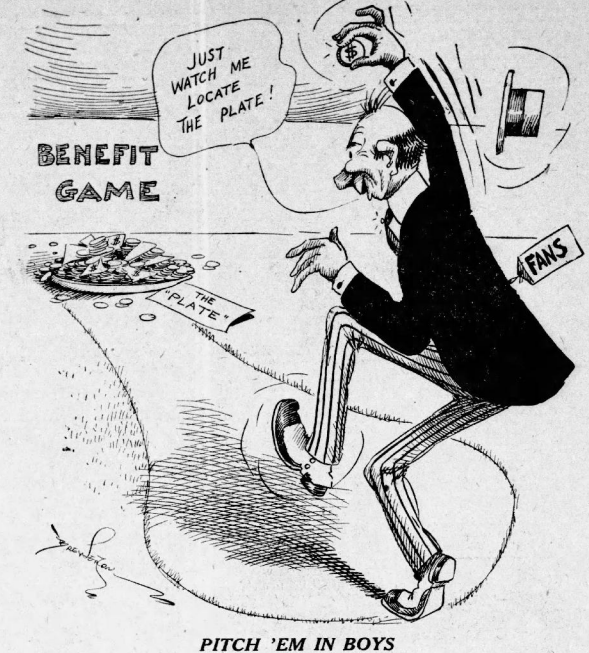

It was the only time I didn't fight on the square and I shall never do another crooked thing in my life."

Pelkey asserts that he never has had an offer to fight Jack Johnson in Paris, the frame-up proceeding to convey invites him to clash with Johnson for large money were cooked up, he said, for some purpose.
