EXPRESS OFFICIALS DECLARE IDENTITY OF THIEF IS KNOWN

Hourly Arrests Are Expected in Case of \$71,900 Robbery From Car of Southern Express Co. Going to Savannah

ATLANTA SLEUTHS HAVE LIVE CUE, IT IS SAID

Harry Scott, Pinkerton Detective, and Private Detective of Company Are Tracing Down Bold Thief

Arrests in connection with the \$71,900 express robbery, which occurred between New York and Savannah, are expected within the next few hours. Special dispatches to the Journal from the Savannah correspondent Friday afternoon were to the effect that a Pinkerton detective—supposedly Harry Scott, of Atlanta, and a special detective of the Southern Express company, left Savannah Friday morning, ostensibly for Atlanta.

It is understood that these detectives have picked up a very live clue as to the identity of the robber and that they have gone to take him in custody. This report is strengthened by an Associated Press dispatch from Savannah, which says that the officials of the express company have admitted that they know who the robber is, and that they expect him to be taken in custody at almost any minute.

Officials Declare They Know Who Thief Is

SAVANNAH, Ga., Sept. 12.—According to a high official of the Southern Express company in Savannah this morning, arrests may be expected at almost any moment in connection with the robbery of the consignment of \$71,900 from the small shipping-made steamer, the Savannah bank and trust company, in this city, and the steamer in Brunswick, Valdosta and Albany.

This official in the presence of Mr. Thomas J. Watts, chief special agent of the Southern Express company, who had just made a report upon the course of the investigation, which is being conducted declared that there was in the hands of the men who are trailing the man information which placed them in a position so that they know almost certainly exactly who took the large consignment of cash and just where it was removed from the small steamer. Mr. Watts is in direct personal charge of the investigation, which is being conducted from Savannah. MRS. GODBEE'S STORY TOLD ON THE STAND

Dramatic Story of Defendant in Famous Case Holds Attention of Jurors and Spectators in Court

Mrs. Godbee took the witness stand for her own behalf late yesterday afternoon and made a remarkable statement that held the crowded court-room breathless. She told the man she later killed, going into every detail. She told of extreme cruelty to which she said she had been subjected by Godbee and cited instances where she declared, he had beaten, choked and otherwise mistreated her. She said that Godbee had killed her younger brother during their early married life and that she had furnished the money with which he earned an acquittal before a jury by proving self defense. She noted that Godbee had despoiled her fortune and tricked her out of valuable property inherited from her mother and father.

Beginning with her father's death in 1887, the woman told of her marriage less than a month later to Godbee who purchased the mercantile business of her parent in Perkins county. Soon after the ceremony, the witness said, her husband began to obtain from her the property which she had inherited at her father's death.

Year by year she went through her life, citing alleged instances where she said she was gradually despoiled of her inheritance and the property which she later acquired at her husband's death. She related her whole life, telling of instances where, she said, Godbee had plotted against her, until at the time she killed him he was in possession of all her property.

DELAVERS HUSBAND CRUEL.

Godbee killed her brother, she said, two hours after he had kissed her goodbye one morning to go to the post-office in Perkins, which he conducted, and left her with a promise not to take seriously anything the youth said. She declared that on one occasion she had compelled her to work at a housekeeper's wage. For a month, in a hotel in Milton bought with her money. She said that on one occasion she had awakened in the night to find Godbee bending over her with a gun in his hands. On another he choked her, she said, and she told of an alleged attempt of the dead man to install a negro woman in her home over her protests.

The three children were the only connection between Mrs. Godbee and her husband during the major portion of her married life, she said. She told of several separations, but no reconciliations on account of these ties.

HER FRIENDS SHOCKED.

Mrs. Godbee told of moving to Atlanta several years ago. They lived in a house at 28 Piedmont avenue, she said. It was a dilapidated place, and presently had been occupied by disreputable people. My friends came from Milton. They were shocked at my surroundings.

"The week after we took up our residence," she said, "my friends who lived across the street and who had known me since that at the house had borne a vile reputation, she had suspected me until she learned who I was. Often we were forced to live on at the house."

"I conferred with friends about returning home. They prevailed upon

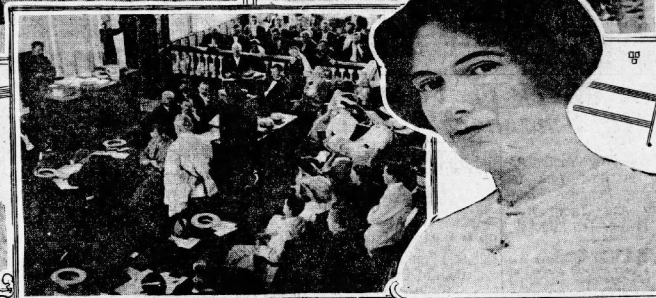
